TREASURER'S OCTOBER SITTINGS

In pursuance of an Act of Assembly passed at the session of 1891, Chapter 292, the undersigned, Treasurer of Kent county, hereby gives notice that for the purpose of receiving the STATE AND COUNTY TAXES in said county for the year 1922 he will sit for the October Sittings in the several Election Districts as follows:

- October 4—Millington from 1 to 3 at the store of Leonard Wilson.
October 5—Berterson from 10 to 12. Same day from 1 to 3 at Still Pond.
October 6—Rock Hall from 10 to 12. Same day from 1 to 3 at Fairlee.
Oct. 11—From 1 to 3 at Pomona.

At all other times will be at the Treasurer's Office in Chestertown. The Treasurer's Office in the Court House will be open every day except on the above dates from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. for the receipt of taxes. Tax payers will please take notice that taxes will be due and payable Sept. 1, and that on all bills unpaid on Jan. 1, interest will be charged and collected from September 1. On the first day of January all taxes unpaid are declared by law to be in arrears, and delinquents are warned that unless settlement in full is made before April 1st, the Treasurer of the county will proceed to seize and sell their property to pay taxes due with charges and all costs of sale. SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION IN BALTIMORE

The greatest event of the year in the field of religious education in Maryland will take place in Baltimore October 18, 19 and 20, when the 18th Annual Convention of the Maryland Sunday School Association will be held, with its headquarters in the First Methodist Episcopal Church and radiating therefrom to four other churches.

The largest number of Sunday school workers ever assembled in Maryland will be in attendance. The convention last year was the largest to date, with 1349 enrolled delegates. More than 2000 are expected this year. The convention will occupy four other churches besides First Church. Sessions will be held at Associate Congregational Church, St. Michael and All Angles' Protestant Episcopal, St. Mark's Lutheran Church and St. John's Methodist Protestant Church.

The program will include more than 50 speakers from various States—New York, Illinois, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Maryland, Delaware and the District of Columbia. The speakers will include Sunday School specialists, statesmen, clergymen, educators and business men.

Wednesday evening, October 18th, a great pageant entitled "The Lamp" will be presented in the Associate Congregational Church. One hundred and eighty people will participate.

Thursday evening two great simultaneous sessions will be held with reversed program.

WILL OF JUDGE PHILEMON B. HARPER

The last will and testament of Judge Philemon B. Harper, for fifteen years' Associate Judge of the Second Judicial Circuit has been filed for probate in the Orphans' Court for Queen Anne's county. It follows:

First. I hereby declare that the three cattle, the vehicle in the carriage house, on my land on Kidwell Avenue, Centerville, all the household and kitchen furniture and furnishings, including silverware, chinaware, glassware, cutlery, bed clothes, table linen, toilet linen, and everything else, in my dwelling house and kitchen, on said avenue, except the desk, typewriter, table, revolving chair, iron safe, law books and book case, in the room I use as office, belong to my wife and I do not intend or attempt to dispose of the same in this will, but I give and bequeath absolutely to my wife, Mary E. Hopper, all the office furniture I have mentioned above and everything else in and about the said house that may be mine, except the contents of my iron safe.

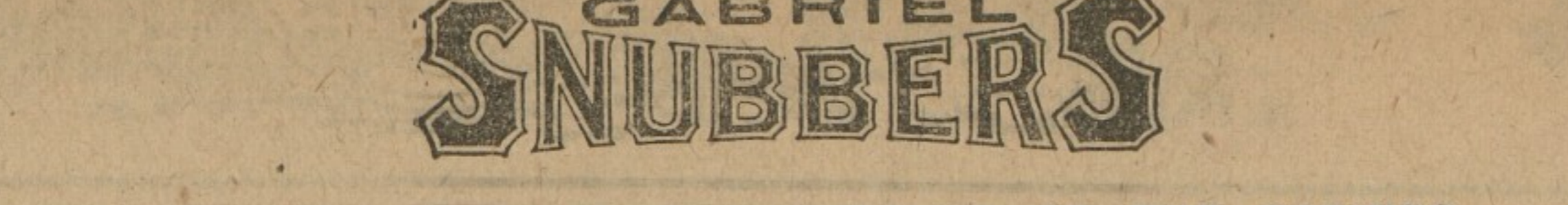
Second. I give, bequeath and devise all the rest and residue of my property and estate, real, personal and mixed, unto Thomas J. Keating, of Queen Anne's county, State of Maryland, in trust, to pay the whole income therefrom, as it accrues, to my wife, Mary E. Hopper, if she be not in health to receive it, and if she be not, to expend the whole of it for her maintenance and support and for her comfort, pleasure and health, so long as she shall live; I have left it in trust for her only because she is at this time, in a state of health in which she could not manage it for herself, and I want it to support her as long as she may live, if it can be made to do so by careful management and the judicious use of the income and corpus for such purpose. If any part of the estate is left unexpended for her at the time of her death, I give such remainder to my sisters, Mary H. Thompson and Frances S. McFeely, and to her sister, Miss Nannie P. Keating, to each of them a full one-third part thereof. I make this gift to Miss Keating as a token of my appreciation of her loving care of my wife and the many sacrifices she has made for her during the many years of her impaired health. My only regret is that it is so inadequate.

