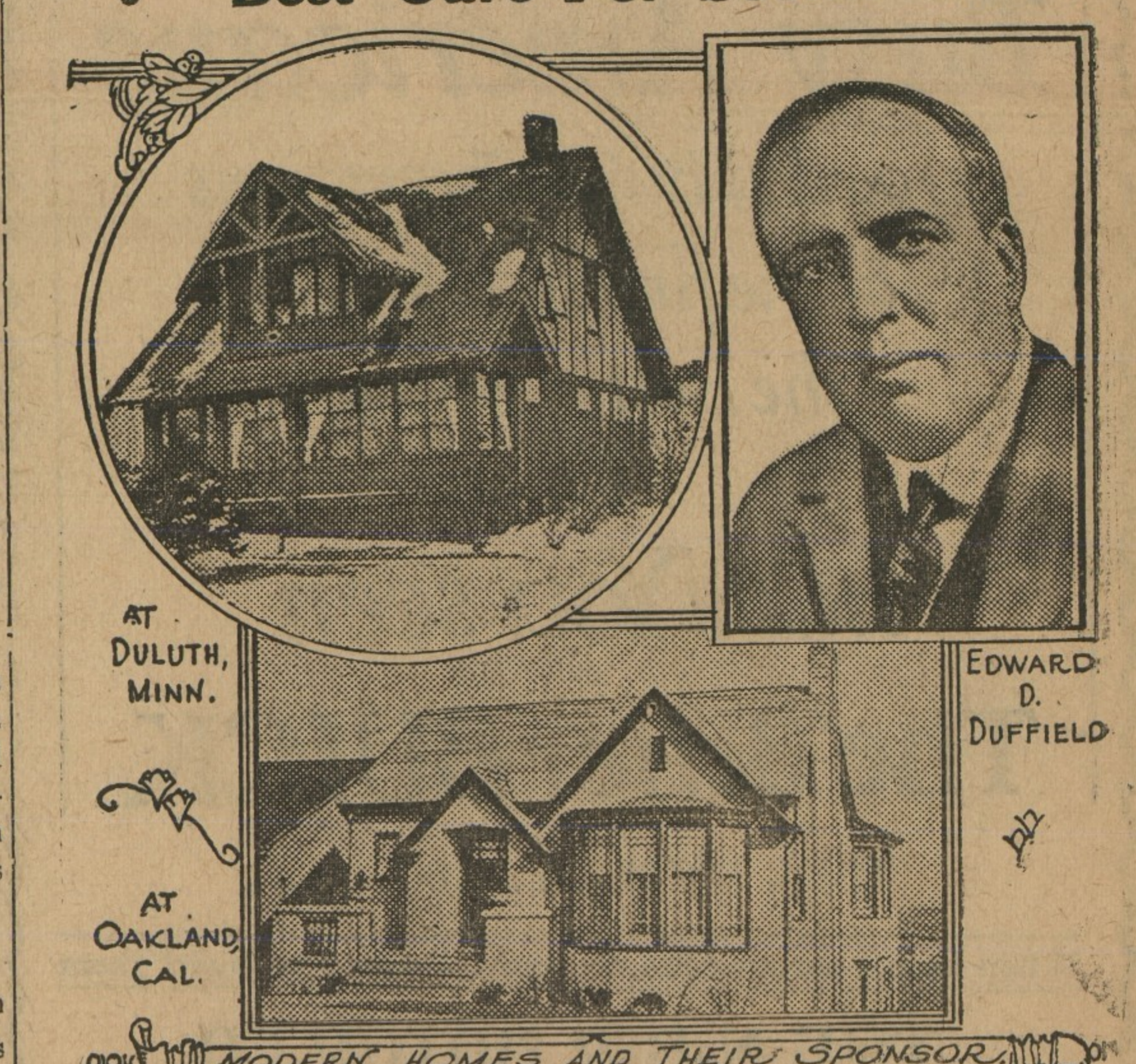

Advocates Better Homes As Best Curb For Social Unrest



"One of the greatest sources of social discontent is that of improper and unsanitary housing which occurs in our large cities," is the contention of Edward D. Duffield, president of the Prudential Insurance Company, which organization during 1924 relieved the housing shortage by making loans on dwellings and apartments covering property accommodating 25,878 families.
