ANNUAL CLUB WEEK

Approximately three hundred boy and girl club members from farms and rural communities in every county of the State are expected at College Park August 6 to 11 to take part in the annual Club Week.

A program of instruction in the production of farm crops and in the raising of livestock and poultry is being planned by E. G. Jenkins, State Boys' Club Agent for the Boys. For the girls an equally interesting program is being arranged by Miss Dorothy Emerson, Girls' Club Agent, in the household arts.

The 4-H Clubs, as they are known, are organized in the various counties by the county and home demonstration agents. The clubs usually hold regular meetings and are given systematic instruction in the various phases of agriculture and home work. In many of the counties the club members are given encouragement by Farm Bureaus and other local farmers' organizations as well as by the banks, business men's organizations and public spirited individuals. For several years, the club work in the State, has received the support of the Maryland State Bankers' Association which annually appropriates money for its advancement.

MILK ORDINANCE FOR CHESTERTOWN

The following ordinance was passed by the Town Committee at its regular meeting on July 6th, 1925, at the request of the State Board of Health:

Be it enacted and ordained by the Mayor and Council of Chestertown, Maryland.

Section 1.—Every person before selling or offering for sale any milk or cream in the City of Chestertown shall first obtain from the Mayor and Council of Chestertown, a permit or license to do so. Every such permit or license shall be issued by the Town Clerk and Treasurer on the recommendation of the Board of Health, and a fee of one dollar shall be paid for every such license or permit.

Section 2.—Every application for a license or permit to sell milk or cream shall be made to the Secretary of the Board of Health of Chestertown on printed forms, furnished by the said Board and approved by the Mayor and Council of Chestertown.

Section 3.—Whenever a proper application for a license or permit to sell milk or cream is made to the Secretary of the Board of Health, he shall make, or cause to be made, a thorough inspection of the herd, the premises, the wagon, the stabling, and the employees of said applicant and similarly of those producers from whom the applicant may purchase milk or cream, and if the said Board of Health, is satisfied that all the conditions are healthy and sanitary, he shall issue a certificate to the Town Clerk and Treasurer stating that the said applicant is entitled to a license or permit to sell milk and cream.

Section 4.—The Board of Health with the approval of the Mayor and Council of Chestertown, shall prescribe such rules and regulations as may be necessary for the stabling, feeding and watering of all cattle used for the production of milk and cream to be sold in the city of Chestertown and also such rules and regulations as may be requisite for the care, handling, preserving, storing and inspection of all milk to be sold in the City of Chestertown. Such rules and regulations as may be adopted shall conform to the minimum requirements of those in force by the State Board of Health and State Board of Agriculture. Provided, however, that any town or city may make more stringent regulations.

Section 5.—Every licensed dealer in milk and cream shall have numbers to be furnished by the Mayor and Council of Chestertown, conspicuously displayed on both sides of his wagon or vehicle, together with the words "Milk or Milk Permit" printed in conspicuous size letters.

Section 6.—Every person who sells milk or cream shall be deemed to be a dealer within the meaning of this ordinance.

Section 7.—Every dealer in milk or cream, who does not produce the milk or cream he sells, shall file with the Secretary of the Board of Health a list of all persons from whom he obtains his supply of milk or cream.

Section 8.—Every holder of a license to sell milk or cream shall, or Health, supply in writing under oath if desired by the Health Officer, all information in regard to his her production of the milk and the storing, handling and marketing of the same. If he fails or refuse to give the information within five days the Board of Health shall notify the Town Clerk and Treasurer, and he shall cancel the license or permit of the person so refusing or neglecting to give the required information, and the said person shall not be licensed again until all the required information has been furnished and he has applied for and obtained a new license or permit.

Section 9.—The Secretary of the Board of Health, or his authorized representative may make an inspection of milk at any time and at any place, and all milk or cream that may be found to be below the required standard, or in any way unfit for consumption as food, shall be immediately destroyed, and the license or permit of such person canceled, if the Health Officer deems it proper to do so.

Said ordinance to take effect from August 1st, 1925.