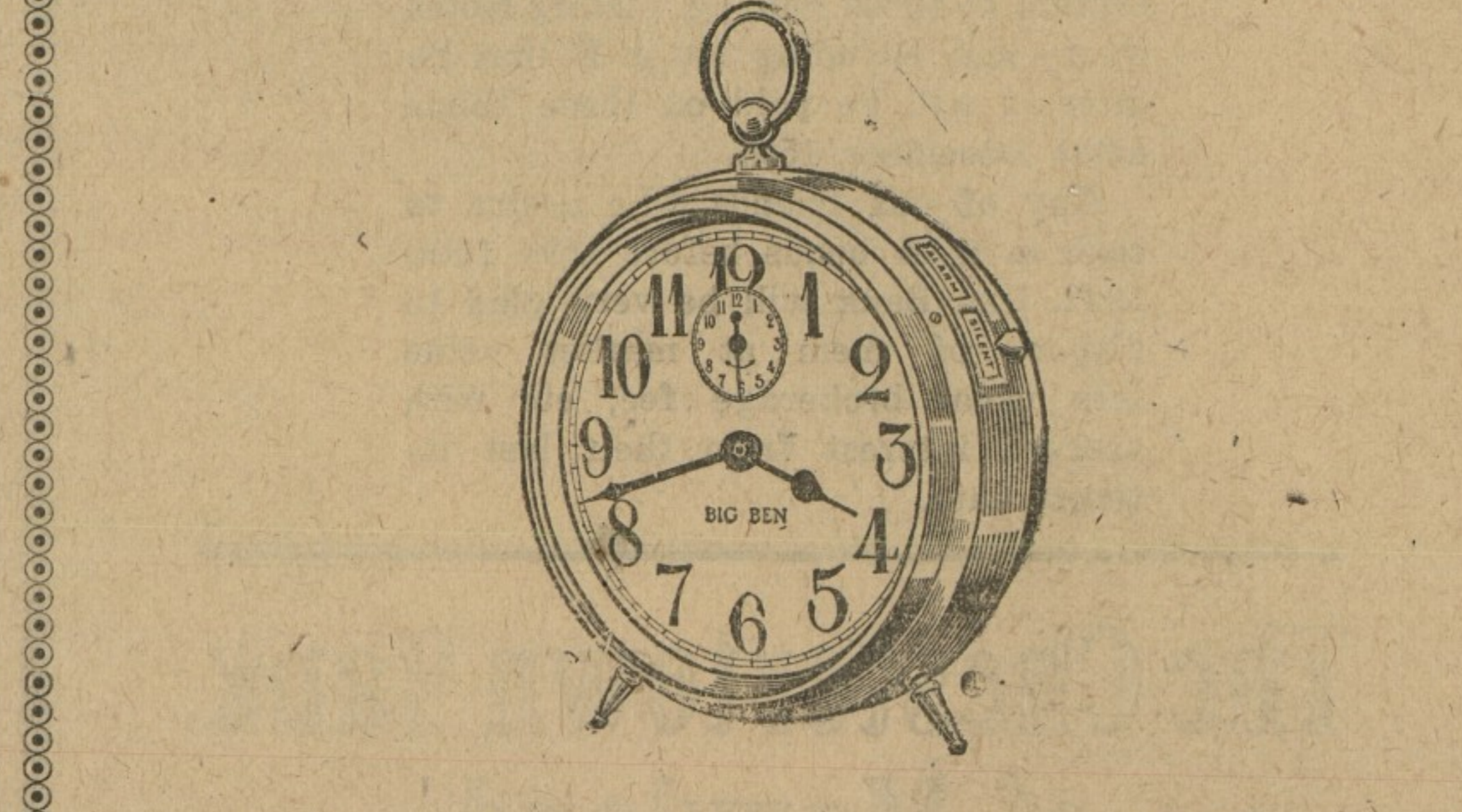

