Large Crowd Heard Lecture Under Auspices Of P. M. Brooks.

That the poultrymen of Chestertown and vicinity, showed their appreciation of the combination lecture, moving pictures and drawings that P. M. Brooks gave at the Firemen's Hall a week ago last Friday, was attested by the wonderful attendance, and, from expressions heard, this meeting was very enjoyable as well as constructive to the poultry raiser. The lecture given by John W. Johnson, alias Bill Jones, Editor, Poultry Department, Camden Courier, formerly of Still Pond, Md., whose subject was "What the Poultry Raisers of South Jersey Are Doing" no doubt will be beneficial as New Jersey has been considered the mecca of the poultry raiser in the east.

The moving pictures were furnished by the Poultry Service Department of The Quaker Oats Company. The reels, "Culling and Selecting Poultry for Egg Production," by Dr. O. B. Kent, will be of value to those who wish to cull their flocks. The tour of the larger poultry plants throughout the east impressed the audience as to the possibilities of the poultry industry. GEORGE E. NOLAND DIES

Deaths Of Other Well-Known Kent County Citizens Take Place This Week

George E. Noland died at his home in Chestertown yesterday morning. His death is a shock to the whole county. He had been sick for several weeks, but his friends hoped he was improving. Yesterday morning he walked into another room when he suddenly collapsed and died in a short time. His physicians, Dr. F. W. Smith and Dr. H. G. Simpers were with him when he died.

Mr. Noland was well thought of and known all over Kent county. He was one of our prominent and successful merchants and having been superintendent of Tolchester Beach for so many years met thousands of people who will hear of his death with much sorrow. He was president of the Board of Supervisors of Election for Kent County. In all walks of life he was a man highly esteemed by his fellow men. He was 66 years of age and leaves a widow, who was Miss Bramble, and one son, Conlyn E. Noland, who is in business with his father. Also a large number of other relatives.

The funeral will be private but the time had not been decided upon when we went to press yesterday afternoon.

Mrs. Mary A. Wilkins, widow of the late E. Mifflin Wilkins, died at her home "The Maples," near Chestertown, Tuesday. She would have been 81 years of age on March 31.

The deceased was one of the best known and most generally esteemed of Kent's elderly citizens, as well as one of the most successful agriculturists in the county.

Mrs. Wilkins in many ways was a remarkable woman. Not only was she the head of a large family of four fine daughters and noble son, but in the business of farming she was most successful. In fact few women in Kent county have made the fine record that she has. As a member and attendant of Bond Chapel she has been one of its most zealous supporters and she will be greatly missed. In every walk of life she has shone and left impress for good upon the whole community.

She is survived by the following children: Mrs. Wm. D. Hines, of Baltimore. Mrs. T. Blackiston Perkins, of Philadelphia; Misses Jerome and Grace and Edward M. Wilkins, at home.
