A LETTER FROM A KENT COUNTIAN

Honolulu, T. H., April 6, 1925.
Messrs. Editors:
I came to Honolulu last fall and was so greatly surprised to find it an up-to-the-minute American City. I thought you might be interested to hear about it from a temporary resident. As we slowly steamed into the harbor, native Hawaiian boys swam close enough to the ship to catch the coins thrown into the water by tourists. They swim with the ease of ducks and can keep afloat just by moving a foot or hand. Those on board who were so fortunate as to have friends here, were greeted with beautiful flowers strung on cords. The first thing to attract my attention was a Japanese woman dressed in their native costume which consists of a kimono, sandals without hose and a broad belt with something resembling a flat cushion at the waist in the back which is called obi. The next, as we were driving to our hotel, was the beauty of the hibiscus hedges. The blooms are large and brilliant. Some are pink, others red, yellow and white. Flowers everywhere. To see blooming shrubs is not uncommon in Maryland, but trees of immense size are covered with every imaginable kind of blossom here and each day I see something new and exquisite. A golden rose that blooms in the mountains looks like silk with its yellow center and brown outer petals. Night blooming cereus was in its glory when we arrived, filling the air for blocks with delightful fragrance. It grows on low stone walls and is the longest cereus hedge in the world, bearing one other. Two-fifths of the population are Japanese and swans of Japanese children are in almost every section of the island. They multiply with the rapidity of Australian rabbits.
The Japanese Exclusion Act has caused much unfavorable comment but it is the only solution. An American farmer cannot compete with them. They can live on so little and can work for eighteen hours a day when working for themselves. Frugal and thrifty but live only for their own race. Young girls dress as we do in the States and are quite attractive. Hawaiians are so much like our negro that I find it difficult to distinguish between them. Very few negroes here. Apparently no color line. The Hawaiians are said to be fond of music and have a passion for flowers. They are indolent and sweet tempered. To me the saddest of all things is the leper hospital. They are sent there for treatment and it is literally a prison. High wire fences ten feet apart keeps them in the grounds and when relatives call to see them, a boy with a megaphone at the gate, calls out the name of the person desired. They can come to the fence to talk to those outside but the distance of ten feet makes intimate talk impossible. When found to be incurable they are sent to the leper settlement on Mollika and when their boat sails they know they will be forever separated from all those who are dear to them. I will not dwell upon this gruesome subject but those of us who are not thus afflicted have more to thank God for than we realize.

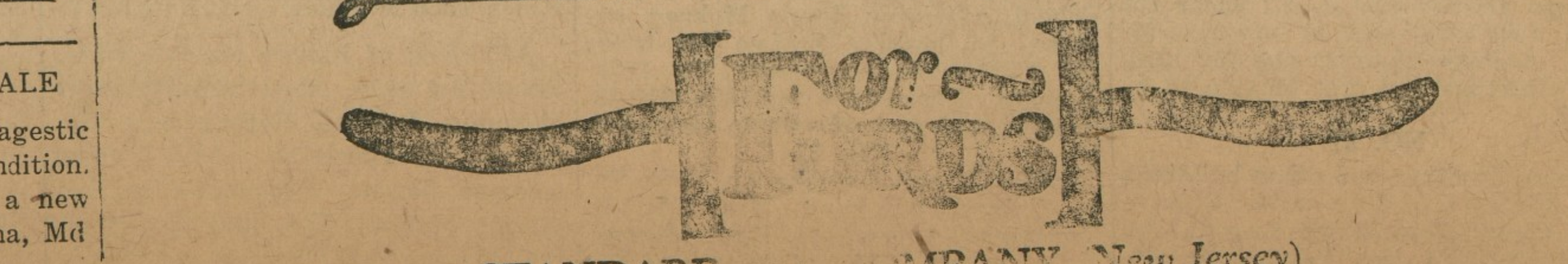
