### Reports Japanese Beetle In Chestertown Yards

The Japanese Beetle is said to have reached Chestertown. Rose bushes and fruit trees at the home of H. W. Fallowfield, E. S. Pyle and others on Mt. Vernon avenue have been attacked. This pest has been doing great injury in adjoining States so much so that a quarantine has been ordered. The bug buries himself during the day but at night works in swarms and makes a noise like rain on leaves of a tree.

The true Japanese beetle is a very beautiful insect some half inch in length with brilliant brown wings, a green thorax, or head development, white spots appear at the top rear portion of the body, six on each side, and the under portion of the whole body of the beetle is a brilliant greenish brown. In general appearance the beetle is not unlike the common potato bug known to all farmers.

While inroads by this pest have certainly not been known in this section heretofore, it is well worthwhile for every farmer to be on the lookout for the presence of the beetle. Prompt action in notifying the County Agent here may tend toward quickly controlling any outbreaks that occur, and no authorities on the subject are able to prophesy at what time or in what place the beetle will appear.

### Straw Stack Burns—Horse Loses Its Tail

A Thomas Fowler has the sympathy of a large circle of friends in his series of accidents which occurred thru no fault of his new rig when he started recently.

The machine was at work on Ollie Ford's yard when the stack yard took fire and a rick of straw consumed. Then after this excitement another peculiar incident occurred. While being driven near the threshing machine on the stackyard the horse switched its tail, getting it caught in the whirling belt of the machine. The tail was entirely stripped of hair and skin. The animal ran away but was caught and given treatment.

Then there were other stoppages of the usual kind, but thru them all Mr. Fowler kept up his courage and patience and is now threshing wheat with success.

It is said that there were three men about the machine stunned by lightning the same day.

Saturday afternoon an alarm was turned in from the farm of Benjamin F. Rash at Worton, and the fire company responded quickly, but a straw rick which had caught fire was destroyed before the firemen reached the scene. They prevented the fire from reaching the outbuildings though it had burned its way across the stable field.

### CHURCH HILL MAN ENDS LIFE WITH SHOTGUN

Carrying out his oft-repeated threat to end his life, Howard Clannahan, a carpenter, of Church Hill, committed suicide Thursday night in a little abandoned tenant house adjoining the farm, near Church Hill. His body was found Friday morning about 7 o'clock by Richard DeFord, who resides near Hinder's Hill.

The man had placed the barrel of a shotgun back of his ear and pulled the trigger with his toe. Continued despondency is believed to have been the motive. A coroner's jury impaneled by Magistrate Coursey, of Centreville, brought in a verdict of suicide.

Clannahan made his home in various times with W. C. Hall, in Church Hill, and Horace Fleming, a farmer near that town. Mrs. Hall testified that he had frequently threatened to end his life. Clannahan had told friends in considerable detail that some day he would take a shotgun and end his life by placing the barrel to his head and pulling the trigger with his toe. He was unmarried.

### Hail Plays Havoc About Massey and Sassafras

The major part of Kent county escaped the torrential downpour of rain which, accompanied by a terrific wind and hail storm, swept over part of Cecil and the northern part of the county Sunday afternoon, tearing down corn and ruining tomatoes. The storm hit with most severe intensity in the vicinity of Massey and Sassafras. Hail stones as big as guinea eggs were picked up by the residents and tremendous damage was done corn and tomatoes. Among the farmers whose fields were riddled and who suffered more or less loss were the following:

### DEATHS

James D. Davis, of Galena, Md., died suddenly last Sunday morning, about four o'clock, aged 88 years. He was a remarkable man for his years and was enjoying splendid health until a few hours before his death. He was born near Milford, Del., December 18th, 1836. In 1860, he engaged in farming near Smyrna, Delaware.

He was drafted in the Civil War, but was not called. In 1864 he moved to the vicinity of Middletown, Del., after which he moved to Kent County, Md., and continued farming until 1914 when he retired remaining at the old homestead until 1921, when he moved to his home in Galena, Md.

In November 1881 he was married to Miss Josephine Staats, daughter of Miss Mary A. Staats, of Sassafras, Md., who survives him with five children: M. Earle, James D., Jr., Olin S., Mrs. Helen Spry, all of near Galena, and Mrs. Joseph Craddock, of Moore, Pa., and twelve grandchildren.

Mr. Davis was a devout Methodist and was identified in church work wherever he resided.

The funeral services were held at his late home on Tuesday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock, and were in charge of Rev. A. P. Prettyman, a life long friend of the family, assisted by Rev. George E. Sterling, of Bridgeville, a former pastor of the M. E. Church of Galena, Md., interment was made in Forest Cemetery, Middletown, Del.

The bearers were six nephews: C. H. Davis, Arthur M. Davis, J. C. Davis, Ernest M. Davis, of near Middletown, Mark H. Davis, of Kemblesville, Pa., and George C. Trank, of Wilmington, Del.

Mrs. Margaret Shriver Hendrickson, widow of J. E. Hendrickson, of Philadelphia, died suddenly at her home July 10, age 70 years. She was buried Tuesday at 10 a. m. at Laurel Hill Cemetery. Several friends and relatives from the county attended the funeral.

Mrs. Anna Whittington, 50 years old, wife of George Whittington, died Monday night following a stroke, from which she never regained consciousness, in Wilmington. Mrs. Whittington was born in Chestertown. She was a member of God's Full Gospel Mission. She is survived by her husband and eight children. Mrs. Frank MacAvaney, Mrs. Frank Edwards, Clayton and Raymond Whittington, Mrs. Ladella Cahall, Winfield and Katherine Whittington and Mrs. Granville Richards; also nine grandchildren. Funeral services were held at her late residence, 911 Junction street, Elsmere, on Friday at 2 o'clock, interment in Silverbrook Cemetery.

Robert Shroyer, 28 years old, convicted of wife beating, Tuesday was whipped at the post by Sheriff Ingomar W. Although, of Frederick county. Ten lashes were applied with a regulation black-snake whip under sentence passed last Monday by Magistrate Guy K. Motter. Shroyer shook hands with the sheriff when the sentence had been carried out. The whipping took place in the privacy of the Frederick county jail with only three witnesses and a physician present. It was the first whipping of a white man in the state in several years. Under Maryland law the punishment for wife beating may be either a jail term or the whipping post, in the discretion of the magistrate.
