The Dorchester County Commissioners Friday struck the tax levy for the present year and the rate of \$1.72 on the \$100 is just twelve and a half cents less than the rate for the past year. The State rate is 27 1-5 cents on the \$100 a reduction of nearly three cents over that of the preceding year, making the total reduction of nearly thirteen and one-half cents on the hundred dollars.

The reduction in the county rate was brought about largely as the result of the reduced amount asked for to run the public schools of the county.

Public schools and county roads are the two largest items for which taxes are levied, there being levied this year, \$96,000 for roads, \$9,000 for bridges and \$3,500 for ferries, or a total of \$108,500 for roads, bridges and ferries, while \$137,074 is levied for the schools.

John N. Mackall, chairman of the State Roads Commission, announced Tuesday he had secured the pledges of Pennsylvania, Baltimore and Ohio and Western Maryland Railway Company officials to pay half of the \$20,000,000 costs of eliminating the 166 major grade crossings of the State if the State would bear the other half of the expenses. Chairman Mackall declared the proposition, in his opinion, was as fair as would ever be obtained, and that he was strongly in favor of having the next Legislature pass an act enabling the State Roads Commission to carry out the proposed program.

Dynamite—giant servant of modern days—is laying low the last stubborn reminders of Old Wye Camp when it was in its hey-day.
