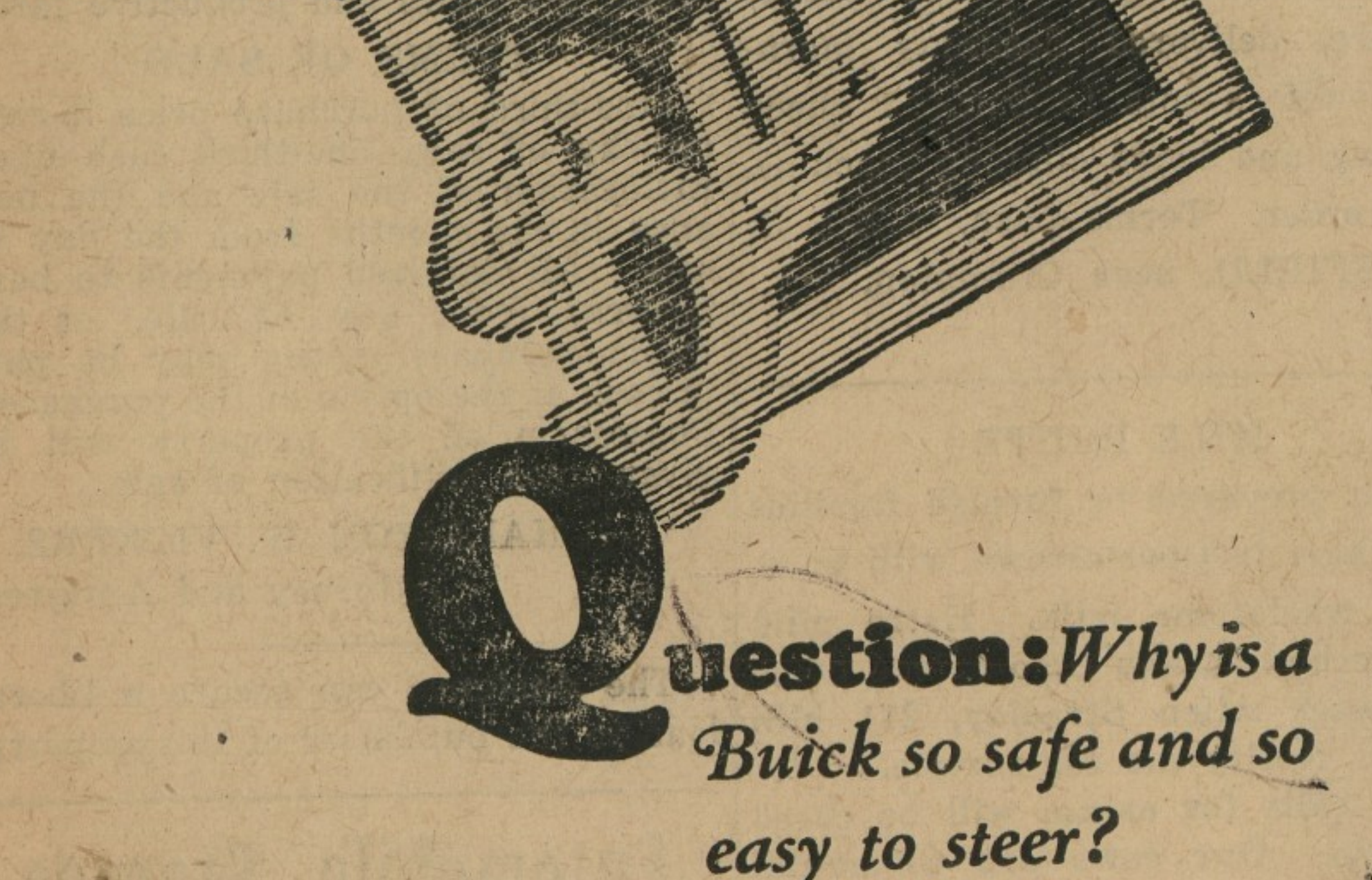

BISHOP COOK FINED

Magistrate James D. Spicer, who imposed a fine of \$25 upon Bishop Philip Cook, of Wilmington, for driving his automobile at a rate of speed said to have been 47 miles an hour, has received the following letter from the distinguished clergyman:

Justice James Spicer:
Dear Sir: Enclosed please find my check to cover the charge brought against me by Officer Wardell for driving in excess of the limit of 35 miles an hour on the highway. You were good enough to continue the case until Monday, but what I thought might happen, has happened. Now the matter has been taken up by the press and given wide publicity in this state and elsewhere. Under the circumstances I feel that it would be very unfortunate if you were willing to remit the fine, to do so. However, unfairly that judgment might be, there might result the feeling that partiality has been shown or that the law was laxly enforced. For this reason I prefer to pay the fine without further consideration of the case.

At the same time I must still repudiate the charge of reckless driving and plead guilty only of exceeding the prescribed limit. There was no car in sight on the road and no life or limb was in danger. I feel the officer would have done all that the case required had he warned and reprimanded me. But since he insisted on making a case of it, this is the best way to bring it to a conclusion.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank you for your courtesy and consideration in dealing with the case.

MEMORIAL DAY FINE IN KENT

Saturday was an ideal day for the observance of Memorial Day and everyone seem to enter into the spirit of the day with unusual fervor. At 10 a. m. there was a big parade, with Frank Jarman Post of the American Legion in charge. The procession was headed by Col. William J. Vannort, the oldest living veteran in the county, and by the officers of the Legion Post and members of the post. Revs. Saunders, Sard, Gibson and Atwater brought up the rear. A band of 20 pieces from the Maryland School for Boys, Baltimore, furnished music.

The march was made to Chester Cemetery, where a patriotic and eloquent address was delivered by Rev. J. L. Saunders, rector of St. Clement's Church, Massey, and the graves of the soldiers of all wars were decorated.

In the afternoon crowds gathered at Washington Athletic Field, where several hundred school students participated in a track and field meet, the closing feature of which was a baseball game between the Kennedyville team and a team composed of members of the American Legion, Kennedyville won. All public buildings and banks were closed and places of business and private residences were decorated with flags and bunting.

Memorial Day was the time set for the "sealed order" flight of airplanes and Chestertown was selected as one of the stopping places. Lewin U. Skirven's field was the place selected for a landing and scores of persons were there to see the interesting spectacle. No one knew which of the five towns would be the first to see the ships. It proved that Denton was selected as first on the itinerary with Salisbury next.

There were only three pilots who finished the race.

Lieut. Harold R. Bohlman won first prize of \$350. Private L. P. Seay, who went with as mechanic, won a prize of \$150.

Second in the contest were Lieut. W. O. Snyder and Master Sgt. Charles H. Craig, who were awarded prizes of \$250 and \$100, respectively.

Lieut. J. C. Hooper, flying with Staff Sgt. F. M. Heinz, was third. Their share of the \$1000 prize money was, respectively, \$100 and \$50.

The winners were announced by Brigadier General J. E. Fehet, assistant chief of staff of the Army Air Service, who was an enthusiastic sponsor of the flight. In announcing the winners Brigadier General Fehet praised highly the men who made the flight.

The Baltimore American fostered the flight and stole a march on its competitor by the enterprise.
