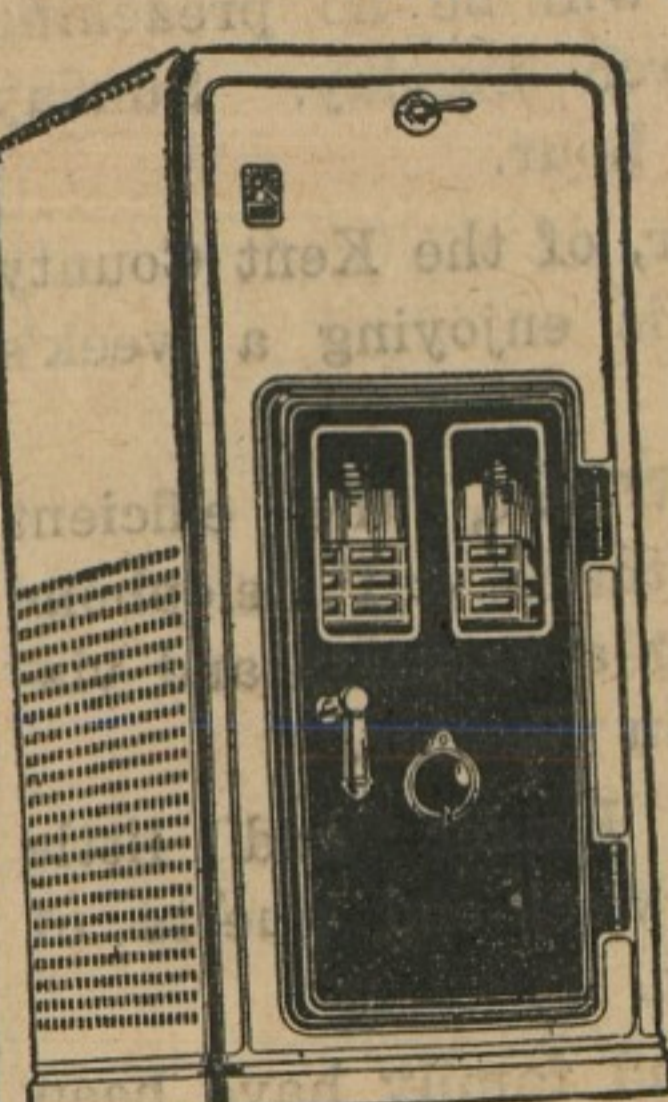

What Tomatoes Did For A Boy

Tomatoes paved the way for the partnership between Norman E. Pennington and Bess Clothilde Pontiac Burke of Kennedyville. Norman was 12 years old, Bess but seven months. He wanted her—but money talked. And Norman was short on cash. Then the tomatoes entered in. Norman raised a crop, sold it for \$65—and the Holstein heifer was his! That was in May 1921. The following fall, Norman exhibited Bess at the Maryland State Fair. She won a first prize of \$40 in the Club Class and an additional premium of \$25 presented by the Maryland State Holstein Association—and Norman's purchase money was back in his pocket. The next year Bess was again shown at the fair. She won first prize as a senior heifer in the Boys' Club Class and carried away second honors in open competition. Since then she has consistently "cleaned up," now holding the State championship. In a seven-day advanced registry test she produced 666.1 pounds of milk and 26.6 pounds of butterfat—the State record for three-year-old heifers. Her 14-day test showed a production of 1223.5 pounds of milk and 52.026 pounds of butterfat. The tomato money, says Norman, brought good returns.

IMPORTANT CANNERS MEETING MONDAY

A critical situation has arisen in marketing canned tomatoes. Farmers and canners at the beginning of the year had every prospect of a successful season, but just about the time the canning houses were ready to open the market dropped and the canners were caught with high priced raw tomatoes to be sold to a low priced market.

Following the prevalent custom of trading, canners began selling "futures" last January and February. The opening prices were based on a price of 90c to 95c a dozen for No. 2 size can, and these prices ruled slight fluctuation until August 10.

Canners in the spring contracted with the farmers for tomatoes at 25c to 30c a basket, and believed that at the market price of 90c a dozen they could realize only a small profit. During the week of August 10, before canning was under way, the market price dropped from 90c to 80c per dozen. Such a market decline from 10c to 80c cost price immediately before canning has never occurred before.

Some of the trade journals and other observers think the decline in price is due to the unwillingness of grocers to buy at any price, and that this attitude of merchants is caused by the publicity of this decline in price and the comments of trade journals have convinced leading canners and commission houses that the canners should do what they can to restate themselves and their products in the minds of their customers. With this end in view a meeting was held in the New Theatre, Easton, on Monday.

