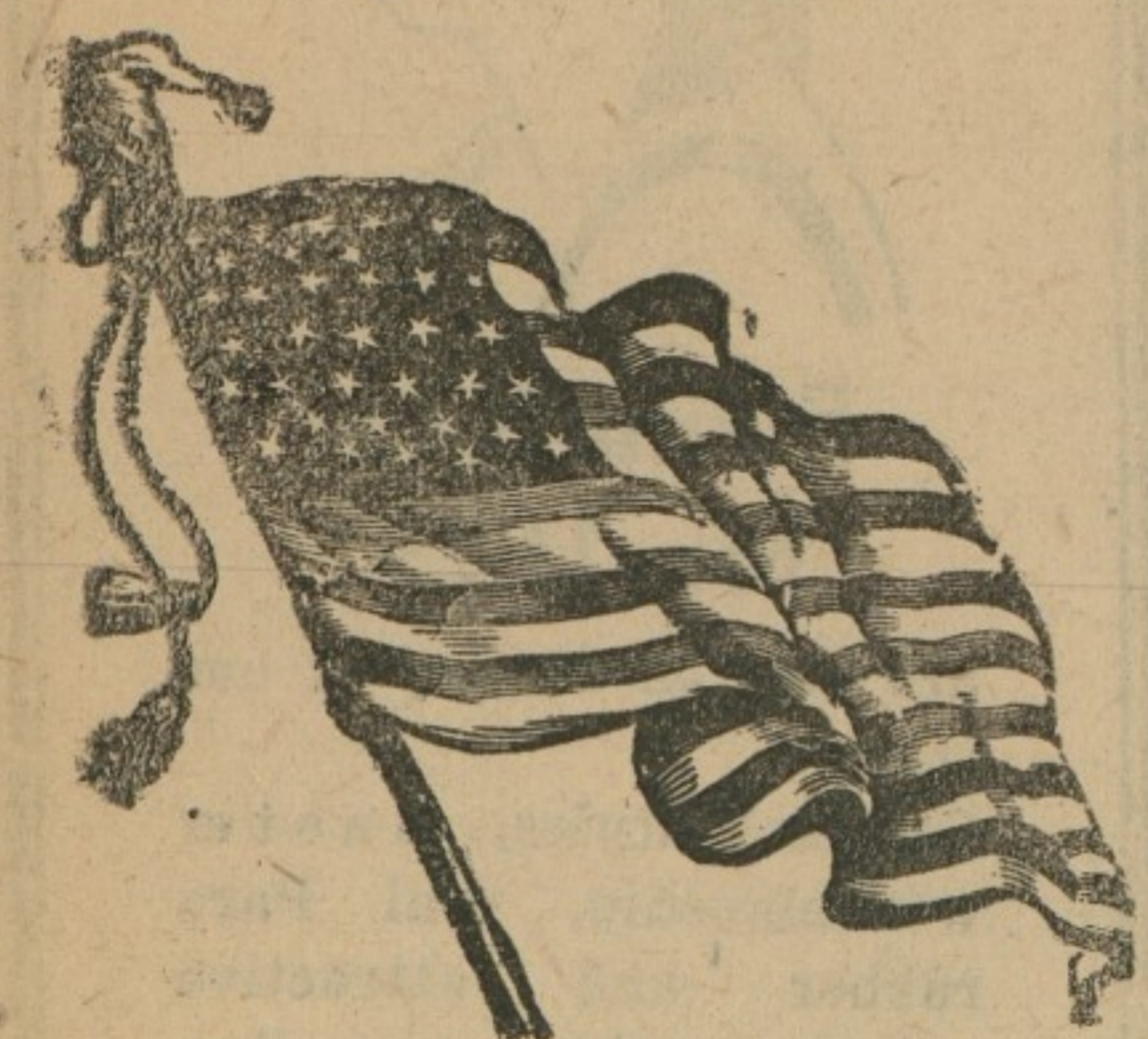

An earthquake visited the beautiful city of Santa Barbara in California Monday killing 12 persons and causing \$50,000,000 of damage to property. The citizens have already begun to rebuild.

Reorganization of the prohibition enforcement system, involving obliteration of State lines, decentralization of authority and the creation of new supervisory districts concurring with the Federal judicial districts is announced by the Treasury. The sweeping changes are to become operative August 1. They are designed to build up a distance Federal enforcement system without sacrificing co-operation between Federal and local enforcement agencies.

