GOOD MUSIC AT ALL PERFORMANCES

KILLED BY LIGHTNING
John Henry Young, aged 44, a well-known colored tenant farmer, of near Chestertown, in Queen Anne's was instantly killed by lightning on Sunday afternoon. The farm adjacent to Charles McKee and is owned by Harvey Cooper. Mr. McKee says he walked over to Young's after the storm and looking in the window saw the man lying on the floor. He went in and upon investigation found him dead. The bolt had shattered the window and other parts of the room. The man had a burned place on his forehead and his mouth seemed to be unnatural as if the result of paralysis. Mr. McKee thinks the man was sitting in a chair at the window when the bolt came and knocked him dead to the floor.

PUBLIC SCHOOL COSTS
The annual meeting of the County Commissioners of the Eastern Shore was held Monday at Salisbury, and many interesting and constructive discussions as to better management took place.

The chief items discussed at the meeting were: County Nurse and Demonstration Agent; Co-operative Buying; Are the Taxpayers satisfied with the present system of running the public schools? Should the County have the right to select the routes of lateral and post roads? New Sources of Revenue.

Considerable comment was passed upon the system of the expense of running the public schools and at the next meeting of the Association it is planned to have Albert S. Cook, State Superintendent of Schools, present for the purpose of hearing the school's side of the question.

The principal address of the morning session by Ex-Governor Emmerson G. Hartington, of Cambridge, Md. Having declared that the counties on the Eastern Shore should "pool their interests" and strive in close harmony to bring about a rich development of all their resources. Cooperation was the keynote for success along these lines, he said.

Elected Mayor of Mannington, W. Va.
Ex-Senator Henry Brown's son-in-law, Fred A. Bury, has been elected Mayor of Mannington, W. Va. This is a city of over 5,000 population. Mr. Bury beat his opponent over 2 to 1. While there was no politics in the election Mr. Bury is a staunch Democrat and his election as head of this bustling little city is quite an honor. We congratulate him and wish him a successful term of office.

KITTY WOODALL SOLD
Capt. Wm. H. Cooper, of Buck Neck, has purchased of Woodall & Welch, of Georgetown, Md., the power boat "Kitty Woodall," and placed her in service. This boat is of 200-ton capacity, 100 horse-power and will carry 10,000 baskets of tomatoes. He will put her on the Buck Neck route and have a line of trucks to connect with same. Capt. George T. Cooper will pilot the steamer. In last week's News was noted the sale of the E. T. Summers for \$11,000. Another boat owned by Capt. Cooper was the Margaret Atkinson which has also been sold to Capt. Lewis, of Cambridge.

It is reported that the Kitty Woodall sold for about \$7,500. She has a contract to freight a thousand tons of cement for Piney Neck road at once. Captain Cooper offers her services to the public in a card in this issue.

Harry Clay Brown has sold recently to New Jersey parties a lot of beautiful box wood from his farm near Capt. Lewis, of Cambridge. Some of it was nearly a hundred years old. Large trucks were used in transferring it. While the price is not made public it is reported to be around \$4,000.

Samuel Russell Whorrel died Friday at his home near St. Paul's P. E. Church, aged 46 years. He leaves a widow, Mrs. Mary Pearl Whorrel, and one sister and two brothers. Funeral was held Monday, services conducted by the Rev. N. O. Gibson; interment in Chester Cemetery. The pall bearers were J. Frank Leaverton, Harry Perry, Charles Atkinson, Claude Bryden, Noble Middleton and E. L. LeSage, Undertaker, Charles L. Dodd.

The body of a man was found on Tuesday afternoon on the shore below Betterton. Coroner Dodd after viewing the remains found papers on his clothes giving the name as Capt. Samuel Charles, of Baltimore. He was captain of the ill fated Woodall the boat that was burned opposite Betterton on December 8th. The remains were taken in charge by undertaker B. R. Fellows and removed to Still Pond and prepared for burial. The remains were identified by Capt. Charles' son, as his father and taken to Baltimore Thursday morning on the Ericsson boat. Burial in Western Cemetery, Baltimore, undertaker, B. R. Fellows.

John Walter Smith, Democratic National Committee man, former U. S. Senator, Governor of Maryland from 1900 to 1904 and "dean" of Maryland Democrats, died at 7.30 O'clock Sunday night at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Arthur D. Foster, 830 University Parkway, Baltimore. The end came peacefully to the man, who, since the death of Arthur Pue Gorman, had been the dominant figure in Maryland politics.

Eighty years old last February 5, his heart was unable to stand the strain of a kidney affection, from which he suffered for the last two weeks. He had a sinking spell yesterday morning and failed gradually until the end.

