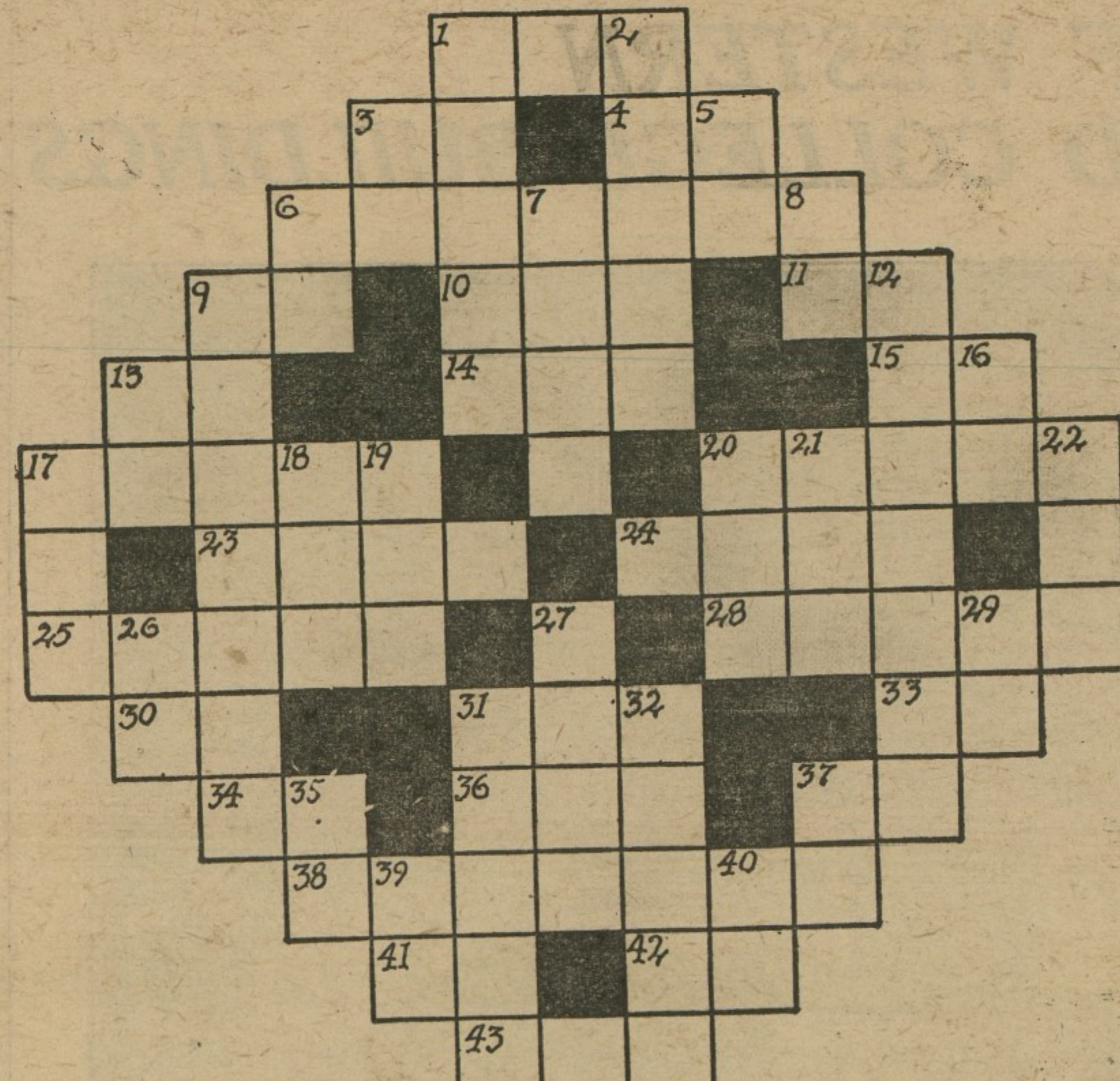

## PRaise WESTERN MARYLAND COLLEGE

Prominent Business Men Say Its Work Deserves Support Of All.

### MANY ACTIVITIES TOLD

Students Receive Mental, Moral And Physical Training In Best Surroundings.

### GOVERNOR ENDORSES COLLEGE CAMPAIGN

The campaign of Western Maryland College for \$375,000 additional endowment has the hearty endorsement of Governor Ritchie, who says: "Western Maryland College is one of the State's most valued assets. It is hard to express adequately the contribution it yearly makes to the field of education. The College is asking the State and the Rockefeller Foundation to help it now, but at the same time it is determined to help itself also. For the sake of continuing and expanding the fine work the College does, I consider it both a duty and a privilege to endorse its present campaign. I hope it will meet with the success it deserves."

High praise is given Western Maryland College, and the people of the state are urged to help it raise the additional endowment of \$375,000 that will secure for it from the Rockefeller Foundation a further endowment of \$125,000 and from the state a gift of \$125,000 for a new building.

