ARMY AIRMAN KILLED IN CRASH
Lieut. Arthur G. Watson, formerly of Rock Hall, and another man are dead as the result of an accident to a United States Army airplane at San Jose, Costa Rica, the War Department was advised Tuesday.
Lieutenant Watson was killed and Staff Sergeant Otta A. Hansen died later of burns suffered in the accident. No details of the crash, which occurred at 9 o'clock Monday morning, are available.

Lieutenant Watson served in the Air Service during the war and was appointed second lieutenant in the regular Army on July 1, 1920. Later he was promoted to first lieutenant since December, 1923.
Mrs. Lois Watson survives her husband.

A Half Million Dollars Spent In New Equipment

Supplee-Wills-Jones Milk Cooling Stations In Kent And Elsewhere Put In New System Cars Built With Glass Tanks—Loaded In Six Minutes—Efficient Officers, Large Shipments.

There are few persons in Kent county who realize the enormity of the Supplee-Wills-Jones organization, the company which buys milk from our farmers and which pays every month the cash for same. This company owns 34 plants in four States, Maryland, Delaware, Pennsylvania and New Jersey. Three of these plants are in Kent county, Md., and three in Delaware—Chestertown, Worton, Kennedyville, Townsend, Harrington and Nassau. Dell Hendershott is the superintendent of the latter six stations, and his ability is seen in the success with which they are managed. He watches them like a mother with her child and looks after every little detail. He takes great pride in the recent improvements and thinks it will mean much to all concerned as they are put into use.

As noted in the News recently, the big change in the plants was the installation of glass tanks and the building of new glass lined tank cars. This innovation cost the company more than a half million dollars, each car costing over \$10,000. They have purchased eight of the new cars which are designated as S-W-J-X, Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8. Six of these cars are now in daily operation on the Pennsylvania Railroad between various country receiving stations and Philadelphia; the others will be placed in operation, in fast passenger trains, on the Pennsylvania and Reading Railroads for the transportation of milk shipments, just as soon as the necessary fittings can be installed. These cars afford the most modern and sanitary method in the world today for the transportation of fluid milk.

The cars are of steel underframes construction with regular Pullman trucks, Universal brake control, and all the other latest improved safety devices; each car containing two glass lined tanks, both facing the center of the car. These tanks, which are fully insulated, are made of seamless steel and glass, thus combining the strength of steel and the sanitary qualities of a glass bottle. The glass lining can be injured only by serious accident, as it is fused into the steel at a high temperature and becomes an integral part of the steel itself, nor will it crack, graze or chip off. Each tank holds 3000 gallons, giving each car a capacity of 6,000 gallons, equivalent to 522 forty-six quart cans.

Milk is cooled over an open cooler at the country receiving stations to temperatures ranging from 36 to 38 degrees, before running into the cars, and this temperature is maintained until cars reach the railroad siding at Philadelphia several hours later, where the milk is withdrawn into big glass-lined tanks, mounted on semi-trailer trucks, and thus transported.

DEATH OF WILLIAM FORD

After a short illness of pneumonia, William Ford, friend of all and revered by scores, passed into the Great Beyond Tuesday afternoon. He was born October 2, 1831, and lived 93 years, 7 months and 10 days. For 37 years Mr. Ford resided on the farm owned by the late Judge Joseph A. Wickes, near Chestertown, part of which time he conducted also his own farm and the Wickes "Airy Hill" farm. He was connected with the administration of the Kent County Almshouse for 57 years have been a trustee for 20 years, president of the board about 20 years, and has been superintendent of the institution since January 1, 1900.

The deceased was especially near to the News editors. When a boy he visited his home and enjoyed his hospitality, and since then have kept in close touch with him. Childhood is beautiful, but in itself is scarcely more lovely than a cheerful, kindly, sunny old age such as Mr. Ford radiated. The evening of his well-spent life brought its lamps with it and up to the very last his cheery word was given to all.

His devoted daughters and son were his solace and comfort in his declining years and their love for him was truly in evidence every day. We venerate such old age, and in the words of a well-known author love not the man who can look without emotion upon the sunset of life, when the dusk of evening begins to gather over the watery eye, and the shadows of twilight grow broader and deeper upon the understanding."

Servant of God, well done!
Thy glorious warfare's past;
The battle's fought, the race is won,
And thou art crowned at last.

He is survived by the following children: Mrs. Ella Clough, David B. Ford and Miss Sue Barr Ford; also two brothers, David Ford, of Florida, and Robert Ford, of Baltimore.

Funeral services were held from his late home Friday afternoon at 1.30, conducted by the Rev. Louis B. Sheen, with interment at St. Paul's.

The active bearers were W. Bradford Copper, Alfred C. Local, Robert Moffat, Bayard Sutton, Eben F. Perkins and Dr. C. W. Whaland.

The honorary bearers were M. W. Thomas, Harry C. Willis, Joseph M. Norris, Elmer S. Jarman, J. B. Newman, members of the board of trustees of the Almshouse, and Dr. Frank W. Smith, Undertaker, Chas. L. Dodd.

Rollison Baxter, an employee of the Hearn Oil Company, was one of the men selected from the hundred employees, to act as a bearer at the funeral of Charles B. Hearn in Wilmington last week.

Saturday Mr. Hearn was at the home of his only son, Claude P. Hearn. He engaged in some outdoor exercise and then took a hot bath. A few hours later he was stricken with a cold. Pneumonia soon developed resulting in his death, aged 62.

Mr. Hearn went to Wilmington twelve years ago with his son, and founded the Hearn Oil Company. His son is president of the company.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Annie E. Hearn, one daughter and son.