At his bedside, besides physicians, were Mrs. Foster and Samuel K. Dennis, his former secretary and his devoted friend. The former Senator's mind was clear until a few hours before the end, when he lapsed into semi-coma.

Senator Smith was buried beside his wife at Snow Hill, his birthplace, Wednesday afternoon. Services also were held at 4 p. m. Tuesday at Mrs. Foster's home.

The life of Senator Smith was the romance of a country boy of old Maryland stock, early left an orphan with slender means, who rose by business and political acumen to fill, in turn, the highest offices in the gift of the people of his State. He has been president of the State Senate, Governor, member of the House of Representatives and United States Senator, as well as National Committeeman.

The outstanding characteristic in the life of Hon. John Walter Smith was his loyalty to his friends. Once a friend, always a friend, thru all the vicissitudes of life. Deprived of a mother's care in babyhood, losing his father while still a small boy, going for a limited period to school and this through the kindly offices of his father's best friend, he began working for wages at the age of sixteen in a store in his native village of Snow Hill.

He worked through every one of the more than three score years to gain a foothold in business, then to serve his county and the State he loved.

As State Senator, President of the State Senate, Governor and United States Senator, member of the Democratic National Committee, for decades the leader of his party on the Eastern Shore and throughout the State, his political life was full of color and action.

Men learned to rely upon him. He was the kind of man who could be depended upon to make good in any undertaking.

May his mantle fall on a man equally as high minded and with a loyalty to match his.

New Chrysler Goes Overboard

Daniel T. Bowers, of Easton, was returning from Baltimore last Friday afternoon via the Bay Shore-Rock Hall Ferry. His automobile was the last car on the ferry at Bay Shore, consequently it was put on the deck near the gate. When the ferry boat reached Swan Point Bar about two miles from Rock Hall it was thought that in making this sharp turn the boat leaned, thus causing the automobile to glide over the chock, and a few minutes later Mr. Bowers looked for his car but it had gone overboard in 18 feet of water. Mr. Bowers was distressed because the car was a new six cylinder Chrysler.

He had packages and two hand bags in the machine. Wm. M. Kerr was accompanying Mr. Bowers and he also lost his hand bag. Mr. Bowers hopes to be reimbursed by the ferry company for his loss.
The car was dragged to Rock Hall Ferry where it was pulled out. How it ever got off is a great mystery.

Mrs. Hubbard Receives Much Publicity As Candidate

The daily papers gave Kent's distinguished citizen, Mrs. Wilbur W. Hubbard, much publicity last week as a candidate for Governor. The meeting at Salisbury, however, failed to endorse her for some reason. Mrs. Gaither, of Baltimore, having nipped the bud in its early stages. There is evidence, however, that it may be revived in October. The Baltimore American of Wednesday contains a very complimentary editorial which covers the situation:

"WOMAN ASPIRES TO THE GOVERNORSHIP
A woman Governor for Maryland sounds revolutionary, but the preliminary of the campaign of the Eastern Shore candidate, Mrs. Wilbur W. Hubbard, show signs of political adroitness not to be missed.

Is the lady a candidate? She is not ready to answer with a flat yes or no, but, if the people demand it, she is willing to be drafted. Has she ideas about public policy? She has, and her skillfully worked statements of them indicates without defining her views; the lines are not yet drawn, and she avoids being precipitate in a manner that would do credit to a veteran of the old school.

Moreover, from the standpoint of "practical" politicians, she is reported to have what, in Maryland, appears to be the sine qua non of candidacy for high office, command of enough money to finance a real fight.

There will be other candidates, possibly other women among them, before we get around to the primaries next year. It is quite too early to declare for or against any of them.

The part which women will play in that campaign is certain to add gray hairs and wrinkles to the thought-domes of present leaders in both parties. The man who wins, if any, will know that he has had the battle of a lifetime. Worse things could happen—have happened—in Maryland than the election of a woman Governor.

NEW TRIAL IN FRANKS CASE
The Court of Appeals, which had previously in the appeal of the Victory Sparkler and Specialty Company to her health while in the Company's employ and refusing a new trial of her suit, suggesting that she seek compensation before the State Industrial Accident Commission, on Wednesday last filed an order reversing its previous judgment, with leave to Miss Franks to amend the declaration in her suit and have a new trial thereupon, if it be so elected. The reversal of the Court of Appeals' judgment was based on a motion for modification of judgment and opinion supported by a brief submitted by Wm. Pepper Constable, Joshua Clayton and Wm. L. Rawls Esq., counsel for Miss Franks, in which evidence given at the trial of the case was recited.