Robert J. Gill, "Colonel Bob" to those who followed him in battle overseas, and who is a prominent lawyer of Baltimore, is chairman of the campaign committee. He points out the need of college training and says that Western Maryland College offers such a training amid the best surroundings.

Charles R. Miller, president of the Fidelity & Deposit Company, Baltimore, the leading surety company of the country, is also a graduate of Western Maryland. He was raised in Westminister, virtually in the shadow of the college and knows thoroughly what great good it is doing. He, too, urges state-wide support for the campaign.

Another prominent Maryland man who is intensely interested in the growth of the college is Mr. William G. Baker, of Baker, Watts & Co., Baltimore, who says:

"To those who know the work accomplished by Western Maryland College during the fifty years or more of its existence, the possibility of increasing its usefulness means much. It has never been a large college, as numbers go these days, but it has always done excellent work, providing at very reasonable rates facilities to many who otherwise might not have received a college education. The campaign about to be inaugurated to raise \$375,000 should appeal not only to those who have been closely associated with the college, but to every one interested in the state. It should mean placing the institution on a firm financial basis, adding not only increased facilities, but measurably strengthening its endowment funds. I hope very much that it will succeed."

"Very few persons have had the opportunity to know Western Maryland College and its work as I have had," said Mr. Miller. "I was born in Westminister and grew up almost in the shadow of the college. I want to say that I know of no college that is doing more for the young men and women of Maryland than is my alma mater—Western Maryland College."

"It offers to the youth of the state a splendid opportunity. The Christian atmosphere which surrounds it, the great care given to its student body by the faculty, the excellent courses of study offered by it, together with the fact that it is an institution that is truly Maryland in every sense of the word, should commend it and its financial campaign to every person who has the welfare of the state at heart."

"Its success in raising the \$375,000 required to obtain for it the Rockefeller Foundation endowment of \$125,000 and the State appropriation of \$125,000 for a new building, will place the college high up in the ranks of American colleges. It already enjoys a high standing but with increased endowment its power for good will be greatly multiplied."

The call for support for the campaign is emphasized by Mr. Gill who says:

Notice is hereby given to all persons and bodies corporate or politic, doing business in Kent county, and requiring a State License to obtain a license or renew the same on or before:

**THE FIRST DAY OF MAY NEXT**  
A failure on part of persons now engaged in business to renew their license by the first day of May next will subject them to a fine.

Clerk Robert T. Ayres will be ready to issue license on or before the first day of May next at his office in the Court House.

Those interested are notified of the following requirements of the license law:

If applicant's stock in trade does not exceed.....	\$1,000	\$15.50
If over \$1,000, not over 1,500	1,500	18.50
If over 1,500, not over 2,500	2,500	20.50
If over 2,500, not over 4,000	4,000	25.50
If over 4,000, not over 6,000	6,000	30.50
If over 6,000, not over 8,000	8,000	40.50
If over 8,000, not over 10,000	10,000	50.50
If over 10,000, not over 15,000	15,000	65.50
If over 15,000, not over 20,000	20,000	80.50
If over 20,000, not over 30,000	30,000	100.50

### SPECIAL NOTICE

All applicants for trader's license must make application in writing upon special form under oath before Clerk of the Circuit Court or Justice of the Peace or Notary Public as provided for under Chapter 632, Acts 1916.

These blanks can be secured upon application to the Clerk of the Circuit Court.

### LICENSE LAW

EFFECTIVE JAN. 1, 1916.

Notice is hereby given to all persons interested that the License Laws of Maryland were amended by the General Assembly of 1916, and new sections added providing for the Licensing of Detective Agencies and Agents, Moving Picture Shows and Carnivals, Garages, Cash Registers and Adding Machines, Commercial, Mercantile and Mutual Protective Agencies, Intelligence Offices and Employment Offices, Laundries, Junk Dealers, Trading Stamp Companies, Wholesale Dealers in Farm Machinery, Soda Water Fountains, Livestock Stables, Bowling Saloons, Storage Warehouses, Check Rooms, Dyeing, Cleaning and Pressing Companies, Shoe-Shining parlors and Hat-making Establishments, Restaurants or Eating Places, Plumbers and Gas Fitters, Construction Firms or Companies, Non-Resident Wholesale Tobacco Dealers and Non-Resident Wholesale Liquor Dealers. For information of the license fees under this law apply to the Clerk of the Circuit Court.

**STALLIONS**—Any owner and keeper of every Stallion or Jack shall before being permitted to stand or station such animal pay to the Clerk of the Court or some one of the counties of the State the highest sum that he intends to receive for the season for one mare, and the receipt of the said Clerk, with the seal of his court attached thereto for said sum, shall be the license for standing or stationing such a stallion or jack for one year from the date thereof; provided, that in no case shall the sum directed to be paid by this section for such license be less than ten dollars, and that every stallion or jack, upon which the said tax is paid, shall be exempt from all other State tax.

Any owner or keeper standing or stationing any stallion or jack without a license shall forfeit and pay twice the sum authorized and required to be paid in the last preceding section one half to the State and the other half to the informer.
