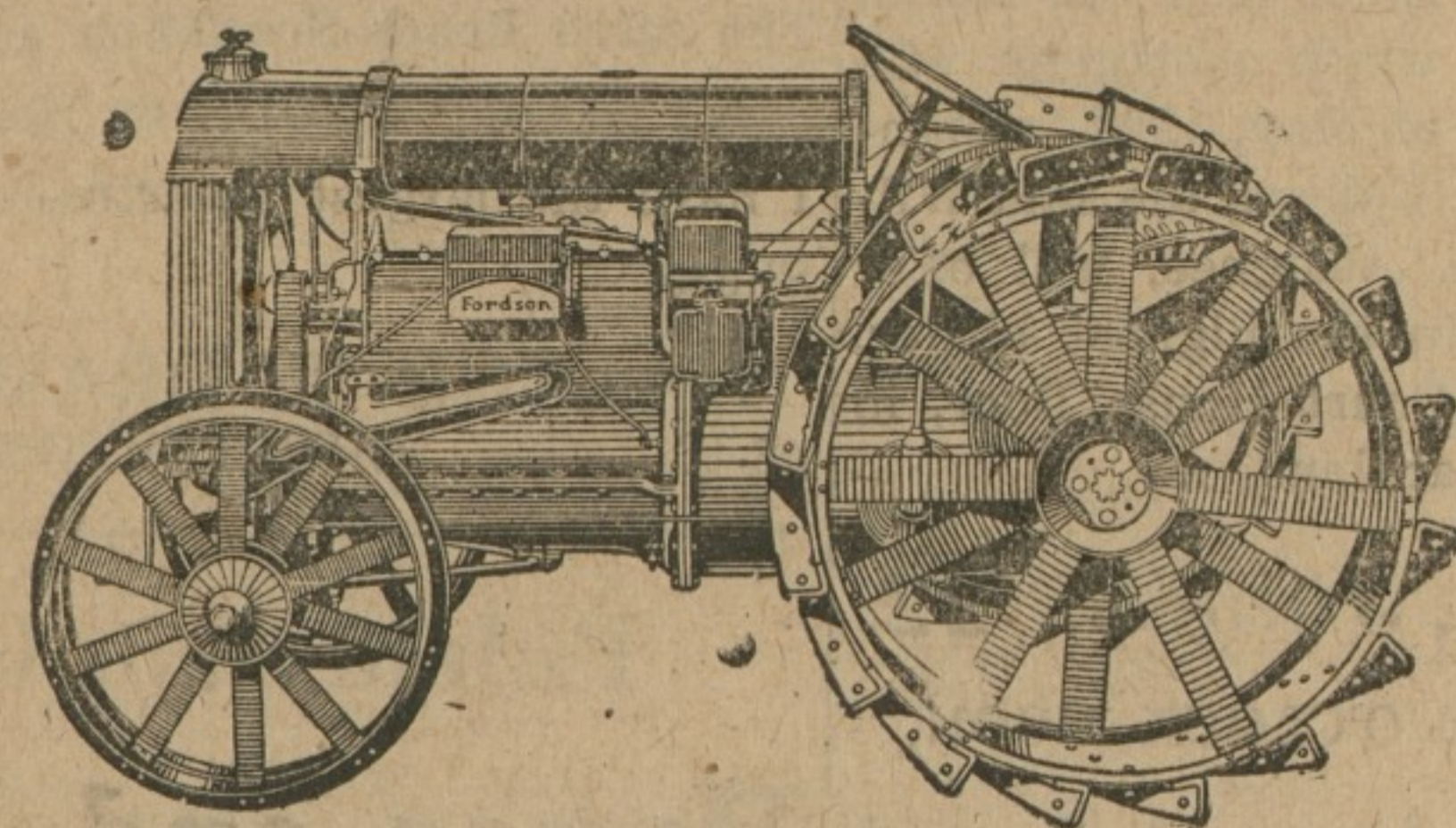

To Realize On Assets.

Receiver Perkins, with Henry A. Warburton and Henry L. Constable, who were appointed receivers of the estate of William T. Warburton, has taken over the properties of the late bank president and expert appraisers will come to Elkton and appraise the apple farm, near Pleasant Hill, on which, it is alleged, Warburton sunk the greater part of the bank's money. With a fair crop of apples this year, it is reported, the farm will bring from \$60,000 to \$70,000. The Gilpin Falls Electric Light Co., which was owned by Warburton and left to his sons, State's Attorney Henry A. Warburton and Charles A. Warburton, under a deed of trust, has not been taken over by the receivers. This action is still in the United States Court and an opinion of the court is being awaited by the receiver before it can be taken over with other Warburton properties. Should the decision be favorable to the receivers, the electric light plant may bring between \$75,000 and \$90,000.

