**LAW SHOULD BE RESPECTED**

The Volstead Act is the law of the land; as long as it is the law it should be respected. Those who are opposed to it in principle should confine their efforts in this direction to the orderly processes of constituted government and not seek to discredit it by winking at or conniving with law breakers. The attempt to force the repeal of a law by trying to show it to be unenforceable is a dangerous course. It tends to disrupt and destroy all forms of constituted government. It leads to anarchy or open rebellion.

If the Volstead Act is wrong convince the people of it and it will go. The present attempt to flout the law is a disgrace to any law abiding people.

The State of Maryland has the right to step in and assist in this matter; it should do so—not to make the State dry—that is but a mere incident—but to enforce a proper respect for the laws of the land.

The News believes in law and order; it believes that a proper respect for the laws of our land and for constituted authority is of far more importance to the safety and welfare of our country than any or all of the issues, the wets and dries combined ever have or ever can raise.

**A GREAT INJUSTICE.**

The Baltimore Sun in a statement last week made a most unjustifiable attack upon Mrs. Donald Hooker, of Baltimore, in stating that she favors the marriage of white women and colored men. There is not one whit of truth in this statement and the News is glad to do its part in correcting same. Mrs. Hooker and the News editors may not see alike politically but she is well-known here and has a host of warm friends. She is a woman of foresight, high character and lofty ideals.

We reprint herewith a letter sent by Mrs. Hooker to the members of the General Assembly, as well as a statement prepared for the Sun, only a portion of which was printed by that paper:

To the Members of the General Assembly:

Dear Sirs—Pursuant to the scandalous stories recently appearing in association with my name in the Baltimore Sun, I enclose a copy of a statement, sent the editor, only a portion of which was printed. It is almost incredible that anyone should believe that I or any other decent woman should favor the marriage of white with colored men, yet apparently some people have actually put credence in this malicious slander.

The discussion at the meeting from which the story came hinged on the Japanese question, and I maintained that there would be no danger of the race intermingling if illicit relationships were banned and women were free to select their husbands.

I trust that your own knowledge of the pernicious ways of yellow journalism will lead you to understand the animus back of this salacious falsehood. (Signed)

To the Editor of the Baltimore Sun:

I wish to deny absolutely and flatly the purport of an article which appeared in the Baltimore Sun of Feb. 22, headed "Favors White Women Wedding Other Races." This is a complete untruth and represents precisely the contrary of my opinion.

What I did say was (1) that sexual selection was phrased in the human race as love; (2) that sexual selection acted to improve the race stock; (3) that throughout the animal kingdom save only in mankind the power of sexual selection was vested in the female; (4) that if women were free to choose their husbands, illicit relationships were banned and marriage was based upon love instead of ulterior considerations, there would be little if any intermingling of superior and inferior races. In support of this thesis I brought forward the acknowledged fact in the crossing of superior and inferior races the man particularly belongs to the superior race. In none of my statements did I in any way indicate that I favored white women wedding other races, nor do I. In addition I pointed out the obvious truth that the present tragic circumstance of a half-breed race in the South was due to the sexual proclivities of white men and not of white women.

As I regard it as the gravest of all crimes against the human race for a man or a woman to accept as the co-parent of a child a person whom he or she regards as an inferior, I am outraged at the imputation involved in this malicious story.

The power of procreation seems to me to involve more serious responsibilities than any other power inherent in mankind, and for the Sun to insinuate that I believe white women should lend themselves to a degradation of the racial stock is an insult so gross as to tempt me were it possible under the law to institute a suit for slander.

My position in the matter is made perfectly clear in a recent book of mine, "The Laws of Sex," in which I plead for a strict enforcement of the marriage laws, to the end that the present extra-marital relationships which result in a degradation of the racial stock may be consistently outlawed.

