H. W. Bickers, Esq., assignee, sold at public sale Tuesday in Chestertown the Norman E. Ford farm, near Massey, to Samuel M. Ford for \$8,000. This farm contains 186 acres.

Announcement was made last week by the Girard Bank, Philadelphia, that they would buy all stock of the Phoenix Portland Cement Co. at \$85. This company was a subsidiary of the R. L. Dollings Company, and the stock was originally sold in this county for \$100 per share.

With the strong sentiment already aroused in and about Clayton for an extension of the concrete paving from Clayton town limits thru Blackiston's Cross Roads to the Maryland line at Millington comes the good news of a contract by the Maryland State Highway Department of a concrete road 2.34 miles long between Sudlersville and Millington, \$43,290.

Reports that many shad and hering fishermen were found violating the law by having their seines stretched half way across streams in the upper section of the bay and in Chester river. Capt. S. F.
