WHY CHESTERTOWN SHOULD HAVE A CLEAN-UP WEEK

The Metropolitan Life Insurance Company of New York, through its local superintendent, Mr. Morris recently offered a prize of five dollars in gold to our local high school for the best essay of 500 words on the subject "Considerable interest of students entered the contest. The essays were judged by competent disinterested parties and the prize awarded to William Price, a member of the Senior class. We publish below the prize essay:

Why Chestertown Should Have A Clean-Up Week.

There are three main reasons why Chestertown should have a clean-up week. Namely: the protection afforded against fire, the bettering of the sanitary conditions, and the beautifying of the town.

A general clean-up of old rubbish piles, backyards, piles of lumber, and the removing of old broken-down dilapidated structures, while it would not absolutely prevent fire, would in a large measure help to do so, and with the very small and incompetent fire force that Chestertown has, it needs all the help it can get.

It is mainly in the poorer sections of towns, where the rubbish is abundant, and where sparks from an engine are more likely to catch, that fires start.

If this rubbish were removed, even if a fire were to start, it could not spread so fast or far.

The grounds around such places as the electric light plant, where there are a lot of old oily rags lying around,

and where spontaneous combustion is likely to result, should be cleaned up, and the menace removed.

The next reason for cleaning up would be the bettering of the sanitary conditions. There are many places in Chestertown where the sanitary conditions need bettering, but the place where it is needed most is of course, the negro section.

The negroes, living as they do, in rows of squalid tenements or in small dilapidated tumble down huts, where they have no adequate sewerage system and where dirt and rubbish quickly accumulate, are naturally very unsanitary.

Disease germs breed swiftly in these conditions, which are so favorable to them, and where the sun cannot get in to combat them. The negroes become infected with the germs, and carry them into the homes of the white people when they go to work.

This makes a large amount of unnecessary sickness and death, and the only way to end this is to get at the source of the trouble, and so remedy the conditions that an end will be put to it for good.

The sewerage system all over town should be bettered, and lines put in all the streets that do not have them.

A larger force of street cleaners should be employed so as to keep the streets and sidewalks clean.

The third reason for a clean-up week is the beautifying of the town. It is a well known fact that, taken as a whole, Chestertown is one of the ugliest and dirtiest towns for its size and wealth, on the Eastern Shore.

The streets are always dirty and almost all the side streets are too narrow, while very few of them are paved. Some of the streets are not tree lined, while in a great many the

trees have decayed, and new ones need to be planted in their place.

To sum up everything Chestertown should have a clean-up week in which every person should clean off all the rubbish from his premises, all the old stumps should be removed, and bonds be issued for the bettering of the sewerage system for the widening and paving of the streets and for the increase of the street cleaning force.

The people on each block should be urged to make their block the cleanest, most sanitary, and prettiest block in town.

