the flock where they should go; no other teaching will nourish them as they need to be nourished. It is generally conceded that the standards of life are changing and, alas! not for the better.

"The man in the community who most exemplify the teachings and life of Christ in his conduct is the minister of the gospel. No matter how the standards change, he must live a life that will honor his Lord and his vocation. This old world, so full of suffering, sadness and sin, needs to see Jesus, and a good, steady look at Him would change conditions here. Nothing else will, and those whom He is depending upon to lift Him that all may see Him are those He calls His multitudes. If they fail Him, earth's multitudes will never see Him, so think more of the soul's adornment than the body's adornment."

"Our Lord cares very little about our personal physical adornment, except that it is not so quaint that we will be objects of ridicule and jest, or so foppish and prim that we will be thought vain, or too untidy that people will not respect us."

"There must be an example of the believers. The pastor must meet God. He must talk to God before he can talk to men. He must hear God before men will hear him. The greatest menace today is not Sabbath desecration, against whom our Lord's friends should firmly stand; not the great crime wave that seems universal in its extent, nor any of these things, as serious as they are, but the growing lack of faith in the word of God. Thirty years ago denials made by Ingersoll were regarded as blasphemous, but today they are being made by men in Christian colleges and seminaries and Christian pulpits."

**Ordination Services Held.**  
The ordination of elders by Rev. J. H. Straughn was a most impressive sight. Nine young men were ordained, and as they came to the altar the wives of some of the parents and their pastoral shepherds were invited and knelt with them. The president was assisted by Luther F. Warner, C. P. Nowlin, F. T. Little, N. O. Gibson, E. D. Stone and G. I. Humphreys. The choir rendered the Palms, Gloria in Excelsis by Mozart, Handel's Holy Art Thou, Largo from Xerxes, William Walter Chapman was the leader; Miss Clara B. Usilton, organist; C. Arthur Bacon, cornet; Foster Cannan, trombone; Joseph N. Wheatley, violin; sopranos, Mrs. J. H. Sides, Mrs. Frank A. Hurlock, Mrs. G. H. Cannan, Misses Flora Wheatley and Amy Wheat; altos, Mrs. J. H. Thompson, Mrs. T. D. Bowers, Misses Emma Ward and Minnie Hudson; basses, A. L. Sparks, Fred. G. Usilton, Roy Woodland, David R. Straughn; tenors, T. D. Bowers, J. H. Thompson and J. Frank Blake.

Those who were ordained were Moreland E. Dearholt, Thomas Turkington, Joseph Lee Marker, Thomas G. Betchler, Thomas C. Mulligan, A. W. Simms, Otho G. Brewer, Merryman L. Smith and G. W. Poirts. In the afternoon another great concourse of people attended the Sunday school rally. Addresses were made by E. A. Sexsmith and E. D. Stone, of Baltimore. Rev. G. M. Clayton, of Centerville, sang a solo, while J. H. Thompson directed the music.

The assistant superintendent, T. D. Bowers, led the Scripture reading and Rev. J. L. Ward, of Lynchburg, offered prayer. An interesting feature of the program was the baptism of a little baby, the niece of Lee Marker, one of the young men who were ordained today, the ceremony being performed by Rev. Mr. Marker, it being his first. Rev. T. O. Crouse preached to a large audience at night and the choir rendered more classical music.

Other churches in the town were supplied with visiting preachers, Dr. Frank T. Benson and Dr. Louis Randall occupied the pulpit in the M. E. Church and gave sermons of literary merit as well as of spiritual power.

A woman facing an unfriendly atmosphere stood before the Methodist Protestant Conference, and by her enthusiasm turned a practically unanimous vote to carry out the president's recommendation to the support of her appeal for the continuance of the West Wilmington Church after it had been practically decided to close the building. In his report the president took the ground that there was not sufficient attendance to justify the retention of the church, and suggested that it be sold to the Methodist Episcopal Church, whose pastor, B. F. Jester, was already a supply there. Mrs. Fannie Hay, of the First Church, wife of Daniel A. Hay, a well-known Wilmington merchant, protested on the ground that there was no Protestant Church within a mile of that location, and she presented a petition signed by 50 persons advocating her cause. Mrs. Fannie Hay, in her argument against selling the church, stated that if a child is fed on castor oil for 15 years and no other food it would soon die, and no church can live on the kind of support given this church.

When Dr. Straughn said that he would become reconciled to the retention of the church on the plan if \$1000 was pledged to its support. Mrs. Hay told the conference that she would assume the obligation and protect it by changing her will at once. The West

Wilmington Church will continue to function.

A committee will take into consideration, with power to act, the project of selling the president's parsonage, 1429 Linden avenue, Baltimore, and the purchase of a new home elsewhere. Likewise a committee will advise on the future of the Book Concern and the conference headquarters at 316 North Charles street. The Book Concern has shown a profit while the printing plant did \$23,000 worth of business.

The invitation of St. John's Church, Dr. L. F. Warner, pastor, to hold the next session there was accepted and the conference will convene there the first Wednesday in April, 1923.

Mr. Crabbe told the conference that every member of the Methodist Protestant Church voted right on every moral issue. He lauded the work of Chaplains Maddox and J. M. Lane Brown, both members of this conference.

The total budget of the year is \$112,000, as against \$83,000 in the last report, according to the annual report of the Rev. C. P. Nowlin.

The conference, upon the recommendation of the committee on literature raise \$650,000 endowment and building fund for Western Maryland College, dividing this way: \$200,000 from the Methodist Protestant Church the balance to be raised by an appeal to the alumni and general public; the period to run four years. President of Westminster Theological Seminary H. L. Elderdice, confined at home by illness in his family, has just rounded out his twenty-fifth year and will be continued in that position. To celebrate the inception of the seminary 25 years ago the first Sunday in May is named jubilee day. The young folks' committee recommended the establishment of the boys' conference with a report from every charge.

The delegate of Home for Aged in Westminster in which \$6,000 was asked the request to go before the churches and ask for \$10,000 to make up a deficiency incurred last year. The total number of members of

the various churches in the conference was given as 34,000, while there had been an increase in the value of church and parsonage property to the extent of \$75,000.
