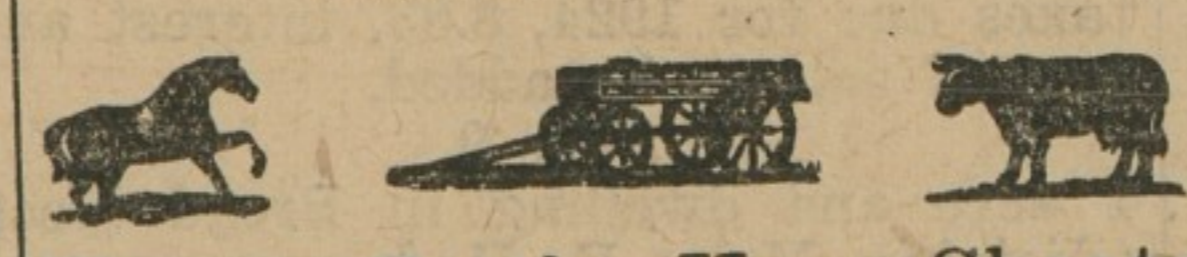

HIP HIP HOORAY MAKES A BIG HIT

Characters Well Chosen—Orchestra Hard To Beat—Stage Lighting And Scenery Fine—Costumes Comparable To The Best

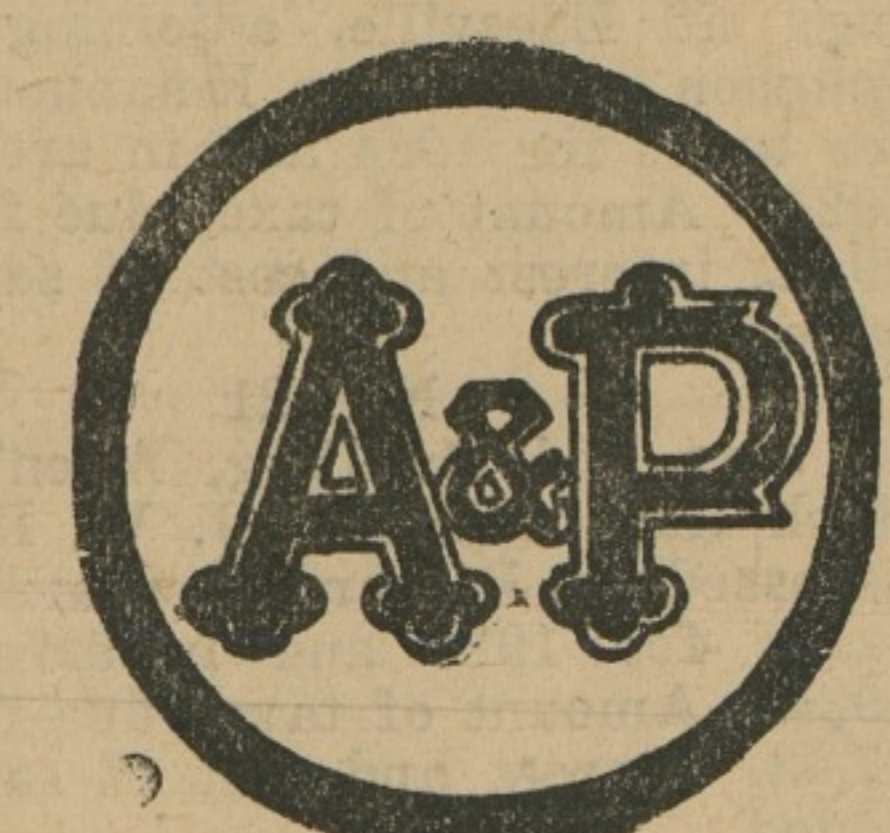
