SWIMMING INTEREST ON THE INCREASE

The finals in the swimming and diving contests at Rolph's Wharf took place Wednesday afternoon last. In the 50-yard dash the winner was Eddie Williams, of New Haven, Conn., with Billy Usilton, of Chestertown, a close second and Jack Nickerson, of Chestertown, third. In the diving Eddie Williams also won with Joe Russell second. The Women's Swimming Association of New York made a clean sweep of the National A. A. O. Aquatic championship concluded in Detroit on Sunday. They scored 81 out of a possible 108 points. Miss Adelaide Lambert, formerly of Chestertown, is a member of the N. Y. W. S. A. The New York Herald-Tribune says: Several surprises marked the competition, but none to compare with the totally unexpected success of Miss Lambert in the 300-yard medley swim. She nosed out Miss Nilsson, world's record holder in the event, though the latter swam better than ever she had, as made clear by the fact that when allowance is made for the gain at the turns, Miss Lambert's new standard of 4:38 2-5 for a 110 yard course is at least seven seconds better than Miss Nilsson's mark of 4:56 2-5 for a seventy-five foot pool. Miss Elizabeth Crew, who has been at Camp Abena, Belgrade Lake, Maine, since July 1, is expected home next week. Miss Crew has won first honors in target shooting, swimming, diving, and horse back-riding. Out of a total of four events in a swimming meet she won two first places and two seconds. The second weekly swimming contests and fancy diving at Betterson on Thursday last were hotly contested. A large number of spectators witnessed the events under the direction of Prof. F. M. Touchstone, Athletic coach of Yale University. The Betterson Water Carnival will be held on Saturday, August 29th. The 50-yard dash was very close between E. Bardo, of the Delaware Amateur Athletic Union, and Billy Usilton, of Chestertown, the former winning by only a foot. Eddie Williams, of New Haven, Conn., was also in this race and came in third. The next meet will take place at Betterson next Thursday at 2:30 p. m. Margaret Crew continued her good work by winning two firsts and one third. Eddie Williams won the diving with Billy Usilton second, and Joe Russell third. In the 50-yard side stroke junior race, S. Townshend of Chestertown, won by several yards but was disqualified on account of not sticking entirely to the side stroke. The following were the point winners: Boys over 16 years, E. Bardo 10, E.
