

KENT INTERESTED IN NATIONAL GUARD

Should the deficiency appropriation bill to pay National Guardsmen be held up by President Coolidge, there is a strong possibility that the work of Chestertown Sanitary Unit of the National Guard may be seriously handicapped, according to the opinion of Major Frank B. Hines, who states that should the bill be cast aside, the Chestertown boys will not get their pay for weekly drills. If drills should continue in that event, it would only be due to the initiative of the National Guard. The local members have a bright outlook before them and it is hoped that nothing will occur to mar their progress.

The annual encampment of the Guard for 1925 will begin on July 26, and will be held at Virginia Beach. The expense of this training will be borne by the State, so the outcome of the deficiency bill now up, will not effect it in any way. Effect of the President's economy move however, in declining to allow the \$1,322,000 deficiency will vary in the several States, according to the number of National Guardsmen and the number of drills held regularly. In some localities drills are every week; in others every two weeks.

Since the above was put in type President Coolidge has agreed to allow pay for 48 drills a year.

Make It Negligible This Year

If you have not been immunized within the last two years against typhoid fever, Dr. John S. Fulton, Director of the State Department of Health, urges you to go to your physician and have it done. The vaccine will be furnished free of charge by the State Department of Health and your physician can get his supply either directly from the office of the Department in Baltimore, or from the local health officer. If it is not convenient for you to go to your own physician, the local or the deputy health officer will vaccinate you against the disease.

One of the most reliable gauges of the up-to-dateness of any community, according to Dr. Fulton, is its record in regard to typhoid fever. "A decline in typhoid fever," he says, indicates state and community activity, on the one side—protection of water supplies from pollution; protection of food supplies from contamination; care in detecting the presence of 'carriers'—supplemented by personal intelligence on the other side.

The Supreme Court of the United States recently rendered three very important decisions that will help wonderfully in the enforcement of the 18th Amendment. One of these decisions is to the effect that automobiles engaged in the illegal transportation of liquor may be searched without a warrant, where there is probable cause to believe that the law is being violated. The officer needs no longer to rush off and secure a warrant when he sees an automobile that he has cause to suspect is transporting liquor. He can search it and hold the offender and the automobile if he finds the liquor aboard. Another decision holds that the States may under their police powers pass laws making it unlawful for any one to possess liquor acquired legally before the 18th Amendment was ratified. The other enables State courts to try offenders under the Volstead law. Under this decision, as we understand, a person who violates the Volstead law prohibiting the possession or transportation of any quantity of liquor, no matter how small, can be tried in a State court.

Senator John S. McDaniel, president of John S. McDaniel & Co., incorporated, local canned goods brokers, comments on the item in the Kent News in reference to the action taken at the recent big tomato meeting. He says, "No sales have been made at prices named except for early quality or preferred brands. 95 cents for No. 2s and \$1.35 for No. 3s were the prices named." He says, "If farmers were to take more thought to the growing of a large yield per acre and were to give good business attention to the purchasing of proper seed and the right kind of fertilizer, and to intelligent continuous attention to the cultivation of the soil, tomatoes would afford them a fine profit at twenty-five cents per basket, which is \$15 a ton."

"The average yield per acre in Indiana is eight tons. The average yield per acre in California is fourteen tons. At every canning house in Maryland and Delaware there are one or more farmers who produce eight or more tons per acre every year. "If farmers in Maryland and Delaware would produce, as they well might do, an average of eight tons to the acre, this would mean \$125 per acre, so that it might seem that the representatives of the Maryland Farm Bureau Federation would better undertake to devote an exchange of views at their meetings to producing a higher yield per acre than to discussing subjects with which they are unfamiliar and which their resolution shows they have handled very crudely and in the main with lack of proper information."

Senator McDaniel's advice is all right but the Kent farmer is not as ignorant as he thinks. He is interested in the price as well as the yield per acre. He is also well posted on the market.
