The soldiers' bill failed of enactment late Wednesday, the Senate sustaining President Harding's veto. Previously the House had overridden the veto by a large margin.

WAR CLOUDS THICKEN

The Eastern war situation grows more ominous. The Turks are wildly enthused by the victory over Greece, and this Moslem victory is creating an unrest that is spreading throughout Asia.

The British government has taken summary steps for the defence of the former Turkish capital. Troops have been mobilized to act with Serbian forces in a British fleet is prepared to defend the Dardanelles.

Such is the situation brought about by failure to deal promptly with the vengeful and bloody Turk at the right time. And the serious trouble may be only beginning.

PETITIONS CIRCULATED FOR CANDIDATES FOR JUDGE

Petitions are being circulated about Chestertown by friends of the candidates for the vacancy caused by the death of Judge Philemon B. Hopper as associate judge of the Circuit Court for the Second Judicial District.

It is reported that the majority of the members of the Talbot bar favor Frank Harper, of Centreville, and his fitness is appreciated by many here, but other candidates are said to be getting the endorsement of the local lawyers.

Thomas J. Keating, of Centreville, is favored by some; Omar Crothers, of Elkton, is spoken of; J. H. C. Legg and Edwin Brown, of Centreville, have people working in their behalf, and James S. Evans, Henry C. Westable and Emerson Crothers, of Cecil county, are also mentioned for the vacancy.

Talbot county has a member on the bench in Chief Judge William H. Adkins, and Kent has Judge Lewin W. Wickes. Caroline county is the only county in the circuit that has not been represented on the bench for 100 or more years.

T. Alan Goldsborough now Congressman, was a candidate against Judge W. H. Adkins, but lost. Judge G. M. Russum, of Denton, served two years through appointment by Governor Lowndes, and this is the only representative Caroline county has had in a century or more.

For the past few days persons interested in the various candidates have visited here and sought the endorsements.

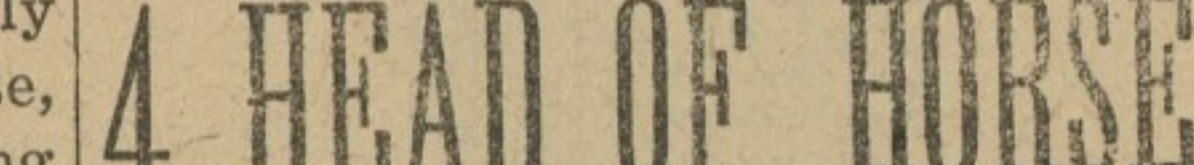

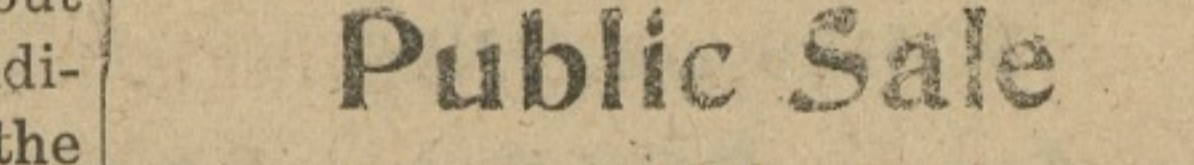
