KENT COUNTY TOMATO TOUR

Large Groups From Delaware And Eastern Shore Visit Tomato Growing Sections

Notwithstanding the busy season among the farmers of the county, a large number were at the court house yesterday morning to greet the tourists from Delaware and Eastern Shore counties who are making a tour of the tomato growing sections of the counties for the purpose of studying agricultural conditions as they relate to the growing of tomatoes. In the party were a number of Delaware growers and canners. County Agent Horace B. Derrick took charge of the tourists and conducted them to the farm of Linwood A. Sutton, near here, where an interesting lecture was given on the tomato growing in the Maryland-Delaware peninsula. From there the party visited the farms in the vicinity of Galena and Kennedyville, the heart of the tomato growing section in Kent county where plants were studied and methods of cultivation observed.

At twelve o'clock the party arrived at the farm of J. S. Frazer, near Bohemia Bridge, where they were met by farmers from Cecil county and upper sections of Delaware. Following a fine luncheon addresses were made by A. D. Radebaugh, plant specialist of the University of Maryland, Dr. Mann, of the University of Delaware, and H. S. Hall, representative of the Cambell Soap Company, of Camden, N. J., all of whom accompanied the tourists on the entire trip through Maryland and Delaware.

The purpose of the tour was to induce the farmers in the sections traversed to devote more attention to the growing of early tomatoes, not only because of the constantly increasing demand for green tomatoes and the big profits to be derived therefrom, but because of the greater profit in growing the early ripening crop, which pays far better than the late season varieties.

Mr. Derrick and Mr. Wm. G. Smyth, secretary of the County Farm Bureau, who have been managing the tomato situation in the county, will make an effort next year to induce a number of growers in the vicinity of convenient shipping points to grow green tomatoes for early northern markets, which have been a source of splendid revenue to the growers of Somerset and other lower shore counties during the present season.

The counting season will not open generally in Kent county before August 20th, and the prospect for a large "first" crop is not promising.
