CONFERENCE NOTES

The Conference, at the closing session, in McCabe Memorial Church, Monday, decided to raise an endowment fund of \$150,000 for conference claimants. Rev. George F. Jones was selected to take charge of the collection, being named field secretary of the committee at an annual salary of \$3,500.

Only four Wilmington churches were affected by the pastoral changes announced.

New pastors were assigned to the following Wilmington churches: Harrison Street, Rev. J. L. Johnson; McCabe, Rev. W. E. Harrison, Jr.; Silverbrook, Rev. R. C. Jones; Eastlake, Rev. E. W. McDowell.

Mr. Johnson has been at Crisfield, Md.; Mr. Harrison comes from Baltimore; Mr. McDowell from Middletown; Mr. Jones from Denton, Md.

Rev. W. E. Habbert was transferred from Harrison Street Church, Wilmington, to Cambridge, Md.

Rev. Wm. L. White has resigned from the Wilmington Conference. He has just closed the third year as pastor at Bridgeville, and his forty-ninth year as a preacher of the Methodist Episcopal Church. A few days ago Rev. Mr. White observed his seventy-second birthday. He and his wife will make their home in Easton, Md., where Rev. Mr. White served eight years. His former parishioners presented him with a \$100 purse.

Rev. O. E. Jones was confined for several days to his bed with a severe cold during conference.

The plan for the unification of Northern and Southern Churches of the Methodist Episcopal denomination, was adopted by a vote of 103 to 15.

Immediately after this overwhelming vote had been cast the conference voted, 84 to 24, to reject the plan giving lay delegates equal powers with ministers.

While the Wilmington conference enthusiastically adopted the unification plan, members of the M. E. Church South Conference, in session in Washington, D. C., rejected the proposal by a vote of 141 to 137.

Final action of the unification plan will be determined by a three-quarters majority vote of the total membership of all annual conferences of the denominations.

The Rev. G. T. Alderson, of the bureau of session, presented a resolution whereby the bureau will allow each minister the sum of \$3 for entertainment at each day of conference. Following the adoption of this resolution, the Rev. W. G. Harris, of Elkton, who had intended to invite the conference to his church next year, announced he could not extend the invitation. Elkton, he said, could not provide boarding houses.

The statistical report for the conference showed a membership of 57,314; Sunday-school students, 58,664; Epworth League members, 10,342; value of 176 parsonages, \$688,200. During the year the report disclosed \$96,584 was paid on old indebtedness and \$204,054 was paid on buildings with a present indebtedness of \$260,687.

The Maryland Annual Conference convened in Hampden Church, Baltimore, Wednesday. Dr. G. I. Humphreys was re-elected president. The appointments will be read Monday night.

Rev. Dr. F. T. Little, pastor of Evergreen Church, asked to be granted the supernuante relation. Dr. Little gave as his reason his advanced years and his physical condition. Dr. Little, who is 73 years old, has been in the pulpit for fifty-five years. He was ordained fifty-three years ago. He served five years as president of the Maryland Conference and was a representative to the General Conference nine times. At the session on Thursday he was re-elected a member of the board of conference trustees, in which position he served several years. Others elected to the board are: The Rev. Dr. G. W. Hadaway, the Rev. J. H. Straughn, J. H. Roberts and Fred. G. Usilton.
