Governor Ritchie has announced the following appointments for Cecil county: R. James Roe, justice of the peace at Port Deposit; Samuel Pierce, justice of the peace at Cecilton; Henry S. White, constable for the Cecilton district, and Wm. A. Brown, of Cecilton, a notary public.

U. S. Senator O. E. Weller was in town one day last week and was registered at the Voshell House, where he held an informal reception and conferred with a number of local Republicans.

RAIN STORM DOES MUCH DAMAGE

A storm that washed out two railroad bridges, ripped up tracks for several hundred feet, burst the Wye Mills dam, damaged roads, and at the same time helped late crops, broke over the Eastern Shore Thursday week and continued until late Friday.

The downpour appeared at its height at Wye Mills, reaching the proportion of a cloudburst. The weight of the water broke the dam at the lake and tons upon tons of the water rushed down the State road carrying almost everything with it.

The break occurred at four o'clock Friday afternoon, and chickens and hogs along the byways were carried to destruction.

The mills are without sufficient power, and the management is unable to say at this time what damage has been done and when the machinery will be in operation again.

The lake is a noted trout preserve of the State Conservation Commission. The loss of fish is not yet known.

An overhead bridge on the Pennsylvania, south of Millington, was washed from its abutments and the rush of water tore up tracks for a distance of 300 feet.

A train had stopped at Millington a few minutes before the washout was discovered, escaping probable wreck.

A force of workmen was rushed to the scene to restore traffic.

On the Baltimore and Eastern, between Wye Mills and Willoughby, a railroad bridge was washed out and all traffic was at a standstill.

So heavy was the rain near Millington that the new Eastern Shore trail between Millington and Sudlersville, which was only dedicated last Tuesday week by Gov. Ritchie, was inundated by four feet of water.

The Cambridge section welcomed a downpour that extinguished three forest fires that had caused an estimated damage of \$25,000 the last two days.