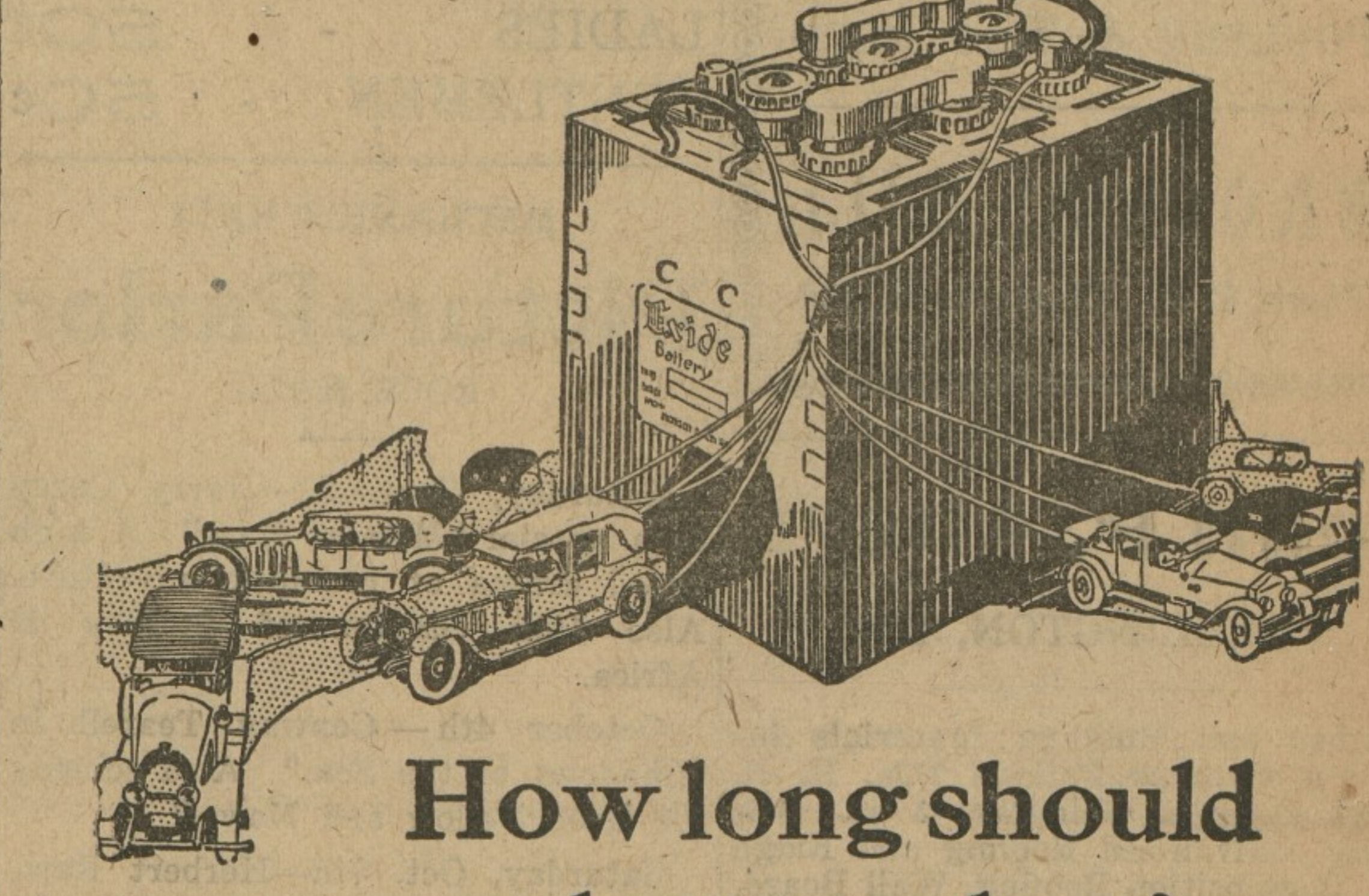

