HOW A KENT BOY WON The Baltimore American has the following comment on the interesting story of the late Hugh Wallis published in the Kent News last week: "Like a story of the mid-Victorian type of uplift literature is that revealed by the filing of the will of Hugh Wallis, once an Eastern Shore farm boy, who accumulated a fortune of \$800,000.

Probably Hugh Wallis' youthful acquaintances in Kent county laughed at him because he would not spend his hard-earned money in having a "good time." Always there is somebody to do that, for it requires neither courage nor brains.

Wallis piled up his meager coins until he had \$100 all his own. He went to Washington, spent his capital in opening a restaurant that was extremely modest even for those days, worked hard, made friends, saved and invested his money, lived happily and died honored by all.

His formula for success was so simple that all who observed him knew what it was. It is not new. It is familiar wherever men have fought circumstances and won. And it still has inspiration for ambitious men and women who really went to be worth while."

HOLIDAY ACCIDENTS Bad Automobile Wreck Near Betterton—16 Cases Tried Before Police Justice in Chestertown.

James Aiken Kirk, and William Calloway, both of Baltimore, were carried to Union Hospital in Elkton Sunday night suffering painful injuries sustained when an automobile in which they were riding was forced off the State road near Betterton, striking another car and wrecking the machine. Mr. Kirk had both legs broken, and is badly bruised about the body. Mr. Calloway has a broken collar bone, several ribs broken and is badly bruised about the body.

The accident occurred at Redding's Corner, between Betterton and Still Pond, when a Ford car driven by Herbert Jones, colored, of this county, collided with a car at the intersection of the roads. Jones was badly hurt about the left arm and back.

Automobile officer Ray had his hands full during the holidays. He made arrests for various offences including speeding, driving without license, exchanging licenses, etc. The fines paid to Justice Collins for violations comprised \$140 fines one day; \$35 another day, and \$40 on each of two evenings. There were about 20 cases of all kinds.

Harrison Tighman's car of Worton, was struck by a passing car on Saturday night near Chestertown and damaged about \$50. The driver of the passing car paid the damage and apologized. He was trying to avoid striking a car which was lying on its side in the ditch.

Harvey Morris, aged 38 years, a popular and industrious young farmer, living on the farm of his uncle, Edgar J. Watson, at Lankford, died in Mercy Hospital, Baltimore, following an acute attack of appendicitis last Sunday morning.

Mr. Morris was seized with the attack while in town last week and was carried to the hospital, but his condition was found to be beyond human aid.

His remains were brought home on Monday and funeral was held from the home of his uncle J. G. E. Watson, on Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock; conducted by Revs. Randall and Hanby. He leaves a widow and two children; also his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John E. Morris; one brother, Walter Morris; also two sisters, Mrs. Percy Hendrickson, and Miss Frances Morris. The pall bearers were Walter T. Morris, Walter Morris, Robert Morris, Norman Crouch, Tilden Brice, Robert Loud; interment in Chester Cemetery; C. L. Dodd, undertaker.

Mrs. Rosa Etta Davis, widow of the late George W. Davis, died at her late home in Rock Hall on Friday, July 3rd, after a long illness, aged 74 years. She leaves the following children: Thomas Franklin, William James, George H. Davis, Mrs. Annie E. Apsley, Lawrence O. Davis, Carroll Davis, Chas. B. Davis; also 17 grandchildren. Funeral was held from the Rock Hall M. E. Church on Sunday morning at 10 a. m., conducted by Rev. W. H. Revella. The bearers were her six sons; interment in Wesley Chapel; Chas. L. Dodd, undertaker.