The meeting was addressed by Walter B. Timms, of New York, who is one of the best informed and most prominent men in the canned goods business. He was formerly a member of the firm of Austin, Nichols & Co., Inc., the largest wholesale grocers in the world, and is now the active New York partner in Warmington, Timms & Co., leading canned goods brokers. This meeting was called to save the situation, and nearly every canner in Maryland and Delaware attended.

There are over 400 tomato canners in Maryland and Delaware, canning an annual average pack of about 6,000,000 cases, worth from \$12,000,000 to \$15,000,000 each year. The pack this year may exceed 7,000,000 cases. With the prices based on 80c per dozen for the No. 2 size most of them will sustain considerable loss. Many of them are not able to stand this loss, and if it becomes necessary to sell the product at lower prices it would affect many of the thousands of farmers who grow tomatoes.

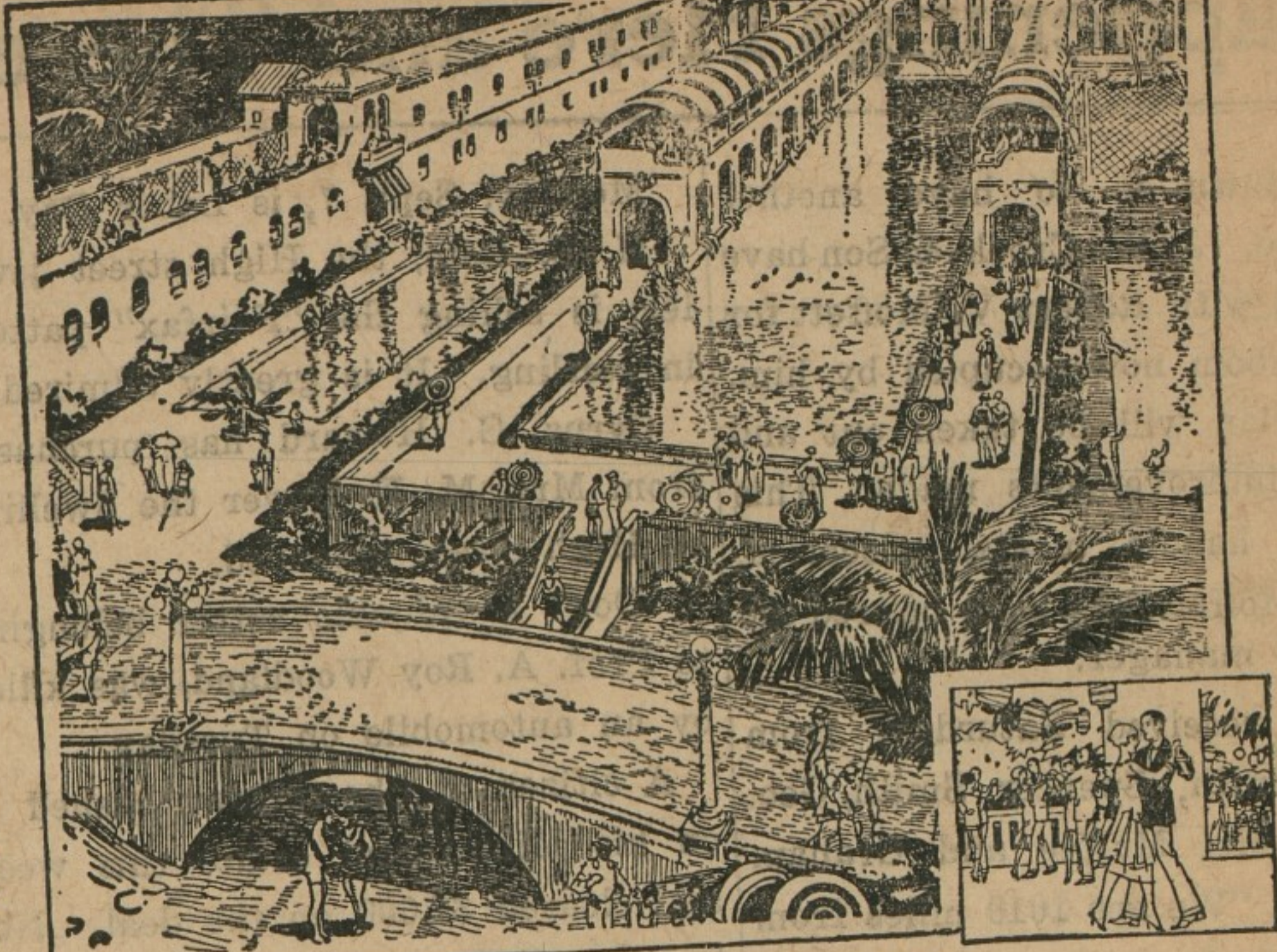
The canners agreed that they must improve the quality of their pack and thus be able to get more for their output.
