### Diocese Of Easton Hold 57th Session in Centreville

With one of the largest clerical and lay delegations on record in attendance, the fifty-seventh annual convention of the Diocese of Easton, comprising the Eastern Shore, opened Monday in St. Paul's P. E. Church.

Amos W. Woodcock, United States District Attorney, delivered the principal address at a mass-meeting at night, urging the church to follow the Christian preacher, who inspired the First Crusade, and promote a quest for truth.

The meeting was preceded by a dinner in the parish house, at which B. Mercer Hartman, of Baltimore, and the Rev. Dr. Z. B. T. Phillips, rector of the Church of the Epiphany, Washington, were the principal speakers.

The Rt. Rev. George W. Davenport, Bishop of Easton, opened the convention with a brief address. Business affairs occupied the afternoon. Samuel E. Shannahan, of Easton, was re-elected secretary and reports of the various church auxiliaries were submitted.

Mrs. Marcellin Adams, provincial president of the Women's Auxiliary, spoke at an afternoon meeting for women.

These directing the convention are: The Rev. Alward Chamberlaine, chairman of the general committee; Col. W. Hopper Gibson, chairman of the hospitality committee, and Walter T. Wright, chairman of the reception committee.

The convention closed Wednesday, with the naming of clerical and lay deputies to attend the triennial convention of the denomination, which meets in New Orleans in October, as follows:

Clerical—The Rev. Alward Chamberlaine, of Centreville; the Rev. J. C. Bohanan, of Easton; the Rev. Dr. William Dunbar Gould, of Cambridge, and the Rev. Charles L. Atwater, of Chestertown. Lay delegates—State Senator John S. McDaniel, of Easton; C. N. Dashiell, of Princess Anne; E. Thomas Massey, of Kent; and Senator Dudley G. Eoe, of Sudlersville.

### Rock Hall High School Wins Second Prize In Declamation

Rock Hall High School pupil takes second place in State Declamation Contest. The Sixteenth Annual Declamation Contest, May 1, 1925, sponsored by St. John's College and open to the high schools of Maryland was won by Earl Lippy, of Westminster. His subject was "The Burgomaster's Death." William Edmondson, of Rock Hall High School, was awarded second prize, a silver medal. The judges were Prof. Allen Westcott and Prof. C. L. Lewis, of The Naval Academy, and Prof. Horace J. Fenton.

A preliminary contest was held in the afternoon; at this contest 16 high schools were represented; Beall High School, Oxford High School, Hagerstown High School, Williamsport High School, Westminster High School, Sudlersville High School, Denton High School, Upper Marlboro High School, Centreville High School, Rock Hall High School, Baltimore City College, Ridgely High School, St. Michael's High School, Federalsburg High School, Central High School, Lonaconing, Gaithersburg High. Six were chosen for the final contest.