With the tri-district wage scale conference of the anthracite miners only a few days distant and in advance of the formulation of demands, the hard-coal country is beginning to prepare for a supervision of mining when the existing contract expires August 31st.

The impression throughout the district is that the conference will formulate demands that the operators will not concede, and in turn will be confronted by demands of concessions from the operators that they will not grant. Therefore, the region believes that at least a short suspension of strike, whichever term is preferred, is inevitable.

TO CURB EXTRAVAGANT SCHOOL APPROPRIATIONS

The convention of county commissioners of the Western Maryland counties, held last week at Westminster, adopted a strong resolution against the present era of extravagance in public school expenditures, and a large part of the discussion at the meeting was devoted to the useless methods of teaching which have been foisted on the people by the so-called experts, who have practically revolutionized public education. They have submitted all sorts of fanciful courses for the old-time honored methods, on which were based the education of all the great and successful men and women who made our civilization what it has been in the past years, and what it is at the present time. There is no doubt but the boys and girls of the county sections are being educated in such a manner that they will not remain on the farms, and the evil is now growing to such an extent that it is becoming a menace to the continuance of the agricultural interests of the State and Nation. The resolution follows:

Bids On Painting

Bids on painting the outside of any or all of the school buildings named below are requested before Saturday July 18th, 1925, on which day they will be opened. Those painters who are interested in this work are asked to bid on labor alone and also to bid on both labor and paint, the painter under either arrangement to furnish all necessary equipment for doing the work. The paint on which bids are made must contain no oil other than pure linseed oil and no lead other than Lewis' or Buck's white lead, or lead of a quality equal to those two. The colors desired are pease gray for the body of the building and white for trimming.

The paint on which bids are made must be named in the bids. All surfaces where any of the old paint is still on are to be scraped and two good coats of paint applied. All glazing is to be done by the painter and, broken glass replaced and new glass put in windows where needed. It is desired that all work be done between August 1st, 1925, and September 10th, 1925, but special arrangements as to time for doing the painting can be made if necessary.

A large part of local taxes paid by the farmer should be supplanted by State taxes and the revenues should be distributed entirely a way as to benefit the entire State.

This is the opinion of the Department of Agriculture, expressed following the completion of a series of tax studies which show that in many States a heavy burden of taxation on farmers have been added to by what amounts to local taxation for State purposes.

Pointing that the levying of taxes locally for purposes of more than local scope tends to increase the unfair tax burden of agriculture, the department says that this is true to a large extent of school and road taxes.

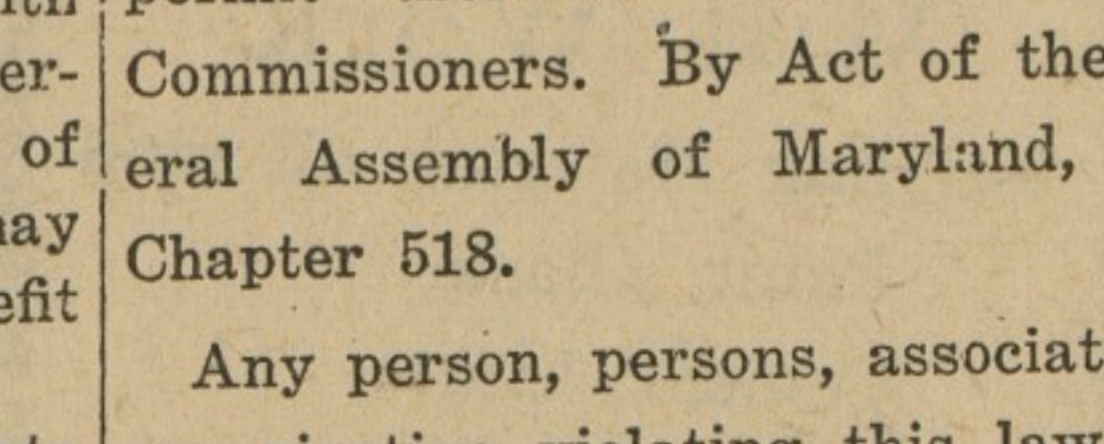
