

Death Of Mrs. Martha J. Gillespie

Mrs. Martha J. Gillespie, widow of Stephen J. Gillespie, of Queen Anne's county, and for nearly a quarter of a century one of the foremost and most successful school teachers in Queen Anne's county, died Thursday night at 9.30 o'clock, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Richard T. Earle, of Centreville, where she had been ill for several weeks. Death was due to a complication of diseases.

Mrs. Gillespie was about sixty-five years old. She was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Henry Glanding, who for many years resided at Clannahan's Shops.

The deceased was twice married. Her first husband was the late Dr. Cahoon, of Crumpton. Following Dr. Cahoon's death she returned to her profession as teacher, and about 15

years ago married Stephen J. Gillespie, and for many years they resided at Stevensville. Mr. Gillespie died last year. There was no children, and Mrs. Gillespie's closest relatives are a number of nieces and cousins in Wilmington and Baltimore.

For several months the deceased has been in ill health, and for some time was under treatment at St. Frances' Hospital, Wilmington, but returned to Centreville several weeks ago, and has since been at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Earle.

Commencement Program At College

The program for commencement week at Washington College will begin one day earlier than usual, due to the fact that important changes have been made in the list of traditional June events at the Chester-

town institution. This year the graduation festivities will start on Wednesday night, June 10th, with a play given by the Dramatic Association called "The Talk of the Town." On Saturday night the annual alumni dinner and general meeting will be held. Sunday morning, June 14, the baccalaureate sermon will be preached by President Titsworth and Sunday night the usual address before the Y. M. C. A. probably by Dr. S. Parkes Cadman, of New York City, will be given. The graduating exercises themselves will be held on Monday morning, June 15. Bishop Wm. McDowell, of Washington, D. C., Bishop of the M.E. Church, will be the principal speaker of the occasion. This program is tentative and subject to change but will be given substantially as stated.

