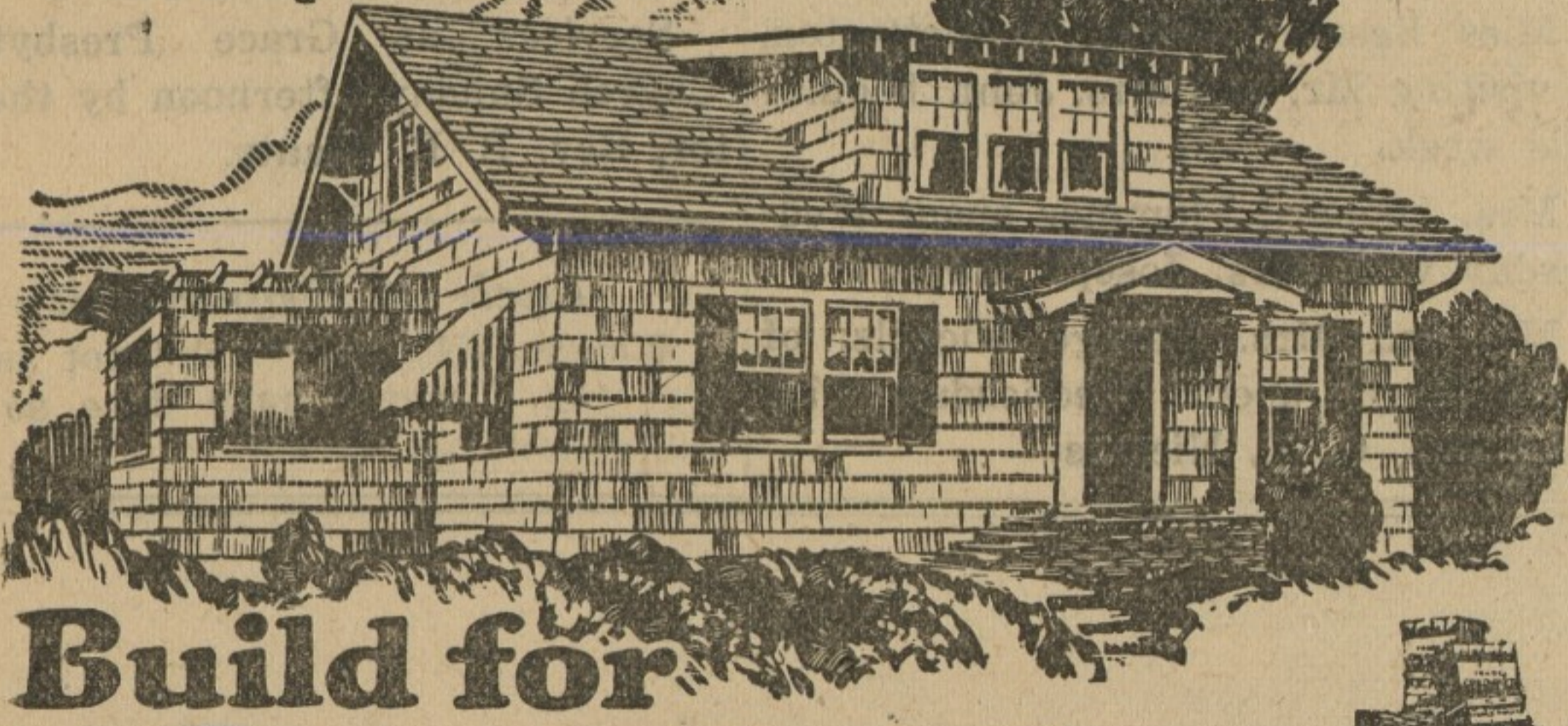

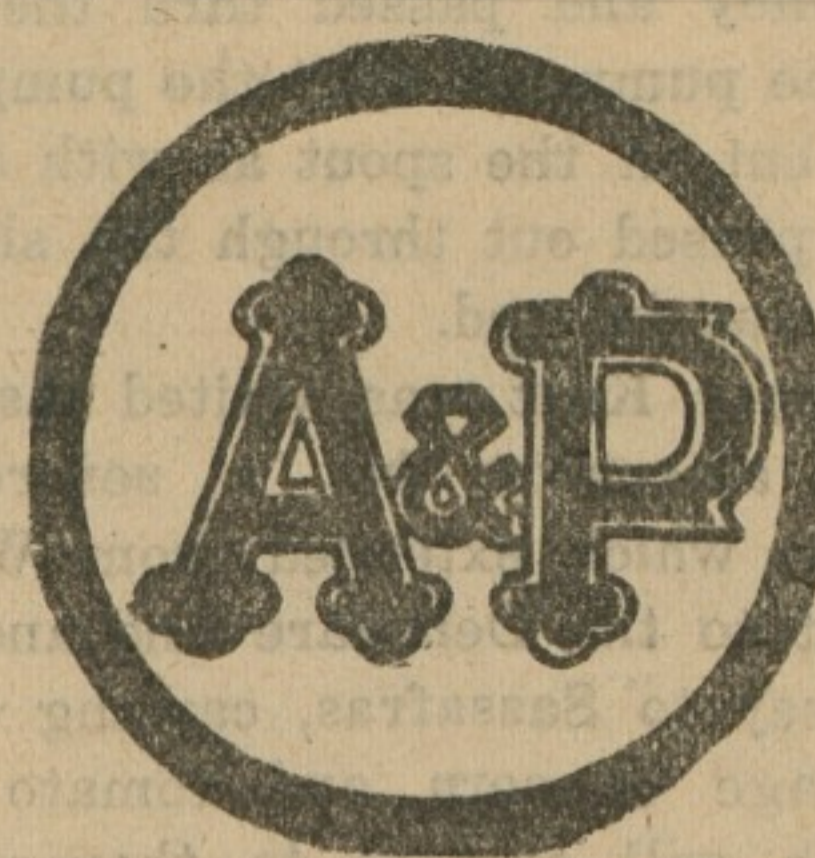

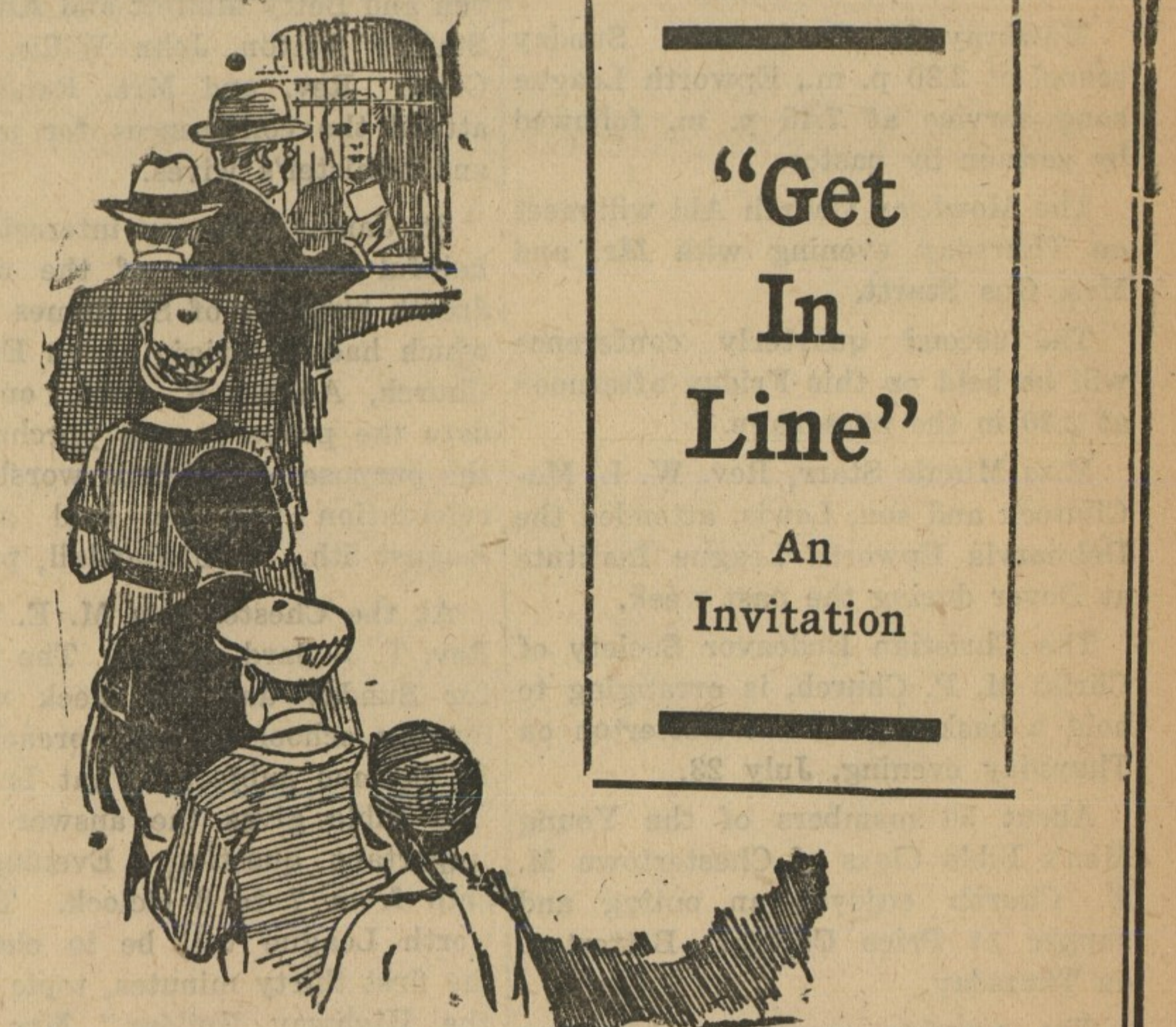

Bids On Painting

Bids on painting the outside of any or all of the school buildings named below are requested before Saturday July 18th, 1925, on which day they will be opened. Those painters who are interested in this work are asked to bid on labor alone and also to bid on both labor and paint, the painters under either arrangement to furnish all necessary equipment for doing the work. The paint on which bids are made must contain no oil other than pure linseed oil and no lead other than Lewis' or Buck's white lead, or lead of a quality equal to those two. The colors desired are pearl gray for the body of the building and white for trimming. The paint on which bids are made must be named in the bids. All surfaces where any of the old paint is still on are to be scraped and two good coats of paint applied. All glazing is to be done by the painter and, broken glass replaced and new glass put in windows where needed. It is desired that all work be done between August 1st, 1925, and September 10th, 1925, but special arrangements as to time for doing the painting can be made if necessary.
