CAVEAT FILED

To Will Of The Late Mrs. Joseph M. George.

The will of the late Mrs. Joseph M. George was offered for probate last Tuesday, and at the same time a caveat to the will was filed. This, of course held up the probate of the will by the Orphans' Court for Queen Anne's County.

By the terms of the will the farm known as "Rose Villa," or the John M. Sudler farm, was devised to Mrs. Elvira A. George, widow of the late John M. George, and their three children, the George home farm was devised to Joseph M. George, and the rest and residue of her property was devised to Mrs. Mattie G. Roe, Mrs. Annie G. Merrick, her children and the three children of John E. George, the children of John E. George to take their parents' share. This will was made on February 19th, 1919, and appointed James Merrick, Jr., Dudley G. Roe, and Joseph M. George executors.

Mrs. George made a codicil March 9th, 1922, in which she confirmed her will in all respects with the exception of the "Rose Villa" farm. In the codicil this farm is given to Mrs. Elvira Sudler for life and then to her three children, Elsie George Sudler, M. Madeline Young and Joseph M. George. The caveat was filed on behalf of Mrs. Mattie G. Roe and Mrs. James Merrick, Jr.

The attorneys filing the caveat were James Earle and T. Alan Goldsborough. Application was made for letters pendent lite by James Merrick, Jr., Dudley G. Roe and Joseph M. George.

LOWER POSTAGE RATE FOR PUBLICATIONS

Representative Kelly Proposes Relief For An Industry That Is Overburdened.

Washington, June 13. — Reduction of second-class postage rates, which were originally imposed as war taxes, and provided for in bill introduced in the House this week by Representative M. Clyde Kelly, Republican, of Pennsylvania. This bill is intended to give relief to the newspapers and magazines, which have made representations to Congress that the continuation of high postal rates seriously affected the entire publishing industry.

The Kelly bill would repeal the last two of the four increases in postal rates which were made under the war revenue law of 1917. Representative Kelly, in a statement issued today, pointed out that newspaper and magazine publishers of the country are in need of relief from this discriminatory war tax in order that the press may continue to serve the public. He stated that the proposed measure repeals the present zone system of postal charges, but reduces the amount of charge from the fourth advance effective July 1, 1921, to the second advance in rates, which became effective July 1, 1919. According to Mr. Kelly, the rates asked for would still give the Government 175 per cent more than the pre-war rates and would not relieve the publishing industry of one cent of the other Federal taxes paid by it in common with other industries.

"The present postage rates on newspapers and publications were fixed in the war revenue law passed in 1917, and are 325 per cent higher than the pre-war rates," said Representative Kelly. "Every one of the items carried in that measure, with the exception of the tax on second-class mail matter, has been modified or repealed. These war-time postage increases have driven millions of pounds of second class matter from the mail into private channels of distribution. There is something radically wrong when private companies can make a handsome profit at rates less than those charged in postage. I believe there is no good reason why the publishers of newspapers and magazines should be singled out to pay this extra war tax."

"The newspapers and other periodicals," continued Mr. Kelly, "are the very fountain source of first class and fourth class mail. They also perform an invaluable service in freely carrying messages of the postoffice and other departments of the government direct to the people. They are really selling agents for the government, but they get no commission on their sales. It is a common-sense policy to give them advantageous rates in the mail."

The bill has been referred to House Postoffice Committee, and hearings will be held at an early date.