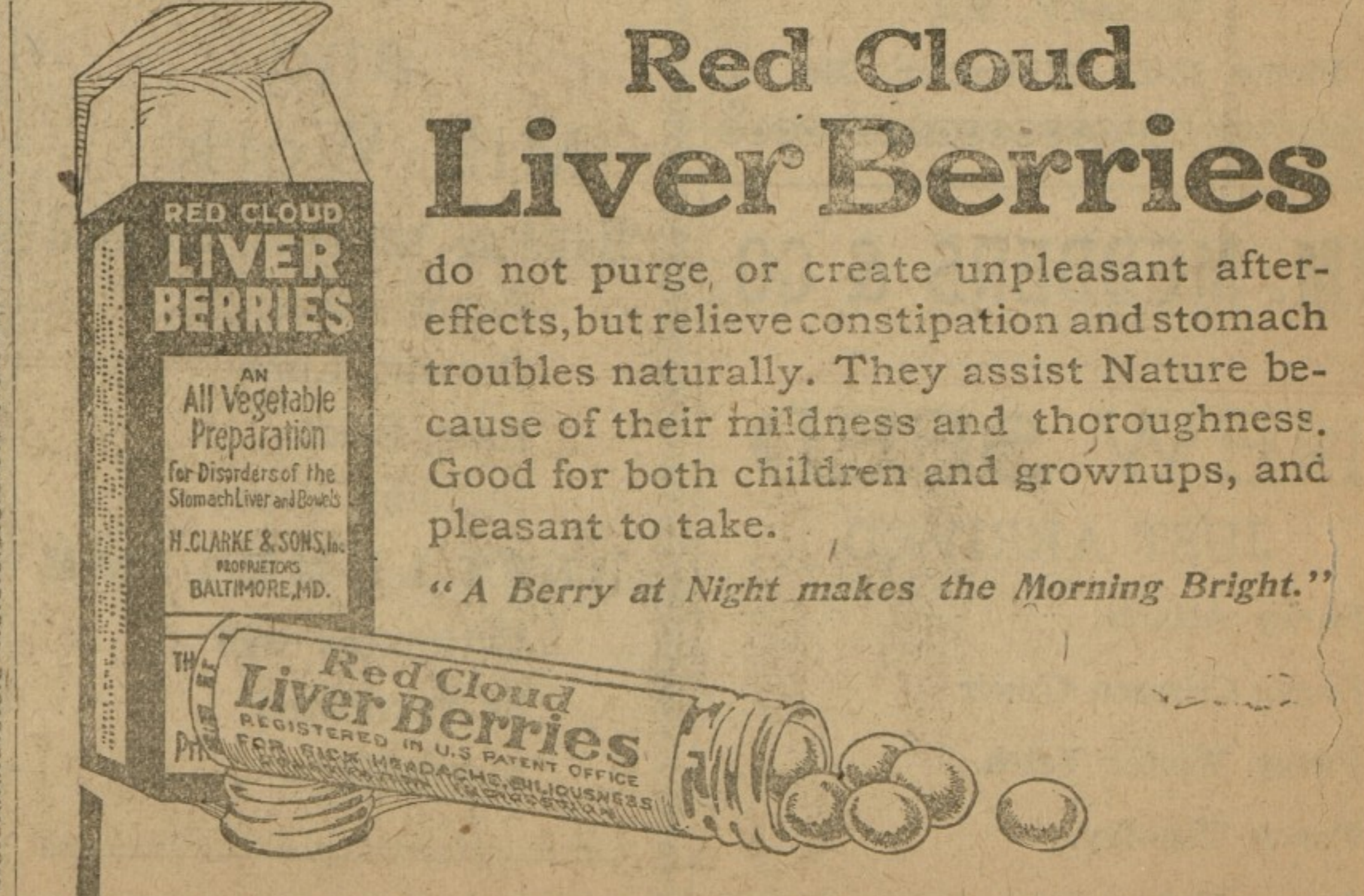
