ORDER OF PUBLICATION

Emory I. Crouch, Lula E. Crouch Startt, Gustavus Startt, her husband, Emory Lister Crouch and Mildred Crouch, his wife, and Grace Hadaway, by their father and next friend, J. Frank Hadaway.

Dora Crouch Hadaway and Howard E. Hadaway, her husband, Edna Vickers Walbert, Clarence E. Walbert, her husband and Samuel H. Crouch and Myrtle Crouch, his wife.

In the Circuit Court for Kent County, State of Maryland.
In Equity, No. 2342.

The object of the Bill filed in the above entitled case is to procure a Decree of Sale of the Real Estate of Mary L. Crouch, deceased.

The Bill States:
1. That Mary L. Crouch, late of Kent County, State of Maryland, died in the year 1914, and she was in her lifetime, and at the time of her death seized and possessed in fee simple of a dwelling and lot of land situated in the Seventh Election District of Kent County, State of Maryland, certified copy of the deed from Emory I. Crouch to the said Mary L. Crouch is filed herewith and made a part hereof, and marked "Complainant's Exhibit No. 1."

2. That the said Mary L. Crouch died in the year 1914, and left surviving her, her husband, Emory I. Crouch, and the following children and heirs at law:
Lula Crouch, who intermarried with Gustavus Startt.
Emory Lister Crouch, who intermarried with Mildred Jamar.
Dora Crouch, who intermarried with Howard E. Hadaway.
Edna Vickers Crouch, who intermarried with Clarence E. Walbert.
Samuel Crouch, who intermarried with Myrtle Crouch, who intermarried with J. Frank Hadaway.

The said Fannie Crouch died, leaving three minor children by name

Hadaway, father, who appears as one of the Complainants in this Bill as the father and next friend of the said minor children.

3. That since the death of the said Mary L. Crouch the property and premises have been occupied first for some length of time by Emory I. Crouch and some of the children of the said Mary L. Crouch and Emory I. Crouch, but as it is necessary that the taxes and repairs and other expenses should be kept up on said property and as there is no one in particular to look after these expenditures, and further that the real estate is not susceptible of partition without material loss and injury to the parties entitled to an interest therein, as above stated, and that, in order to make division of said property, it will be necessary that the said real estate be sold and the proceeds thereof divided among the parties according to their respective interests.

It is thereupon this 9th day of May A. D. 1925, ordered by the Circuit Court for Kent County, in Equity, that the Plaintiffs, by causing a copy of this order to be inserted in some newspaper published in said Kent County, once in each of four successive weeks before the 15th day of June next, giving notice to the said Samuel H. PRIZE WINNING ESSAY ON "TEETH AND THEIR CARE"

Prize Will Be Awarded During High School Commencement

The winning essay in the contest for the prize offered by the Eastern Shore Dental Society, of which Dr. H. C. Hughes is County Chairman, was submitted by Francis Wilson, tenth year student of the High School. The decision was the unanimous action of the judges, Dr. J. P. Franklin, Dr. J. S. William Jones and Mrs. S. J. S. Cleland.

The prize of \$10.00 in gold will be awarded at the commencement exercises of the Rock Hill High School.

"What are teeth?" They are the hard dense structures of epidermal organs which fit into the jaw bone much like a peg into a socket.

A tooth is usually described as consisting of three parts—the crown, neck and root—and is composed of three hard substances, the dentine, enamel, and cementum and a central pulp cavity. The tooth does not, however, occupy the entire socket, for there is besides a lining of periosteum, which at the root turns upward around the tooth as far as the neck, where it becomes continuous with the gums. The packing around the tooth is somewhat elastic and allows of slight motion. The elasticity of the packing doubtless diminishes the shock which would be caused in mastication were the teeth rigidly attached in their long sockets.

We should take the best care of our teeth. Some people say there is no use caring for your first teeth, because you lose them anyway, but if you first teeth are allowed to decay they will affect your gums and jaw bone. Diseased teeth are the cause of bad breath and poor health. We should have our teeth examined by the dentist twice a year, and if any teeth are affected it is best to have them care for right away. However there are certain things which we should do to prevent tooth decay. We should brush our teeth after every meal.

We should consult someone who knows about what kind of brush, powder or paste to use to clean our teeth.

The teeth should be brushed vertically and with some vigor, and we should not be afraid of touching our gums. If we brush our gums this opens up the pores. Neglect of the teeth in early life usually means an infected mouth and abscesses at the roots of the teeth, which unless cared for, persist in later life. Such abscesses may act as reservoirs of infectious material which may enter the blood stream and be carried to the remote parts of the body, frequently causing rheumatism, heart disease, kidney trouble, and other ailments which may materially shorten life. Dr. Henry A. Cotton, Director of the New Jersey State Hospital, for the insane, says teeth are a chronic cause of this dread affection. The time to fight tooth trouble is before it starts. Don't wait until unhealthy conditions become too far advanced. It is just as necessary to care for the gums as to care for the teeth. You should brush your gums when you brush your teeth. This kind of care will make the gums firm and healthy, with a circulation of rich red blood within their walls. We should eat soft foods as well as soft, because the soft food gives your gums and teeth no stimulation, no exercise, no life. For the sake of health and beauty remove causes of tooth decay.
