FACTS IN THE NORRIS MURDER

Walter Scoelow, the last man wanted for murder of W. B. Norris, was caught on the busiest street in New York as he bought a Baltimore newspaper. He is the man charged with doing the shooting.

"Jack" Hart, the brains of the gang, was arrested in Washington. There are seven on trial for the murder or for complicity therein. The trial will begin in Baltimore next Tuesday before Judge James P. Gorter.

Harry B. Wolf, lawyer, has been presented on a conspiracy charge. Harry B. Wolf is on trial also as to disbarment from the Maryland State Bar.

As the first move in a round-up of all gangsters and crooks in Baltimore, Detectives Mintin and Cooney have arrested five men. They are: "Dave" Garman, alias "Dave" Harris, alias "Blackie"; New York pickpocket, Samuel Bernstein, alias "Percentage Sam"; New York gambler and hand-book man, Charles Gleason, alias "Dutch"; New York bandit, Milton Mills, New York Highwayman. Geo. Robertson, colored, pickpocket. Those arrested in the general round-up will be held until it is ascertained whether or not they are wanted in other cities. They will be then sent out of Baltimore.

FOUND DEAD IN HOTEL

Percy Downey, aged about 28, was found dead in Anchor Hotel, Baltimore, Wednesday. It was reported that he died from gas. The deceased was a son of Marion Downey, Rock Hall, and had been helping his father in the restaurant. He had \$40 with which he said he was going to the city to get a suit of clothes. He leaves a widow and one child. The internment took place at Rock Hall yesterday.

HAND OF DEATH

After a long illness, Miss Jeanette E. Gooding, died at the home of her sister-in-law, Mrs. W. L. Gooding, at Clayton, Tuesday afternoon. She leaves a mother in her 80th year, but remarkably active, four nephews and two nieces. For 36 years she had taught in the Chestertown High School as Vice-Principal, and also taught several years in the county. She was a grand teacher, a loyal cheer and an inspiration to all. Her teaching was not confined to the school room because on the Sabbath she taught a class and was effective as a Sunday school worker.

The deceased was a devoted member of the M. E. Church. She was also a charter member of the Chestertown Council Daughters of America, being their first counselor, and also a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

The funeral services were held at Galena M. E. Church yesterday morning at 10:30 and were attended by a large number of relatives and friends of Miss Gooding. All the teachers of the Chestertown public schools were present. Rev. A. P. Prettyman, Rev. N. O. Gibson, Rev. O. E. Jones and Rev. Mr. Sterling officiated. The floral tributes were beautiful. The Daughters of America of which she was a member, attended in a body and held special services at the grave.

Mrs. Mary McCauley Carroll, wife of Wm. H. Carroll, of Green Spring Valley, Baltimore County, formerly of this county, died Monday night about 9 o'clock at the home of her son, Francis, in Baltimore city, aged 56 years. She leaves a husband and five sons, namely, George A. Edw. A. of Kent county; Francis L. Wm. B. and Henry, of Baltimore, and seven daughters, Mrs. Olivia Fowler, of Kennedyville; Mrs. Nannie Jones, of Crumpton; Mrs. Helen Mazze, of Pittsburgh, Pa.; Mrs. Ethel Buckingham, of Baltimore; Miss Bessie, Bertha and Naomi, at home, Eccleston, Md. Funeral services were held in Baltimore. The body was brought to Kent by ferry on Thursday morning and buried in the family lot in Union Cemetery, Rev. E. W. Simms conducted the services at the grave. The bearers were her four sons, Geo. A. Edw. A., Frank L. and Wm. B. and two sons-in-law, Adam Fowler and Frank Jones; Wilbur Shriver, Baltimore, undertaker.

On September 13th, 1922, at 6:15 a. m., Miss Annie R. Deal, beloved daughter of the late George F. and Mary E. Deal, died at the home of her sister, Mrs. Martha I. Eccleston, 5 S. East Avenue, Baltimore, after a few weeks illness. She was of a lovable disposition and a faithful member of the M. P. Church. She is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Mamie Smith, widow of the late D. Wilson Smith, and Mrs. Martha Eccleston, at whose home she died. In all her illness she was a patient sufferer.

Funeral was held from her late home Saturday, September 16th, at 2 p. m., interment in Loudon Park cemetery. Miss Deal was well-known in Kent. She was a cousin to Mrs. John R. Hadaway, who with her husband attended the funeral.
