This is one of the show places of lower Kent containing about 21 acres of land, a three-story house and other buildings and a beautiful lawn. Mr. Shallock expects to occupy the property himself. It will make a fine home.

Bennett's Point farm is situated at the extreme end of Queen Anne's county, and has several miles of beautiful water frontage on the Wye River. The land is very fertile and local game of all kinds are on it in plentiful quantities.

The property was owned for years by the Bennett family and many prominent figures of colonial history are buried on the estate. One of its colonial owners, Richard Bennett the third, at the time of his death was considered the wealthiest person of his time.

**PROF. BLADES DECLINES**  
We are glad to announce that Prof. Owen C. Blades has declined the appointment as vice principal of St. Michael's High School. As announced in the Kent News last week Prof. Blades has been appointed to the St. Michaels school, his home town, but the patrons of Chestertown High School will be gratified that this offer was made without any solicitation on his part and as soon as he received official notice of it he promptly declined the position. Prof. Blades says he will be back to his old position in the Chestertown on Sept. 14.

**TOMATO SEASON STARTS IN KENT**  
The tomato season is on. Kent county has 18 canning houses and they are all getting ready to start. The prospect is good for a fair crop of tomatoes but a big crop is not at 25 and 30 cents a basket. There are 2,000 acres that will trust to the open market.

There are about 6,000 acres in Kent in tomatoes. Of this number about 4,000 acres have been contracted for at 25 and 30 cents a basket.

There are about 22 water shipping points in Kent and from these points thousands of baskets of tomatoes will be shipped.

A small army of trucks are getting ready to haul the crop and have already made offers to bootleg tomatoes at 40 cents a basket.

Baldwin's cannery at Chestertown starts today. Elsewhere in the News W. K. Hackett & Son, at Still Pond, are advertising to buy 75,000 baskets of tomatoes on the open market.

Rock Hall and vicinity turned out in force Friday afternoon to witness the formal opening of the new cooperative cannery, which was the occasion for a big demonstration. County farm officials and members of the association which owns the cannery, the second of its kind to be operated in the county this season, were in attendance, and an inspection was made of the plant which cost about \$13,000 equipped. The building is 40x80 feet with large peeling sheds and is equipped with modern machinery.

The cannery will handle the output from 300 acres of tomatoes grown by members of the association, the canned product being sold and the proceeds divided among the members of the association after the cost of operation and a percentage on the principal invested are deducted. The cannery at Fairlee which will also be operated on the same basis, is ready for action, but the county will not be ready before the latter part of the month. Between 600 and 700 baskets were received at the Rock Hall plant on Friday and the machinery is in perfect working order.

Tomatoes from South Jersey are now being transported through the canal in considerable quantities to Baltimore and Cambridge, Md., where they are canned. One day last week there were twenty boats that locked through, each boat carrying approximately 3000 baskets of the fruit. The tomatoes are what are known as the early Jersey variety and are used only in the canning industry.

Kibler & Sons, in Chestertown, bought about 2,000 baskets the past week, starting at 30 cents and dropping to 25 cents later, Francis T. Price is also buying here.

**TWO FIRES HERE IN ONE DAY**  
Twice within twenty-four hours the Chestertown Volunteer Fire Company was called upon to fight dangerous fires, on Monday and early Tuesday morning.

About 11.30 a. m., Monday, fire was discovered under the roof of Mrs. Wm. R. Aldridge's house on High street. The house is occupied by Washington I. Woodall and family.

Mrs. Woodall and daughter, Miss Dorothy, were seated on the front porch when a passerby told them their house was ablaze.

The Chestertown Fire Company responded with both trucks and had the fire out in short order but not until considerable damage was done by both fire and water.

A group of Boy Scouts from Baltimore, passing through town on the way to their camp near Emory's Wharf, did good work in keeping the crowds back and cleaning out the debris.

The loss is fully covered by insurance in the Jos. N. Wheatley Agency. Fire of unknown origin destroyed the house of Frank Fowler, colored, on College avenue, about 2.30 a. m., Tuesday.

Fowler who is head chef at Washington College, had gone to Baltimore on the last Tolchester boat, on Monday, and his wife has been in Virginia for sometime. No one was supposed to be in the house at the time of the fire.

Trucks 1 and 2 of the Chestertown Fire Company responded to the alarm and, although the house was beyond saving soon had the flames under control and managed to save an adjoining house that had started to burn.

It was insured in the Kent Mutual Fire Insurance Company of Kent County, Md., for \$400.
