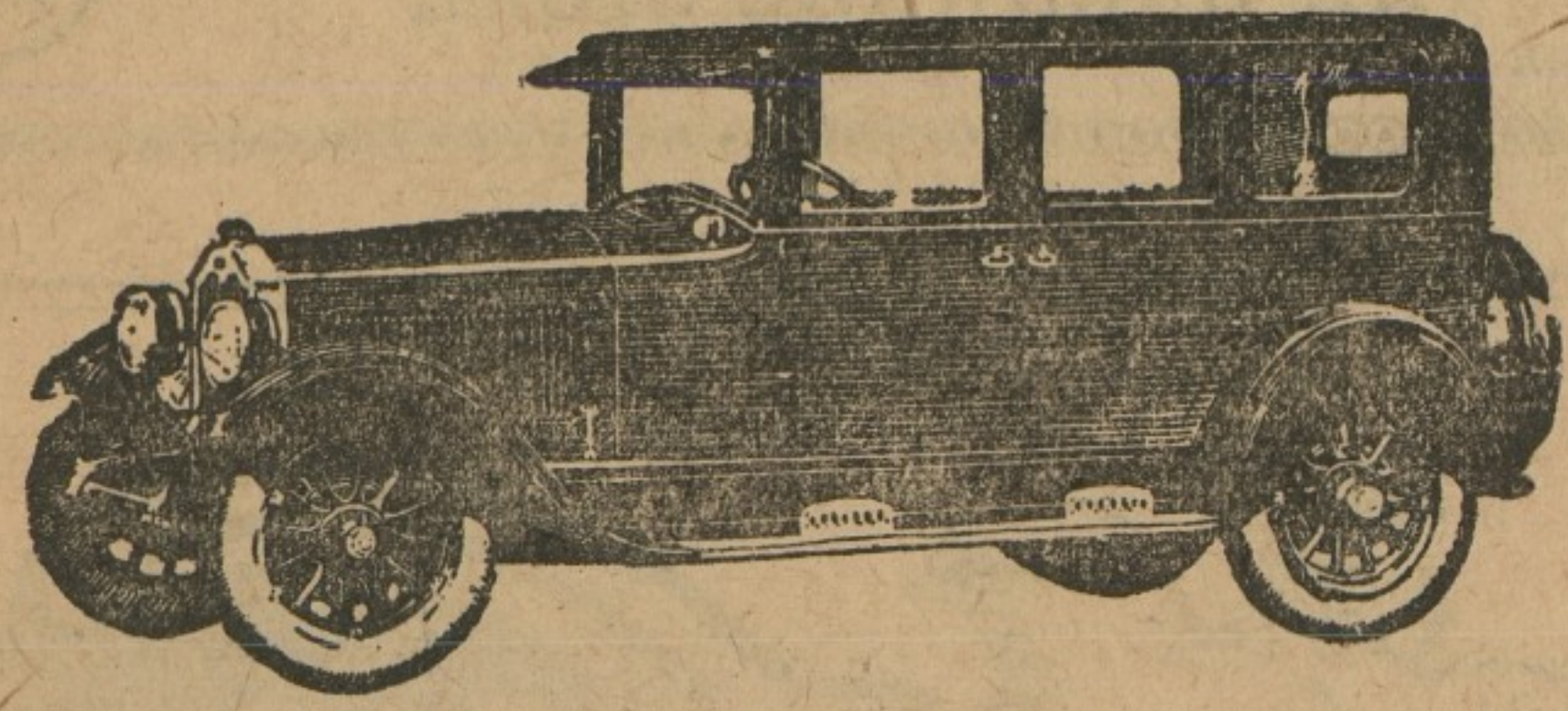

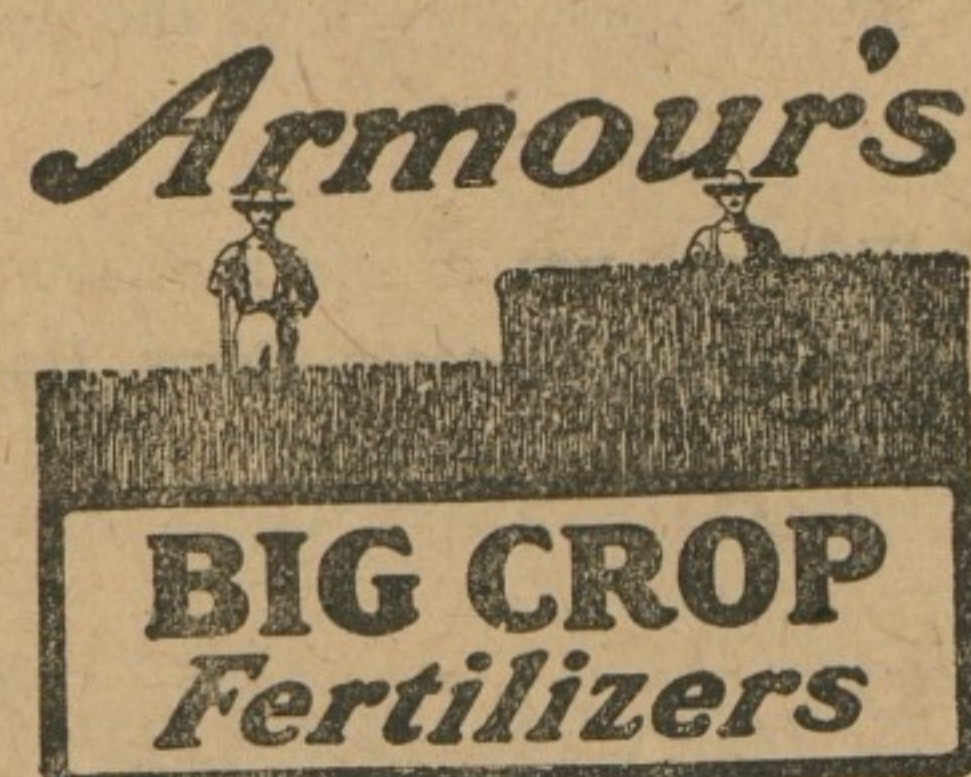

POTATOES DROP IN PRICE

The potato growers in this county have been hard hit by the slump in the price of potatoes.
One grower, living near Chestertown, during the past week culled his crop carefully and packed them nicely in baskets, taking several truck loads to Wilmington, where they were sold to commission merchants. When the grower received the returns for the sales he found that he had netted just eight cents a basket for the lot sold. He had been holding his crop since last fall in the hope that prices would be better in the spring.
Another grower, near Kennedyville, who grew perhaps the largest crop in Kent county, placed the bulk of his crop in cold storage last fall to await better prices.

WASHINGTON COLLEGE GRADUATE OF 1805 DISCOVERED

While exploring some ancient encyclopedias in the Pratt Library in Baltimore, Dr. Albertus Perry, Vice-president of Washington College, recently unearthed the hitherto overlooked life history of one of Washington's most illustrious sons and one of the last century's most distinguished Methodist churchmen.

It appears that the Rt. Rev. John Emory, the tenth Bishop of the Methodist Church, was born in Spangler's Neck, Queen Anne's county, and, as he states in his autobiographical note, "on the left bank of the Chester River on the Eastern Shore of Maryland." He took some private school work in Eastern where he prepared for college. His father having four sons, chose for each his life career; merchant, farmer, physician and lawyer, John had, it seems, been picked for the last named profession and, to that end, he was graduated from Washington College in 1805. The Rev. Colin