Omar D. Crothers, of Elkton, has been named a member of the Accident Commission at a salary of \$5,000.

A jury in the Suffolk County Superior Court by a verdict returned Saturday morning awarded \$1,314.24 to John B. Bolton, of Philadelphia, in his suit for \$6,000,000 against John M. Vanhusen, of Jamaica Plain to recover 30 per cent of whatever Vanhusen may have made out of the sale of the Vanhusen soft collar.

The Susquehanna river toll bridge at Havre de Grace was used by 7,475 motor vehicles during July 3 to 5, according to figures made public by officials of the State Roads Commission.

In spite of the record number of vehicles using the bridge for the three-day period, the record for a single day's use was not equaled. This record was made July 6, 1924, when \$2,385.55 was collected in tolls.

The total deposits in the five banks of Kent county as shown by statements published in Kent News are \$4,059,565.65. This is about \$50,000 more than a year ago and over \$200,000 more than 1923.

Practically for the first time in five years there is an unmistakable rainbow of prosperity breaking across the sky for the farmer. And this is particularly true in Kent county, where, in striking contrast with conditions in many sections, there is a very satisfactory crop of wheat, with a profitable market price.

Eighty-nine malnourished and underweight children are now being cared for at the "Miracle House," which is maintained by the Maryland Tuberculosis Association at Clai-borne, Md. Since the opening on June 1st, approximately one hundred and thirty children have received the beneficial treatment afforded at the "Miracle House."

In June a great many of the children were of the pre-school age, and in order that more of these may have the beneficial treatment, the "Miracle House" will this year be kept open until October, so that the pre-school age child may have the opportunity of spending a few weeks in September.
