The re-appointment of Public Service Commissioner J. Frank Harper, of Centerville, for another six-year term by Governor Ritchie, meets with nearly universal approval. It was a commendable effort to recognize merit.

Unless immediate steps are taken by the citizens of Centerville to cooperate with Company "K" in the rehabilitation of the local industry outfit, General Milton A. Rockford will cancel all plans for the construction of the \$50,000 armory there. One month has been given for this purpose.

State Board of Health officials are interested in an unusual condition which has made itself manifest in the Ludersville neighborhood during the last two weeks. In that period there have been nine cases of appendicitis in the immediate vicinity. Thursday morning, Kathleen Powell, daughter of Luther Powell, was removed to Emergency Hospital, Easton, and she underwent the operation yesterday. John E. George, Jr., and Frank Wallace just returned from the hospital, where they underwent operations, and Frank Tarbuton and Harrington Knotts are now recovering at the institution. Dr. C. H. Metcalf, who has attended the patients is of the opinion that the "epidemic" is due to attacks of influenza which resulted in the appendix becoming affected.