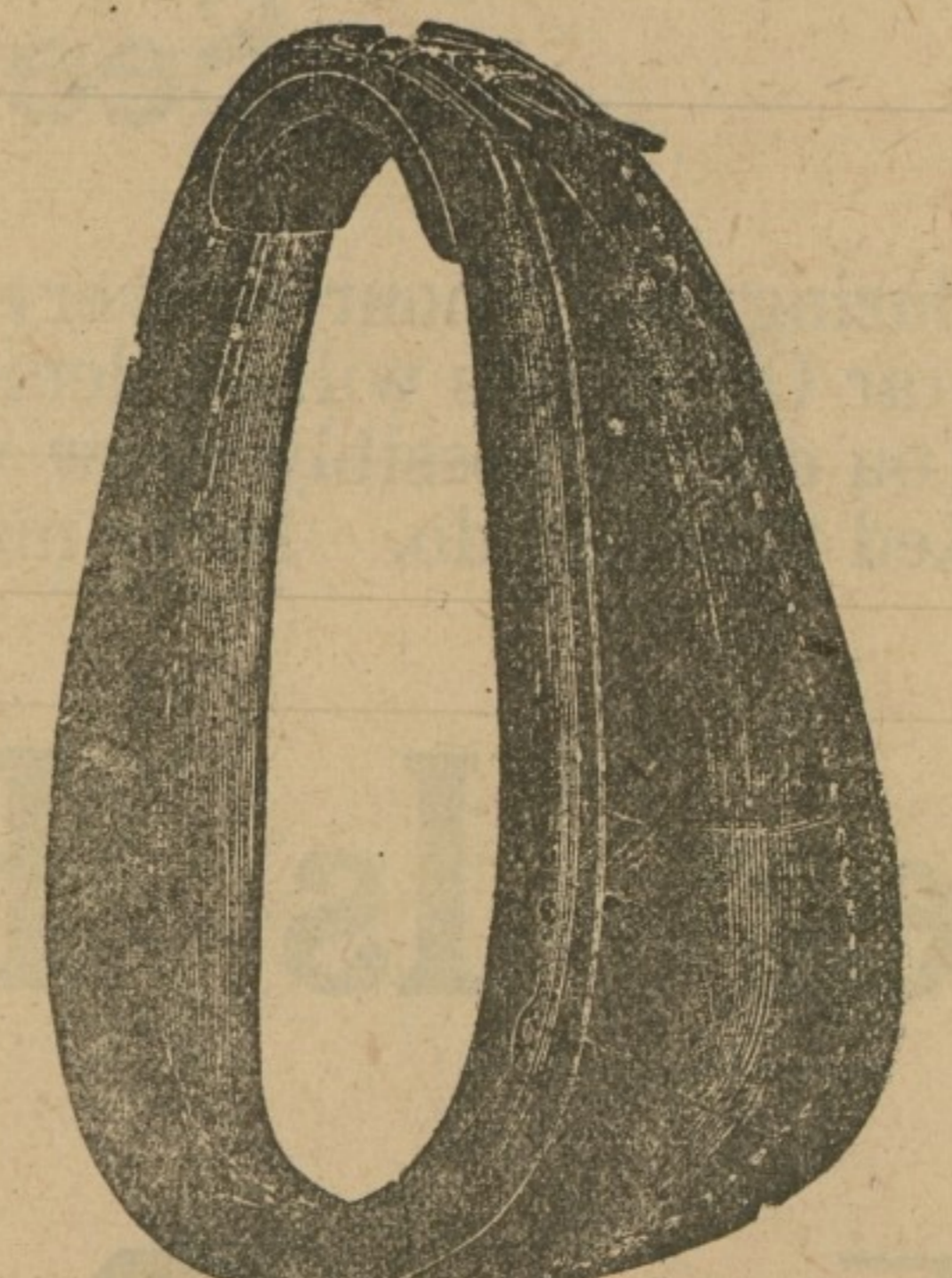

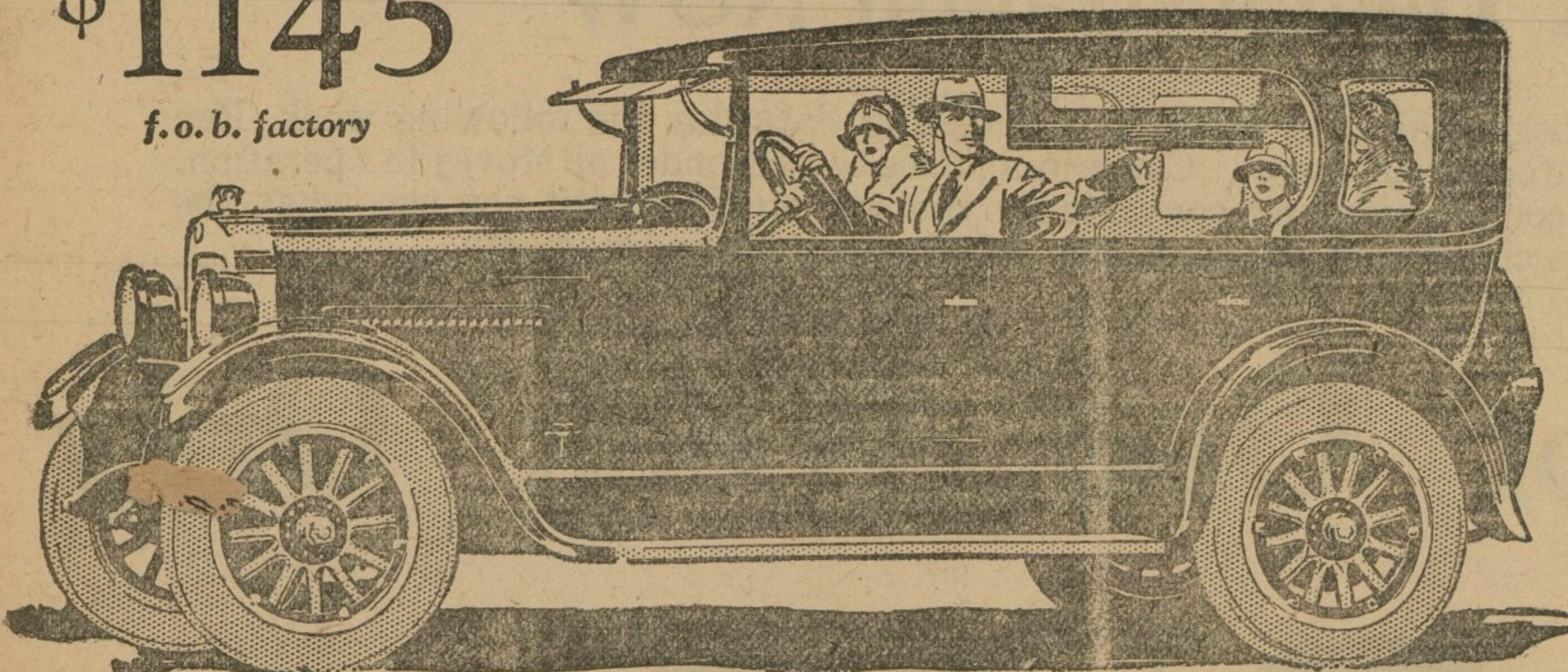