Section 10.—Be it enacted and ordained by the Mayor and Council of Chestertown, that any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, or any of the regulations of the written request of the Board of the Board of Health, which have been approved by the Mayor and Council of Chestertown, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction before a Justice of the Peace having jurisdiction, or in the Circuit Court for Kent County shall be fined \$5.00 dollars for the first offense and \$50.00 dollars for each offense after the first, and in addition the aforesaid fine, may be imprisoned in the county jail for a period not less than three nor more than thirty days, in the discretion of the justice or court trying the case.

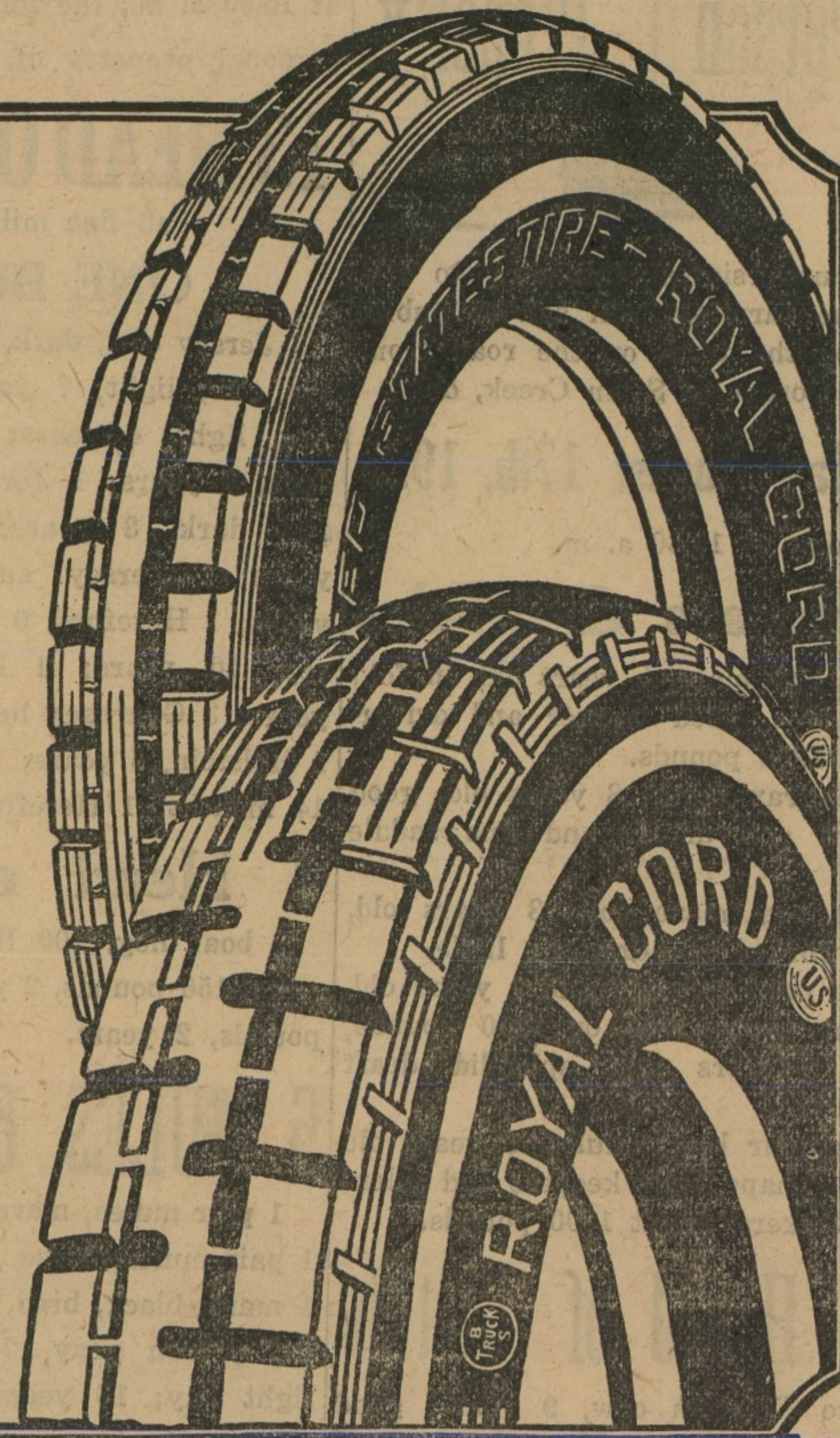

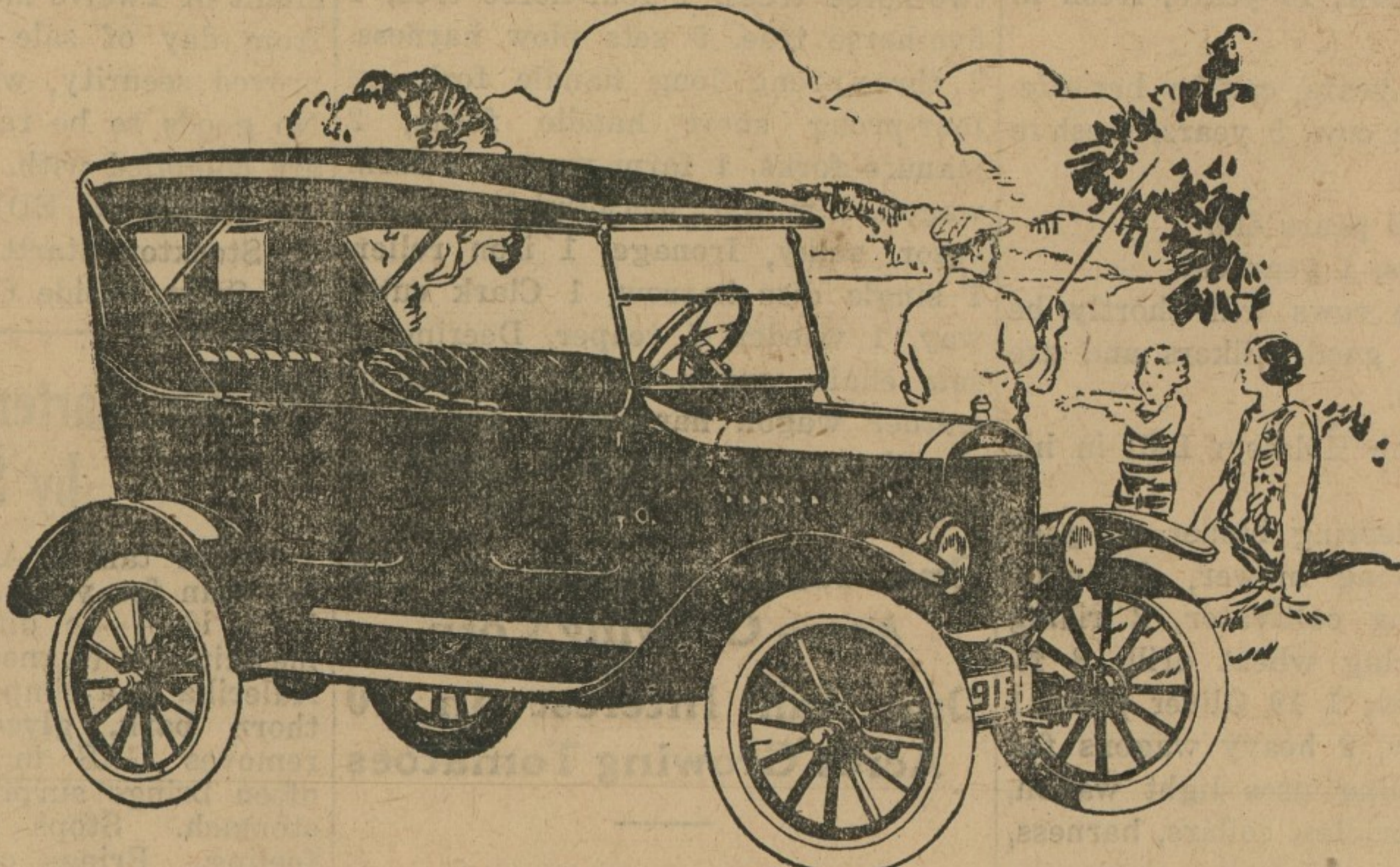
