Mr. Stollenwerck also was captain of the football and track teams in that year and a member of the Beta Theta Pi Fraternity. He was a lieutenant in the Aviation Corps, United States Army, during the World War.

Leaving college he was employed by Alexander Brown & Sons and Redmond & Co., bankers, before accepting a position in New York with the brokerage firm of McKinley, Norris & Company.

He was 35 years of age and leaves a widow, Caroline Hynson Stollenwerck, one son, E. Carroll, Jr., 10 years old, also mother and one brother, Guy Stollenwerck, of Memphis, Tenn., one sister, Mrs. Charles G. Hunter, of Norfolk.

His remains were brought by train Chestertown on Monday evening and rested at P. E. Church where funeral service were held Tuesday morning at 11:30. Rev. Mr. Sheen officiating; interment in St. Paul's Cemetery.
