CLUB WOMEN HAVE A BUSY WEEK

On Monday, May 4th, the Kent County Rural Women's Clubs held their annual spring meeting at Chestertown. Following reports of officers and committees, the Council proceeded to elect officers for the ensuing year. The election resulted as follows: President, Mrs. Linwood A. Sutton; first vice president, Mrs. Harry Williams; second vice president, Mrs. Hugh G. Hartman; treasurer, Mrs. Sewell J. Lee. Delegates at large, Mrs. Howard Rees, Mrs. D. W. Ingersoll and Mrs. Wm. Dixon.

Following a delightful luncheon served by the club women, a splendid program followed. The principal speakers were W. H. Rise, Poultry Specialist, University of Maryland Extension Service, who spoke on the Care and Feeding of Baby Chicks; Miss Bertha Knight of the University of Maryland Extension Service, spoke on Color and Pictures in the Home. This was probably the largest gathering of women the Council has ever had in such a busy season. Meetings were held during the week at Fairlee, Flatland, Rock Hall and Chestertown. Demonstrations were given in Short Cuts in Sewing, Renovation, Pattern Alteration and Millinery. Each Club had unusually fine meetings.

An Honor to Prof. Burchinal

A signal honor has recently come to Professor Mary C. Burchinal, formerly of Chestertown and now a member of the faculty of the West Philadelphia High School. As is well known, Dr. Burchinal, who took her degree in German at Johns Hopkins University, is a member of the Board of Governors of Washington College.

She has just been appointed a member of a general committee which includes such educators as Prof. E. C. Armstrong, of Princeton, formerly Professor of Romance Languages at Hopkins; Prof. C. H. Grandgent, of Harvard; Professor Marian Whitney, of Vassar, and others of like prominence, and which committee will supervise the organization of a three year study of the teaching of French, German, Italian and Spanish in the United States. The appointment of this committee has just been announced by Professor Robert H. Fife, Chairman of "The Modern Foreign Language Study" with headquarters in New York City.

Education, will include an examination of the teaching of the modern foreign languages in all American schools and colleges, attention being and corresponding levels of collegiate instruction. The study is financed by the Carnegie Corporation of New York.

The committee of which Dr. Burchinal is a member will endeavor to discover how many graduates of school and college are now able to read French or German, and whether those who read foreign books or newspapers have learned the language at school or at home. An effort will further be made to discover what proportion of graduates of schools and colleges are now making use of foreign languages in conversation or correspondence and corresponding levels of collegiate capacities by American graduates.

Supplementary to this investigation educational and psychological experts will try out old and new methods in schools and universities. And the movements of the eyes in reading foreign languages and texts will be measured with delicate instruments.

POSTOFFICE RECEIPTS JUMP