It is my sincere belief that this outrageous falsehood was printed either to defeat the women's legislation now pending in Annapolis or as a result of the instinct toward yellow journalism. (Signed)

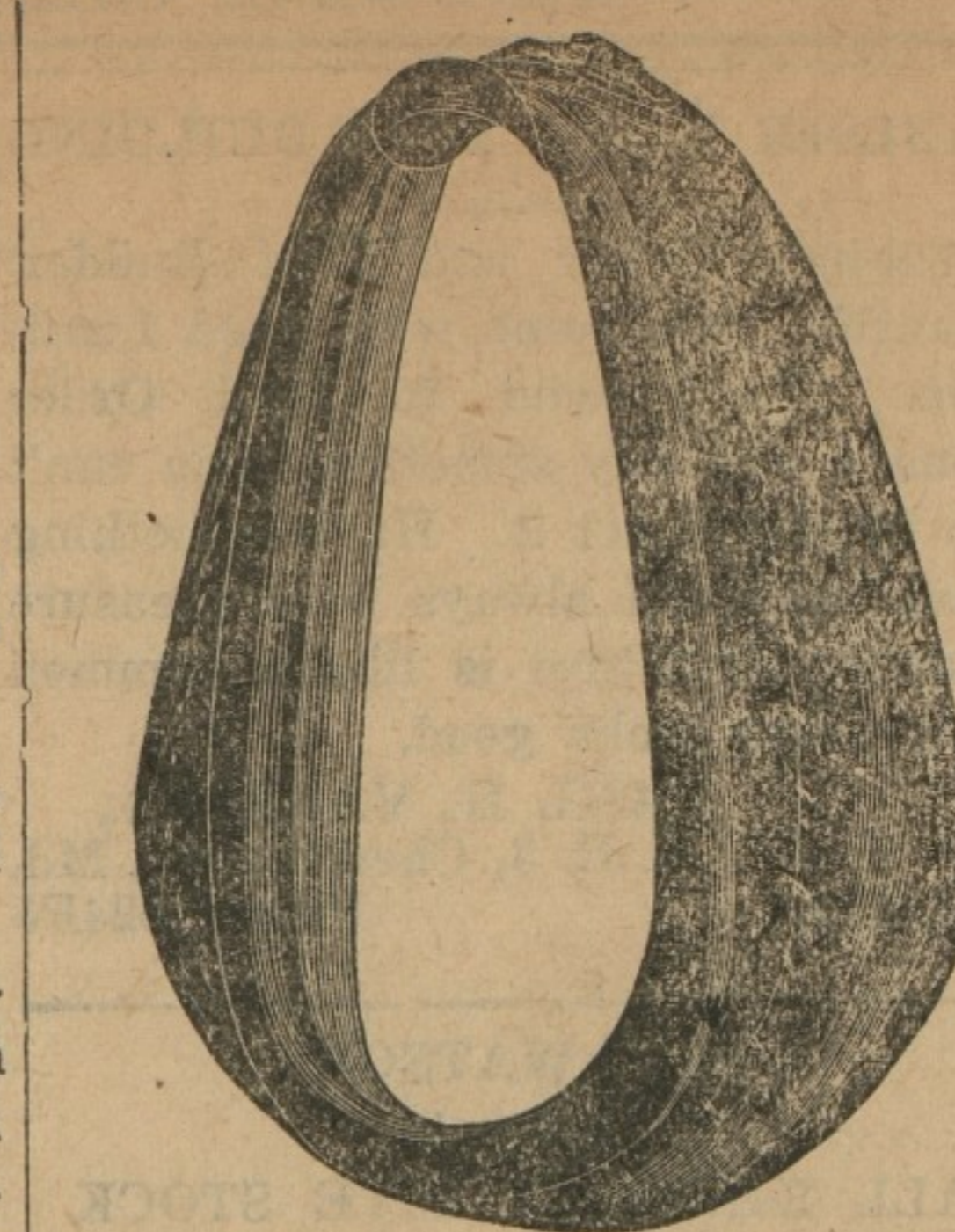

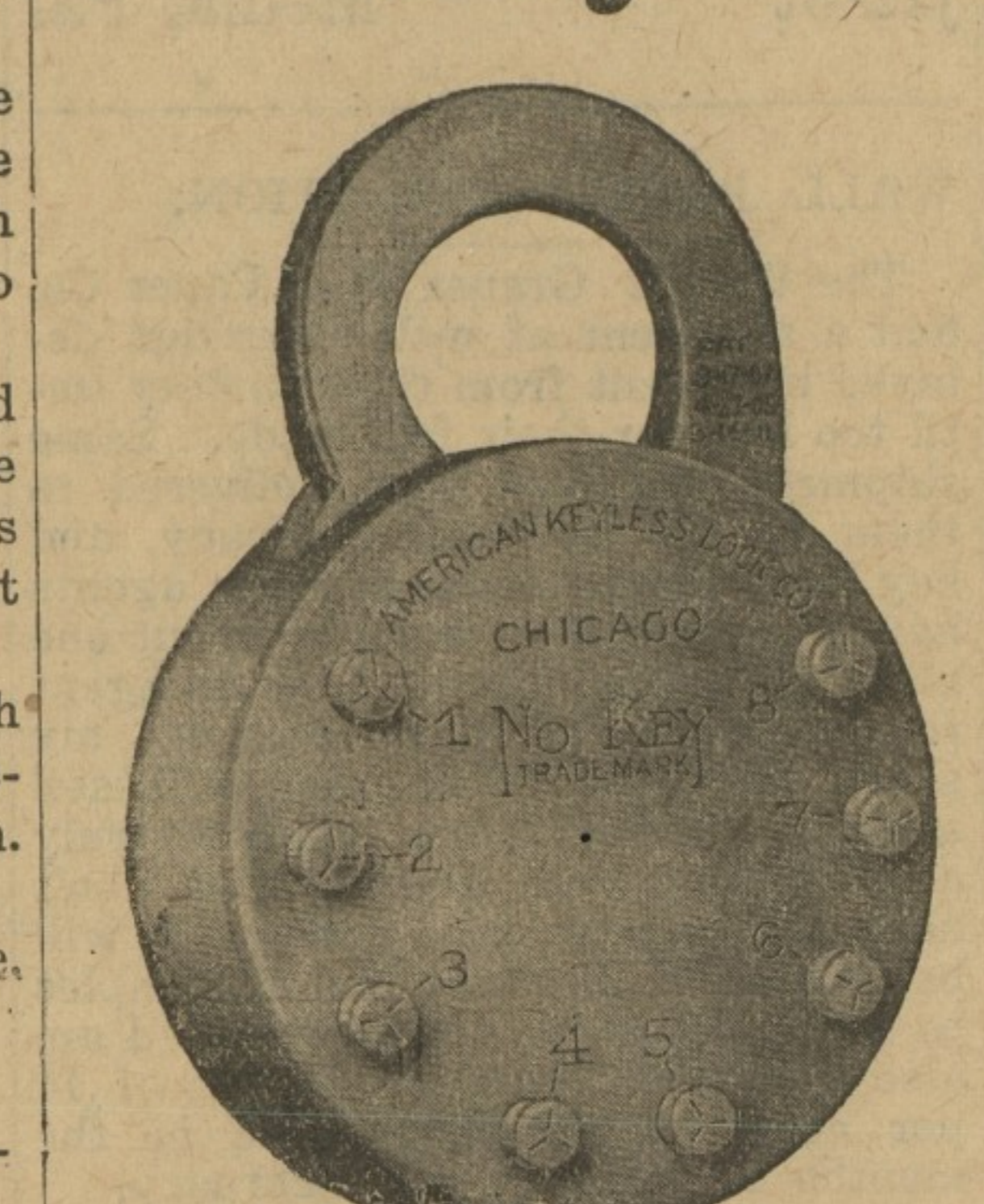

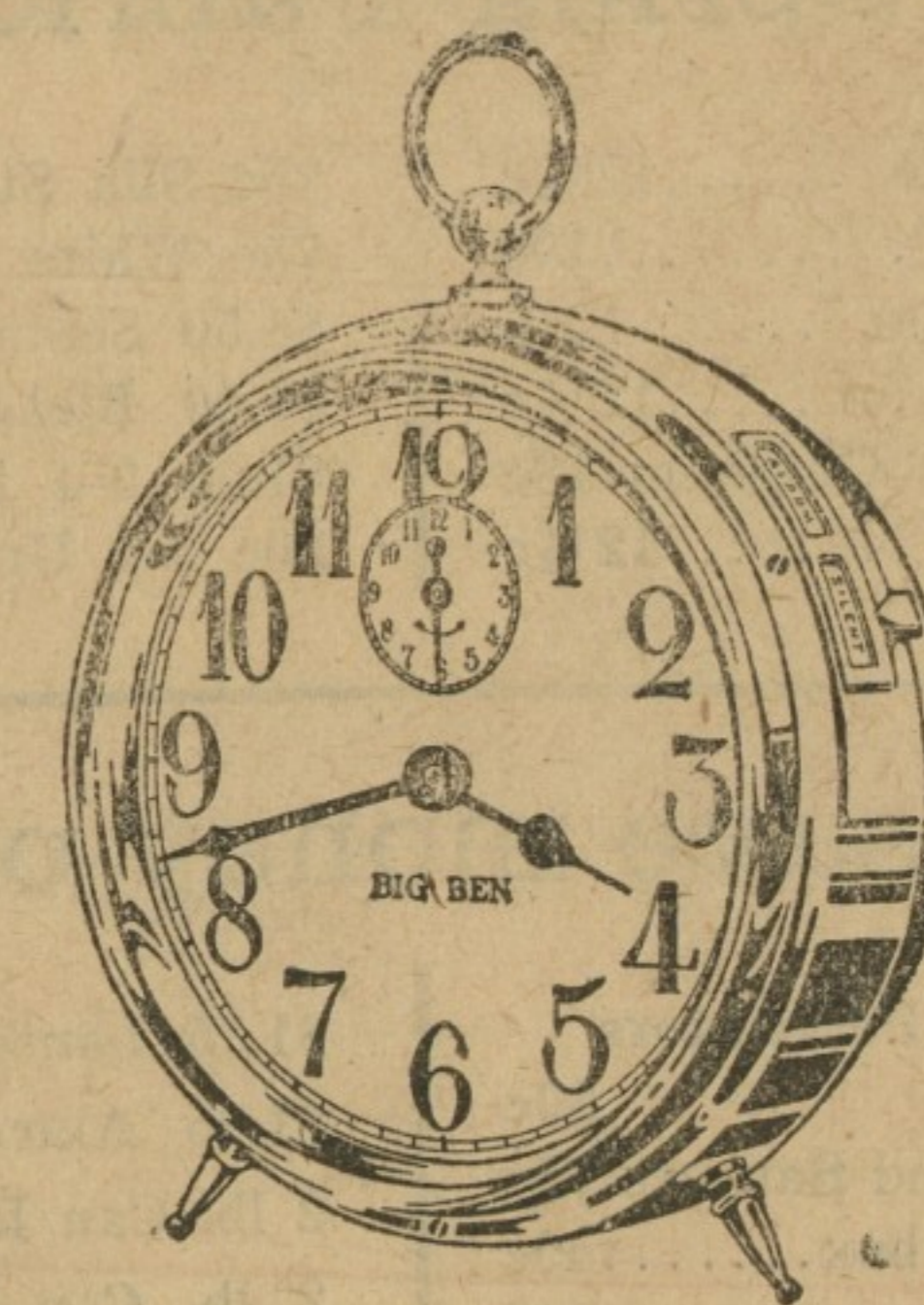