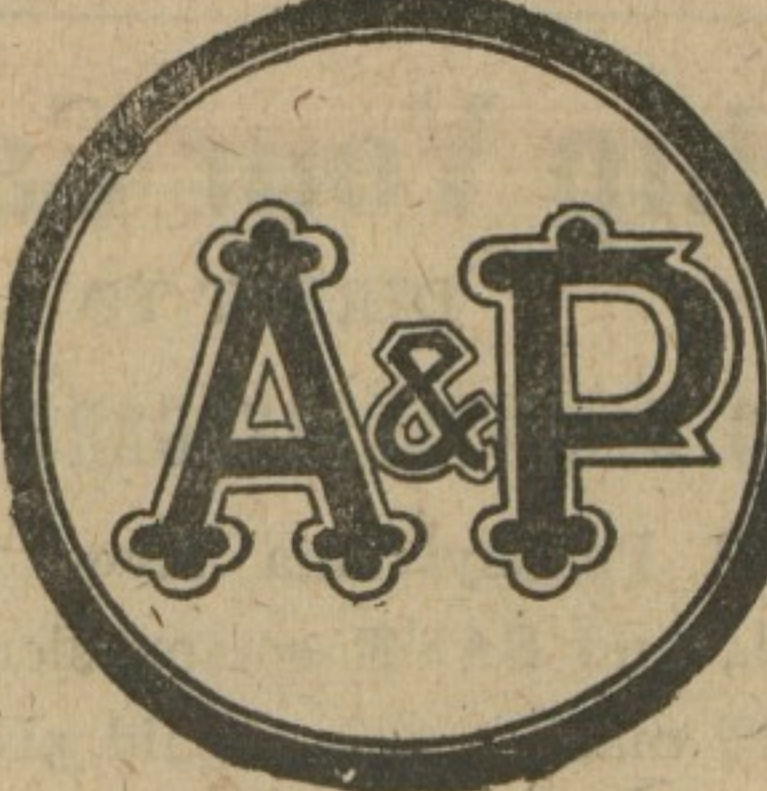

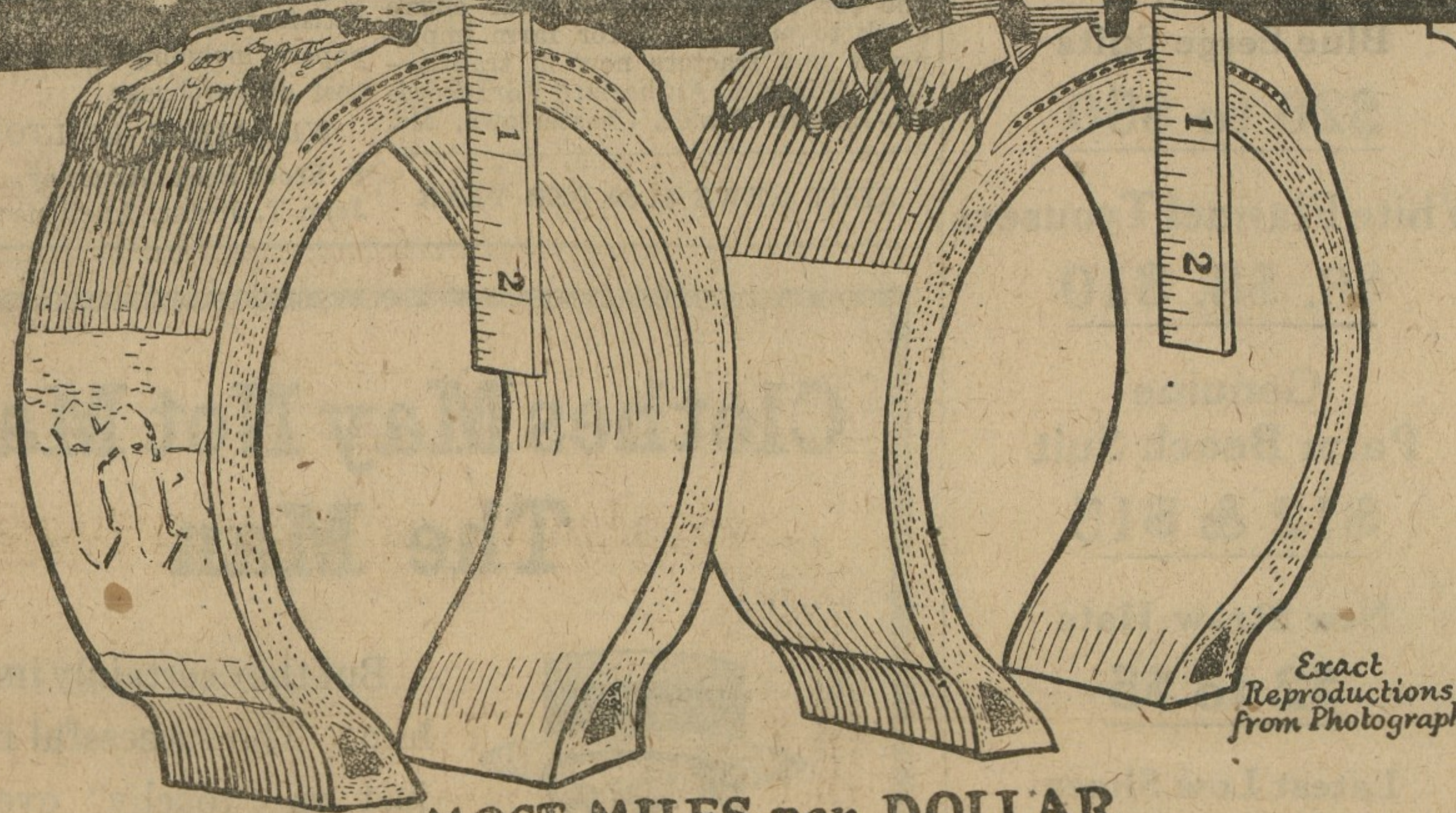