From present reports in hands of the bank receiver, the depositors will probably receive about 60 cents on the dollar. The stockholders and directors of the institution will lose their investments and in addition be penalized an amount equivalent to their holdings of stock in the bank.

Suits Entered Against Signers Of Warburton Notes May Get Sixty Cents On The Dollar.

Receiver Thomas W. Perkins, of the Second National Bank of Elkton, which closed its doors on January 20, last, when Department of Justice agents and national bank examiners discovered the bank condition, has entered suit in the United States District Court, Baltimore, against State Road Commissioner Omar D. Crothers, Postmaster Oliver C. Giles, Frank Corriean, Calvin Fox, S. Ralph Andrews and Charles Biddle, each for \$6,000; Mrs. Andrew Bradley and Wilmer J. Falls, each for \$5,000, and numerous others for smaller amounts on promissory notes now held by the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond, Virginia.

These notes were accommodation notes given to the late William T. Warburton, president of the bank. The signers of the notes are contesting payment and the case will probably be called in the District Court about May 15.

Receiver Perkins, who is closing up the affairs of the wrecked institution, says the depositors of the bank are co-operating and helping him in every way possible to straighten out the tangled affairs and assisting in recovering some of the bank's assets. Up to the present time more than \$100,000 has been collected.

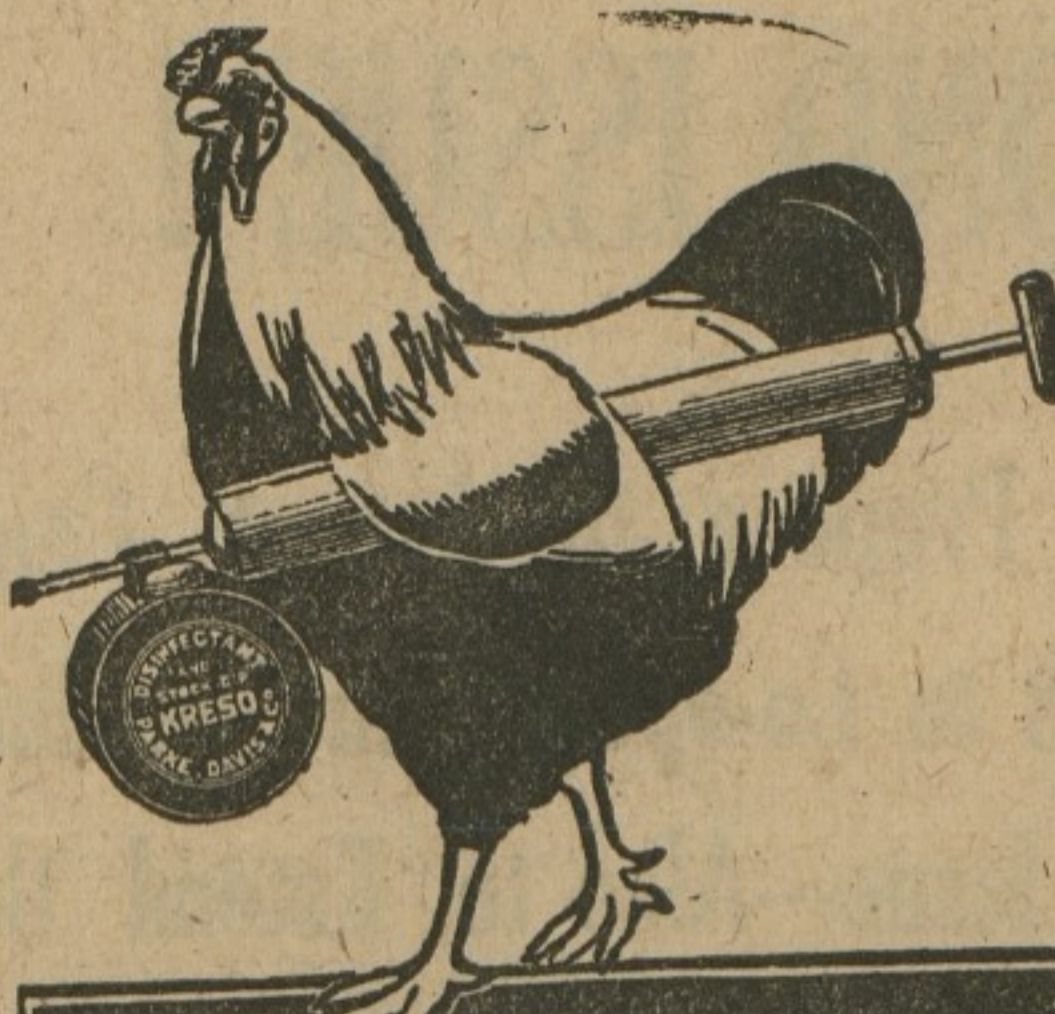