Ferguson, a Protestant Episcopal clergyman, was at that time president of the institution and John Emory speaks very highly of him in the autobiography. On graduating, he entered the law office of Richard Tighman Earle, of Centreville, and was admitted to the bar in 1808. But he never practiced the legal profession, having subsequently made the decision to enter the ministry. The Methodist Church South and the Methodist Protestant Church had at that time, of course, not been organized. Mr. Emory joined the Philadelphia Conference in 1810 and began preaching in Cambridge, Letter, while pastor at Annapolis. St. John's College honored him with the degree of Master of Arts. Three years later his Alma Mater recognized his unusual scholarship by conferring upon him the degree of Doctor of Divinity. In the church he became very prominent in furthering its educational program and he was, in consequence of his activities along this line, offered the presidency of several colleges. These offers he declined.

He took an active and official interest in the Methodist Book Concern which lately has become the largest book store in the world. In 1832 he was elevated to the episcopacy and served three years when he was accidentally killed while journeying from his Eastern Shore farm to Baltimore. The church owes him much. The story of his life, written by his son in 1840, is most fascinating reading and any student either of the church or of education would find it inspiring and profitable.
The Methodist Church also owes a debt of gratitude to Washington College for of the one hundred and eleven bishops of that great denomination, the tenth was a product of the farm and of the only college on the Eastern Shore.
