The object of the Bill filed in this case is to procure a Decree for the sale of the Real Estate of Georgia Moffett, deceased.

R. A. No. 2, folio 92. The children and heirs at law have united in the signing and execution of a deed of their interest in the said tract of land and premises to their brother, George H. Millennium Is Far Away Judge Adkins Holds

"We are, as yet, far from the millennium," said Chief Judge William H. Adkins in his address to the Talbot County Grand Jury at the opening of May term of court Monday. Judge Adkins continued: "Doubtless many of the criminal laws are violated here as elsewhere from time to time. But it is gratifying to believe that conditions at least are better. I do not hear of rowdism on the streets of Easton on Saturday or other nights, of which there was formerly much complaint."

Then the judge urged the jury to lay especial attention to enforcement of motor-vehicle regulations, and touching upon the operation of cars by intoxicated persons, remarked:

"I do not hesitate to say that rarely, if ever, should a fine only be imposed upon one convicted of driving an automobile while under the influence of liquor, however slightly. Nothing short of imprisonment could be adequate punishment for one so disregardful of human life; nothing less will, in my opinion, protect the public from the consequences of such outrageous conduct."

"A man operating an automobile on the public roads while his brain is inflamed or befuddled is a greater menace than such a one would be with a gun in a crowd. Of course, every such case should be reported to the Automobile Commissioner, and the license revoked."

"It is your responsibility to inquire to what extent we all are endangered by the conditions indicated, and to set in motion the machinery of the law, if violators are found, as a deterrent to those who think much of what they call personal liberty and very little of the rights and safety of the public. Public liberty must yield to the necessity for public protection."

Three valuable cows owned by Mr. and Mrs. E. K. Everett, who reside near Sutersville, died Thursday of last week, presumably from eating Paris green. The barn door had been left open, and it is believed the cows had gotten in the building and eaten the poison, that had been accidentally spilled on the floor. This conclusion was reached after the animals were found dead, and there seemed to be Paris green on their mouths. The cows were valued at \$100 each. In Cecil county several cows were killed by eating frosted crimson clover.

George R. Bellows, for many years manager of the Baltimore office of the Western Newspaper Union, died at his home, near Baltimore, May 3 of general debility. He was sixty-seven years of age and had been in failing health for some time.

Mr. Bellows had an interesting history. He began his career early in life with the New York Newspaper Union. When a year or so over forty he was stricken blind, but for more than two decades he continued to completely direct the business. He was well known in newspaper circles and besides took a prominent part in the work of the Methodist Church, in which he was deeply interested. He is survived by Mrs. Bellows who before marriage was Miss Ida Parks, of this city, and two sons.

Twenty continuous years of service by Lewis J. Hayes, superintendent of the New Brunswick district of the Prudential Insurance Company, culminated Saturday in a business meeting and banquet at both of which commendation and felicitation were showered upon Mr. Hayes. Members of the Newark home office staff, including President Edward D. Duffield, were present at the business meeting in the afternoon. Agents and other operatives of this district, with many prominent local citizens, made up the gathering at both the meeting and banquet. Two inspiring tributes to Mr. Hayes were presented by local citizens, Rev. Cordie J. Culp and Henry G. Parker, while it remained for Mr. Hayes, himself, to talk in glowing terms of his possessions, and the caliber of its citizenry.

William H. Bosley, colored, a well-known barber, connected with the Handy Barber Shops, Centreville, dropped dead Wednesday evening about seven o'clock, while engaged in cutting a man's hair. He was fifty years old.

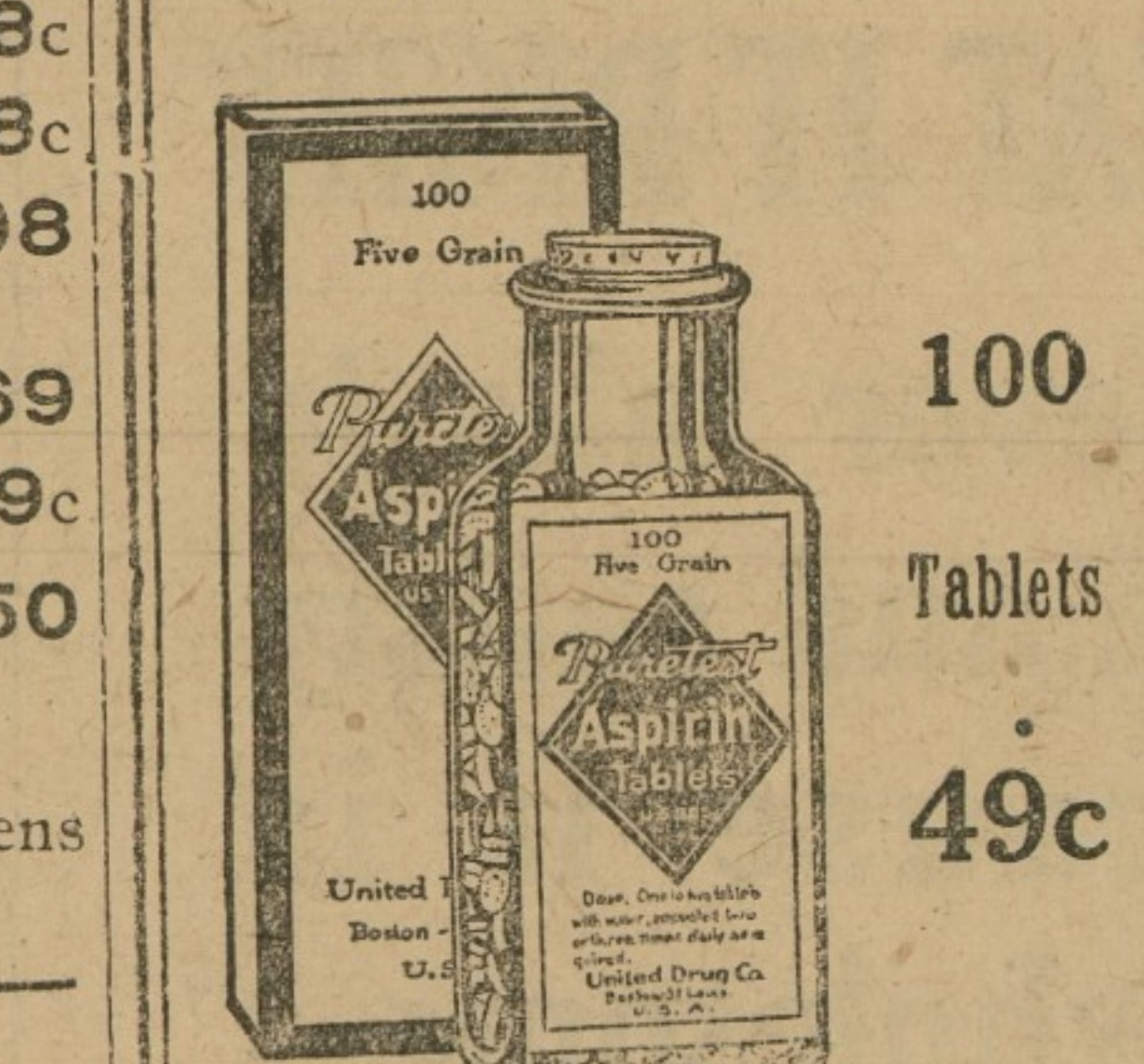
