KENT COUNTY HEALTH ASSOCIATION MEETING

The annual public meeting of the Public Health Association of Kent County, Md., was held in the Armory, Wednesday afternoon week, Dr. F. B. Hines, chairman, presiding. Minutes of last meeting read and approved. Mrs. Mary O. Morris, treasurer of the association, made a report. Mrs. J. H. Clendaniel, Sr., chairman of house committee, reported having secured the apartment in Miss Stuart's house on High street, where after September 1st, a permanent health center will be established. Mrs. Massey, chairman of nursing committee, gave a report of work done the past year and spoke of the co-operation and help the different nurses throughout the town had given her.

Miss Blanche Lockwood, Public Health Nurse of Kent County, gave a summarized report of all work done by her. Louis C. Robinson read a revised copy of the constitution and by-laws of the association. Each article, carefully studied, was presented for consideration as read and unanimously accepted by the association.

The following officers were then elected for another year: Dr. Frank B. Hines, chairman; Mrs. J. D. Maxwell, first vice president; Mrs. Wm. B. Usilton, second vice president; Mrs. A. Parks Rasin, secretary; Mrs. Mary O. Morris, treasurer.

The association extended a rising vote of thanks to Mr. Robinson for the time he has given to this work, after which motion was made for adjournment.

College Student Council

The student honor system in American colleges, respecting which there is much discussion, pro and con, going on just now throughout the country, has worked out at Washington College during the past academic year with a remarkable degree of success. The faculty has taken the position that whatever pressure is needed to bring students to live up to the high standard should come from the students themselves. Therefore there has been encouraged the organization of a student self-governing organization and all cases of discipline are referred to this body.

Without divesting itself of its own authority the faculty has adopted the policy, as far as possible, of concurring in the decisions of the student council. Up to the present time there has been no case in which this policy could not be pursued. The men's student council is the governing body of student activities generally, and lately a subsidiary body has been formed to deal with problems involving women students.

Each college class elects annually its own representatives to both the men's and women's student councils. These organizations have successfully administered the written and unwritten laws of the college and have upheld the traditions of honor system which replaces rigid surveillance of examinations with absolute freedom from the instructor's vigilance in the firm belief that college men and women will understand and appreciate such a system of honor.

Thus it is no uncommon sight to see students bending over their examination papers during the instructor's absence. At quite infrequent intervals one learns that the student council has met in executive and secret session to consider some infraction of a rule and to mete out exact and equitable punishment to the offenders.

The occasions when the council meets in judicial session becomes rarer as time goes on and the increased length of time between its partative meetings testifies to the efficiency of its moral influence. On such occasions, however, infractions of the moral code are dealt with in recommending the offender's expulsion from the college.

As in so many instances the success of a plan or system depends upon the man or men in charge. With Charles M. Jarman, son of Charles Jarman, of near Church Hill, and a nephew of Dr. G. Allen Jarman, of Chestertown, acting as president of the Student Council, this organization is now concluding its first year as the student governing body. Under the capable and aggressive leadership of this successful and popular young student, the council theory has been given considerable impetus, and is now to be a fixed institution each year at Washington.
