Memorial Day In Chestertown

American Legion To Have Parade—Big Band From Md. School—Rev. John Saunders, Of Massey, The Speaker Of Day—Field Sports And Base Ball At College In Afternoon.

SEALED ORDER FLIGHT BY AIR PLANES

Today is Memorial Day. The American Legion has prepared a fine program. The Legion will meet at 11.30 Saturday morning on High street and form for the parade. The band of the Maryland Industrial School for Boys of Baltimore of 20 pieces will head the parade.

All the patriotic societies, public school and Washington College will form the parade and march to the cemetery where the speaker will be Rev. John L. Saunders, of Massey. The graves will be decorated with flowers.

At 1.30 p. m. the Legion will march to Washington College where the Field Sports and baseball game between Kennedyville and the Legion will take place.

The radio set winner will be decided after the field sports.

All stores and public places will decorate and are asked to help make Memorial Day a success.

The Air Plane Flight

Eight planes of the Air Service unit of the Maryland National Guard, each manned by a pilot and a mechanic, will take off at 15 minutes' intervals from Logan Field, Baltimore, beginning at 9 o'clock this Saturday morning. They will fly according to a secret schedule over a route including in the order named: Chestertown, Centerville, Denton, Easton and Salisbury, stopping for an interval at each town.

The pilot and mechanic of the planes which finish nearest the exact schedule time will receive prizes amounting to \$1000.

Mr. Pippin Lands Contract. Walter T. Pippin, contractor and builder, of Chestertown, on Saturday, was awarded the contract for Mrs. Austin F. Roberts for elegant residence. The contract price was \$14,000. The building will be of colonial architecture and Mr. Pippin will give to its erection all the care and skill with which he is capable. The plans and specifications were all made by Mr. Pippin. Work will commence at once.

HAIL STORM VISITS KENT

Rain and hail, which fell over Maryland for four hours Sunday, caused damage, which, it is believed, will run into hundreds of thousands of dollars. Crops and fruit trees were damaged in many localities.

In Baltimore the fall of large hailstones started at 4.30 o'clock and continued for more than a half-hour. On several streets hail piled up for a depth of three feet, impeding the progress of street cars.

The temperature fell from 90 degrees an hour before the rain to 52 degrees half an hour after the fall started.

The citizens of Chestertown and the surrounding countryside rejoice because the town has been selected as one of the five Eastern Shore landing places. The landing field will be thronged with spectators when the fliers reach here. Lewin U. Skirven's field, near town, has been selected as the landing place.

Each plane will be allowed five minutes to effect a landing, after being sighted. Time in excess of five minutes will be charged against the pilot. The schedule must be adhered to rigidly. The flyer who adheres most closely to the schedule will be adjudged the winner.

As each flyer arrives in Chestertown he will immediately be notified by a representative of the Baltimore American the place of the next stop and when he is scheduled to arrive here. This will be the program throughout the two-hour period, when ships of the air will come cruising in every fifteen minutes.

Whether Chestertown will be the first stop, or whether the planes will not reach here until later in the morning cannot be learned, for the reason that all flying orders will be kept as strict military secrets. Even the pilots of the planes will not know their destination, except from one town to another.

Men of aviation and men of wide experience in aerie and aeronautics have expressed the opinion that the "Sealed Order" flight will mark the beginning of an important stake of development of the airplane in Maryland for military and commercial purposes.

In Kent county hail fell along the bay shores. At Betterton, Dr. Simpers gathered a bag full of good-sized pellets and brought some to Chestertown. Because of the absence of any strong wind but little damage has been reported as compared with the big storm of May 23rd, 1922.

George P. Hendrickson, tenant on the Elison-Fairlee farm, reports part of a field of wheat badly cut by the hail.

Mrs. Evelyn A. Harris, near Betterton, says about 10 per cent of her pear crop was killed and she also had 150 small chickens killed.

During the storm of last Sunday afternoon, lightning struck the home of Charles Jarman, Sudlersville, damaging it to the extent of about one hundred dollars. At the time the lightning struck, Mr. Jarman and his sister, Miss Carrie Jarman, were calling on relatives, but his mother and uncle were at home, however, other than a slight shock both escaped injury.

During the same storm a cow belonging to James Shelton was killed by a bolt of lightning, and two trees in the yard of James P. Brown, near town, were struck.

DEATHS

News has been received of the death of Mrs. Walter Beck in St. Louis on Sunday. The deceased was the daughter of the late William S. Walker, of Chestertown, and well-known here as Miss Anna Walker. She leaves two children, Walter, Jr., and Mrs. Dr. Woodley. The interment took place in St. Louis.

The body of Joseph Shewell Gibbs, who died suddenly at his home in Williamsport, Pa., was brought to Middletown for burial in St. Anne's Cemetery, Thursday morning. Mr. Gibbs was the oldest son of the late Benjamin and Hannah Gibbs, and was born and raised on the Gibbs homestead on the Levels, and was well-known in the neighborhood. He is survived by his wife and a son, Joseph S. Jr., of Wheeling, W. Va., and one sister, Miss Katherine Gibbs, of Middletown. He was the eldest brother of the late Isaac Gibbs, of Massey.

Mrs. Hester E. Lane, the wife of Geo. F. Lane, and daughter of the late John and Mary E. Clendaniel, passed away at her home, in Warwick, Cecil County, Md., on Saturday, May 9th, in her 70th year. The funeral services were held from her late residence on Tuesday, May 12th, at 2 p. m., conducted by Rev. L. W. Gordon, of Warwick M. P. Church. Interment in Sudlersville Cemetery. The pallbearers were two of her brothers, John and Howard Clendaniel, John H. Price, John Rodney Price, Hanson Johns and John Redgrave. Mr. Wilson, undertaker.

After a lingering illness, Mrs. Rebecca Boulden, passed away at her late home, near Still Pond, Wednesday morning, May 27th, in her 82nd year. She is survived by her two sons, G. S. Boulden, with whom she lived, and John C. Boulden, of near Chestertown; also two sisters, Mrs. Elizabeth Jervis and Mrs. Caroline Harding. Her niece, Miss Cora Harding, has been her devoted companion for a number of years. Mrs. Boulden was a member of the M. E. Church of Still Pond for many years. Funeral services will be held at her late residence Saturday morning at 10 a. m., Rev. Mr. Shockey officiating and interment in Shrewsbury Cemetery; funeral director, B. R. Fellows.
