

Tomato Meeting in Delaware

Seven co-operative tomato-packing concerns in Delaware and on the Eastern Shore of Maryland, representing 3,000 acres and upward, and 500 farmers, which average in normal seasons a pack of more than 100,000 cans of tomatoes, met at the Hotel Du Pont and effected a tentative organization and named committees to conduct investigations concerning grading, packing and marketing to be reported at subsequent meetings.

Charles A. Gelder, of Princess Anne Md., of the Tri-State Tomato Growers' Association, the chairman of the present federation of tomato canners, presided.

ORDER 3200 DAIRY COWS SLAIN

Samuel Shoemaker, chairman of the State Board of Agriculture, was quoted on Tuesday as saying that of the

20,000 head of dairy cattle in Baltimore county 15,000 had been tested on the farms for tuberculosis, and 3200 had been removed from the herds for slaughter. The percentage infected was about 19 in every hundred tested or nearly one in every five. He said there were more tubercular cattle in the vicinity of Baltimore than in any other section of the State, and urges that all those infected be located as soon as possible and slaughtered. Owners of cattle slaughtered are partially compensated, the National Government and each State bearing a third of the amount awarded.

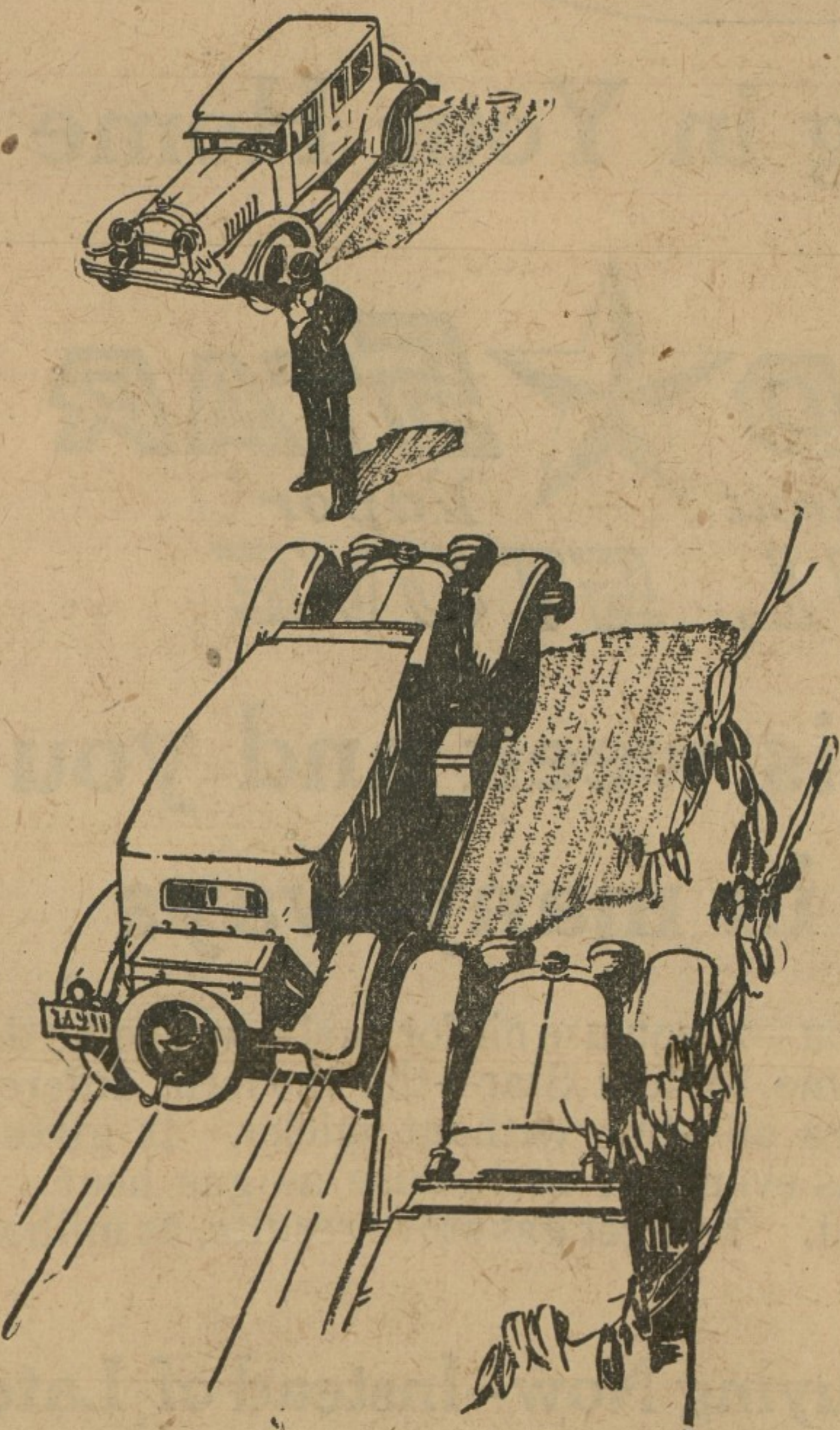

ORDER OF PUBLICATION

Emory I. Crouch, Lula E. Crouch Startt, Gustavus Startt, her husband, Emory Lister Crouch and Mildred Crouch, his wife, and Grace Hadaway, by their father and next friend, J. Frank Hadaway.

Lula Crouch, who intermarried with Gustavus Startt. Emory Lister Crouch, who intermarried with Mildred Jamar. Dora Crouch, who intermarried with Howard E. Hadaway. Edna Vickers Crouch, who intermarried with Clarence E. Walbert. Samuel Crouch, who intermarried with Myrtle Fannie Crouch, who intermarried with J. Frank Hadaway.

The said Fannie Crouch died, leaving three minor children by name, Grace Hadaway, Dorothy Hadaway and Frank Hadaway, the said J. Frank Hadaway, father, who appears as one of the Complainants in this Bill as the father and next friend of the said minor children.

3. That since the death of the said Mary L. Crouch the property and premises have been occupied first for some length of time by Emory I. Crouch and some of the children of the said Mary L. Crouch and Emory I. Crouch, but as it is necessary that the taxes and repairs and other expenses should be kept up on said property and as there is no one in particular to look after these expenditures, and further that the real estate is not susceptible of partition

without material loss and injury to the parties entitled to an interest therein, as above stated, and that, in order to make division of said property, it will be necessary that the said real estate be sold and the proceeds thereof divided among the parties according to their respective interests.
