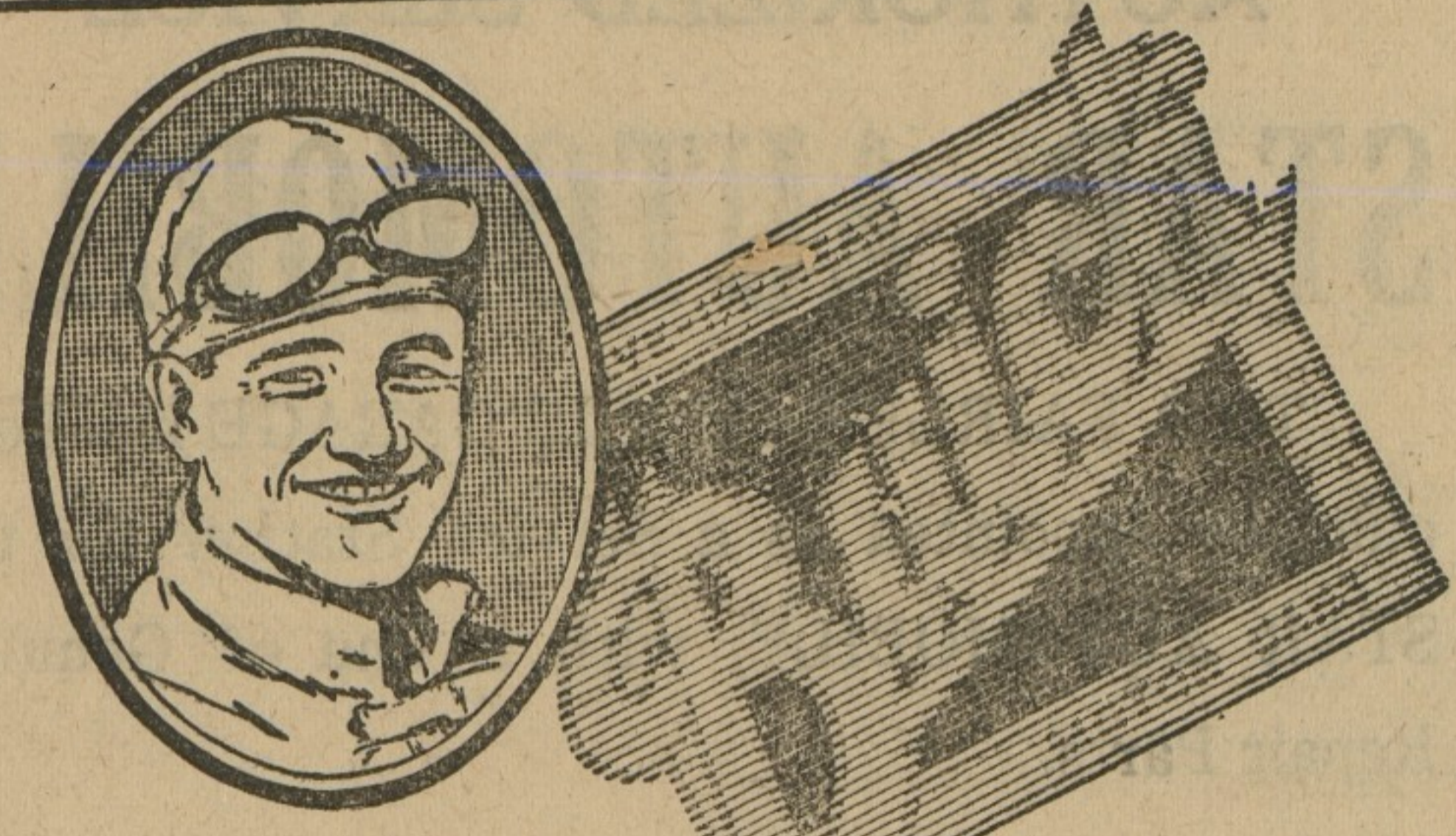

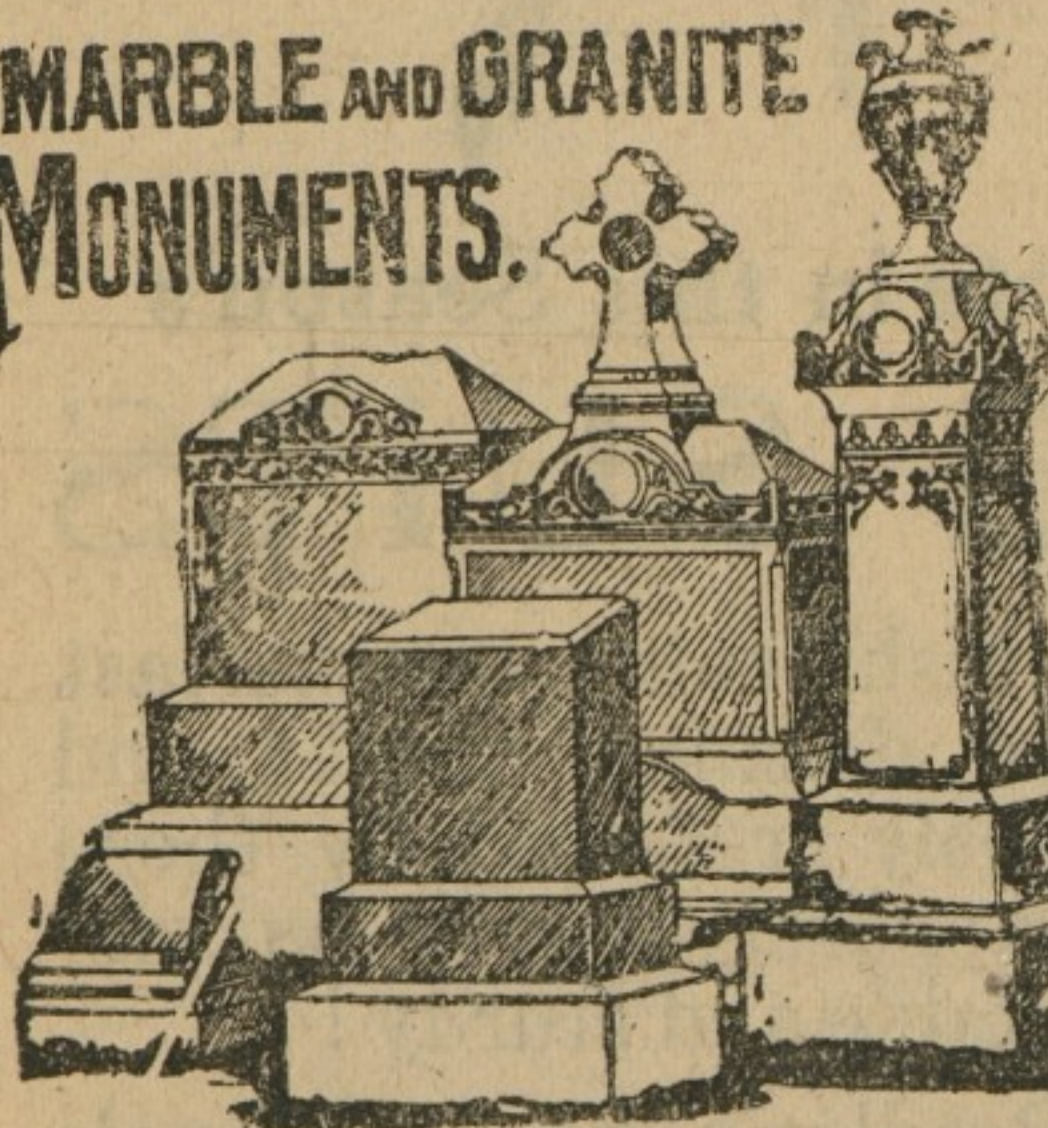

Scholarship Examination. A competitive examination for a free scholarship at Washington College including tuition, board, room and text books for a period of four years beginning September, 1925, will be held Tuesday, August 18th, 1925, in the Court House, Chestertown, Md. at 10.00 a. m.

The requirements are that each applicant shall have completed successfully a four year high school course or the equivalent of the same.

The examination will be given in the following subjects:

- 1. English — Grammar and Rhetoric. 2. Elementary Algebra. 3. Plane Geometry. 4. Modern European and American History. 5. Latin.

Applicants will be required to take the examinations in any four of the above subjects.

Those desiring to take this examination are required to file with the Register of Wills, Chestertown, Md., not later than August 6th, 1925, their applications with certificates as to mental and moral qualifications.
