STATE ROADS IN KENT

Every Section Feels The Need Of Better Roads — Rock Hall, Still Pond, Betterton, Massey And Millington To Get State Roads in 1922.

The time has arrived when a State road is the only road which will give satisfaction in winter. The automobile is here to stay and but few dirt roads can bear the traffic even in summer so that the demand from all parts of the county is for State roads. Kent county has a progressive program for this year and when completed will satisfy various interests. Rock Hall has two propositions—one is to build a straight road from the new State road across the marsh to connect with the road to Ferry, while the other will go thru the streets of the town. The first proposition is favored by the State Roads Commission, and if built, will be done without any cost to Rock Hall. If the road is constructed thru the town the residents must raise \$1,500. At this writing we learn that the business men are ready to comply with this demand and are anxious to have the road go thru Rock Hall.

Still Pond and Betterton are on the program for a State road thru the former and one thru Betterton to the Bay. This is estimated to cost about \$25,000 leaving a balance of over \$110,000 for the completion of the small piece of road to Massey and from Massey to Millington. A large delegation of up-the-county citizens were in town Tuesday and presented their claims in a strong manner. The road fund available in Kent county for 1922 including county, State and Federal aid is \$137,760. This sum, economically used, should complete the program mapped out by the County Commissioners and State Roads Commission in Kent county.

Roads Engineer Applegarth says he is going to adopt a new policy in Kent this year—build more gravel roads, do less work in fall, and join the taxpayers in making a dollar go farther than ever before.

LEGISLATIVE NOTES

The House of Delegates of the General Assembly, by vote of 53 to 48, Tuesday rejected the Senate referendum amendment to the State Enforcement Act, and kill all possible hope of reconsideration. Less than an hour was used by the House in considering and voting on the motion to concur in the Senate amendment. There will therefore be no vote on this question this Fall.

By a vote of 63 to 40 the House Tuesday passed the bill repealing the Full Crew Law. The measure has already passed the Senate, where it was amended to provide that the Public Service Commission shall have jurisdiction in all disputed cases. The repeal of the Full Crew Law has been bitterly fought at Annapolis, not only by the brotherhoods, but also by the legislative committee of the Maryland Federation of Labor. The railroads interested in its repeal have maintained all through the session one of the most extensive which any measure pending before the General Assembly has commanded. Under the provisions of the Full Crew Law, passed in 1908, the railroads were forced to supply a crew of six men, one more than the roads claim is necessary, for all freight trains of over 30 cars. The sixth man was to be used in cases of emergency. The railroads maintained at the numerous hearings held on the bill that they were being put to useless expense by the operation of the law, while the workers held that the presence of the sixth man on long freight trains was necessary for their safe operation. The Senate amendment to the bill provides that the Public Service Commission shall have the power of regulating the size of freight-train crews, with the right of appeal in all disputed cases being granted to both the railroads and the employees.

WEDDING NOTES

The home of Mr. and Mrs. A. P. Forman, near Fairlee, was the scene of a pretty wedding on Wednesday evening, March 15th, at 7:30 p. m. The contracting parties were their attractive and accomplished daughter, Lydia Medora and Wm. Mitchell Pardee. Promptly at the appointed hour the happy couple, accompanied by John Foreman, brother, and Miss Julia Nickerson, cousin of the bride, as best man and bridesmaid, respectively entered the parlor where they were met by Rev. D. J. Moore, who performed the ceremony. The wedding march was skillfully rendered by Mrs. Dr. Frank Smith. After the ceremony refreshments consisting of cake, ices, fruits, etc., were served to about 100 guests. There were many presents including silver, china, aluminum and glassware, bed and table linen, etc. for which thanks are hereby expressed. At a late hour the guests left for their homes leaving best wishes for a long and happy life to the happy couple.

HAND OF DEATH

Arthur T. Legg, a merchant of Quaker Neck, who recently sustained serious injury in a gunning accident, died in the Wilmington Hospital on Tuesday, aged 38. His remains were brought here by train Wednesday. The funeral took place yesterday, interment in Chester Cemetery, Rev. N. O. Gibson officiating. The pall bearers being Howard and Frank Hadaway, W. E. Dickerson, Gus Startt, Gilbert Brown, George Townsend. The deceased leaves a widow, Mrs. Vickers Legg, and five children, also a father, Moses Legg. C. L. Dodd, undertaker.

M. P. CONFERENCE NOTES

The Methodist Protestant Conference will begin in Chestertown Wednesday morning, April 5th, Dr. J. H. Straughn presiding. Dr. A. Norman Ward, President of Western Maryland College, will preach the conference sermon after which the communion will be served. Rev. W. B. Judefind will preach the ordination sermon Sunday morning.

The work of assigning the ministers and delegates to homes has been arduous the committee being very much handicapped by the slowness with which the names of delegates are being reported.

The Christian Endeavor Society of Christ Church will have charge of an informal reception to be held in the lecture room Tuesday evening, when most of the members will arrive. The music of the conference, excepting on Sunday, will be furnished by the male quartet of the conference is worth hearing. Several lady delegates have been named.
