PROCLAMATION Proposing Amendments to the Constitution of the State, 1922

WHEREAS, at the January Session of the General Assembly of Maryland, held in the year 1922, five Acts were passed, providing for the amendment of the Constitution of the State, to-wit: Chapter 7, proposing an amendment to Section 2 of Article 3, title 2, Legislative Department; Chapter 20, proposing an amendment to Section 141, title 4, Legislative Department; Chapter 21, proposing an amendment to Section 227, proposing an amendment to the Constitution, to-wit: "Quadrennial Elections"; and Chapter 22, proposing an amendment to Section 14 of Article 15, title, "Miscellaneous"; and which said five Acts are in the words and figures following:

CHAPTER 7. AN ACT to propose an amendment to Section 2 of Article III, of the Constitution of the State of Maryland, to-wit: "Legislative Department," increasing the number of legislative districts of Baltimore City, and providing for the submission of said amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Maryland for adoption or rejection.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, three-fifths of all members of each of the two Houses concurring, that the following Section be and the same is hereby adopted as an amendment to Section 2 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Maryland, to-wit: "Legislative Department," increasing the number of legislative districts of Baltimore City, and providing for the submission of said amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Maryland for adoption or rejection.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, three-fifths of all members of each of the two Houses concurring, that the following Section be and the same is hereby adopted as an amendment to Section 141 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Maryland, to-wit: "Judicial Department," providing for the election of judges and county officers by qualified voters of the State, and providing for the submission of said amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Maryland for adoption or rejection.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, three-fifths of all members of each of the two Houses concurring, that the following Section be and the same is hereby adopted as an amendment to Section 227 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Maryland, to-wit: "Quadrennial Elections," providing for the election of members of the General Assembly by qualified voters of the State, and providing for the submission of said amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Maryland for adoption or rejection.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, three-fifths of all members of each of the two Houses concurring, that the following Section be and the same is hereby adopted as an amendment to Section 14 of Article 15 of the Constitution of the State of Maryland, to-wit: "Miscellaneous," providing for the election of members of the General Assembly by qualified voters of the State, and providing for the submission of said amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Maryland for adoption or rejection.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, three-fifths of all members of each of the two Houses concurring, that the following Section be and the same is hereby adopted as an amendment to Section 10 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Maryland, to-wit: "Judicial Department," providing for the election of judges and county officers by qualified voters of the State, and providing for the submission of said amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Maryland for adoption or rejection.

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
