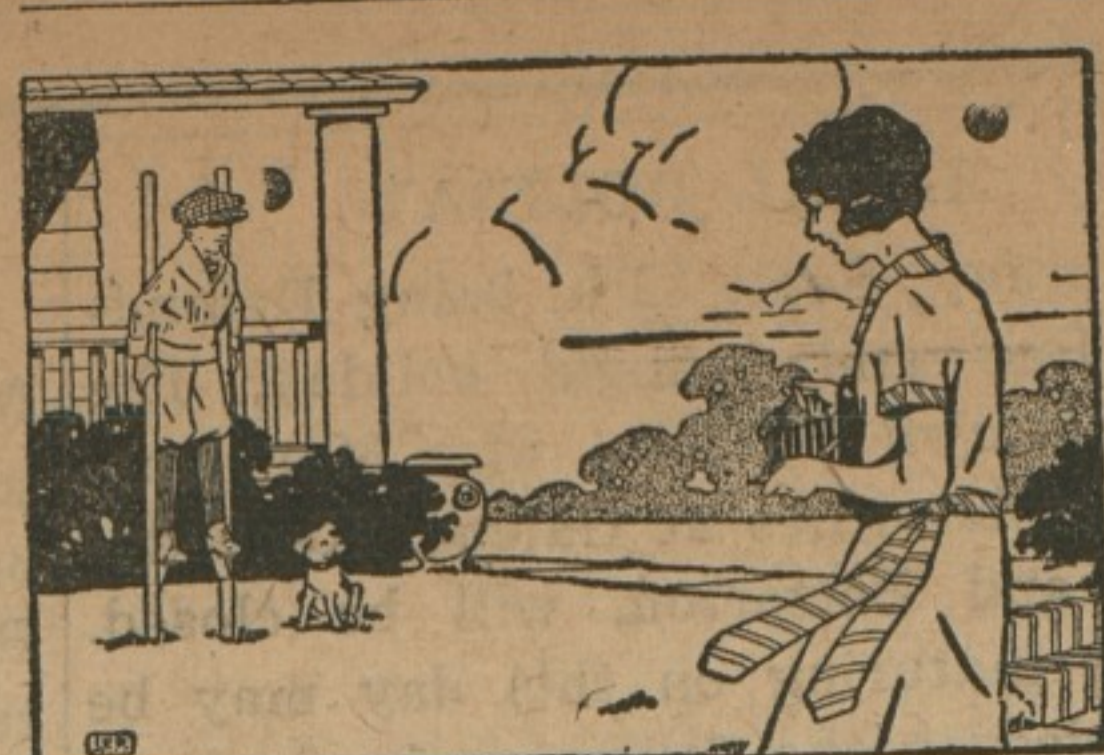

KENT WINS 4 PRIZES

Rev. Louis B. Sheen, of St. Paul's Church, Meets With Accident While Taking One OF The Hurdles—Sunny Fox, Owned By Wilbur R. Hubbard, Wins Point-to-Point Race.

Sunny Fox, the handsome bay horse owned by Wilbur Ross Hubbard, of Chestertown, was the winner Saturday of the silver cup in the point-to-point race, the most important event of the fifth annual Queen Anne's County Horse Show, defeating High Ball, owned by Miss Maria McKenney, of Centreville, who had won the race both in 1923 and 1924.

The silver cup offered by the Maryland Jockey Club for half-bred colts was captured by Sly Fox, owned by John McKenney.

Duke John, the handsome stallion owned by the Maryland Jockey Club and entered by Dulin Clark, of Centreville, was awarded the silver cup in the jumping class. The cup in the poney-jumping class went to Wilson Dukes.

In the saddle class, Mrs. Richard Carvel, of Chestertown, won the cup and Charles Quimby's Mabel II was awarded the cup in the flat race. Miss Nancy Wilson, of Centreville, won the cup in the class suitable to become hunters, and Wilson Foulson won the cup for the handy hunters.

The final event was the point-to-point when in full regalia the riders raced over a stretch of a mile and a

half, and Wilbur Ross Hubbard, on Sunny Fox, came in ahead by a close margin, Harry Nichols, on Fox Croft, in second, and John McKenney on Mabel II, in third. John D. Gadd, on Sally, came fourth, but for the fact that Gadd fell during the race and was compelled to regain his hold he would no doubt have been well near the lead.

The only mishap to mar the program was an accident which occurred shortly after the beginning of the show, when the Rev. Louis R. Sheen, leader of Sheen's Cavalry, suffered several broken ribs and a broken collar bone when his horse fell in making a hurdle. Sheen's Cavalry of Kent, came to Centreville Friday night and the show was held. Many of the ladies took part in the event. The results:

CHESTERTOWN MILK GIVEN CLEAN BILL

Inspectors from the State Department of Health who have recently made an inspection of the sources of Chestertown's milk supply, have given the dairymen a clean bill and much commendation for the splendid manner in which they are cooperating with the health authorities in safeguarding the milk supply with the very best sanitary regulations.

Among the towns voluntarily adopting special ordinances promulgated by the State Board of Health and the local Board of Town Commissioners governing the sale of milk, Chestertown is one of only seven towns in the State to take such action.

Recent inspections of the town's dairy routes by health inspectors were made for the purpose of determining the purity of the milk and also to require the installation of certain appliances which will further safeguard the supply, and nowhere were there any serious opposition on the part of the dairymen to the adoption of the requirements, although the expense involved will be considerable.

Among the recent devices required but not generally adopted by the dairymen, was an artificial process for cooling the milk and preserving it at a certain temperature before it is sold.

Dairymen declare that the adoption of this device would have compelled a raise in the price of milk far beyond the ability of the people to pay, especially the poorer families who depend largely upon milk as a diet.

Milk is now being sold by the town routes at 14 cents a quart, which is about equal to the prices received at the milk stations, and frequent inspections of the sources of supply prevent the outbreak of an epidemic of disease. There has not been an epidemic of typhoid fever caused by the milk supply in Chestertown for many years, a condition due very

largely to the vigilance of the State Board of Health and the hearty cooperation of the dairymen.

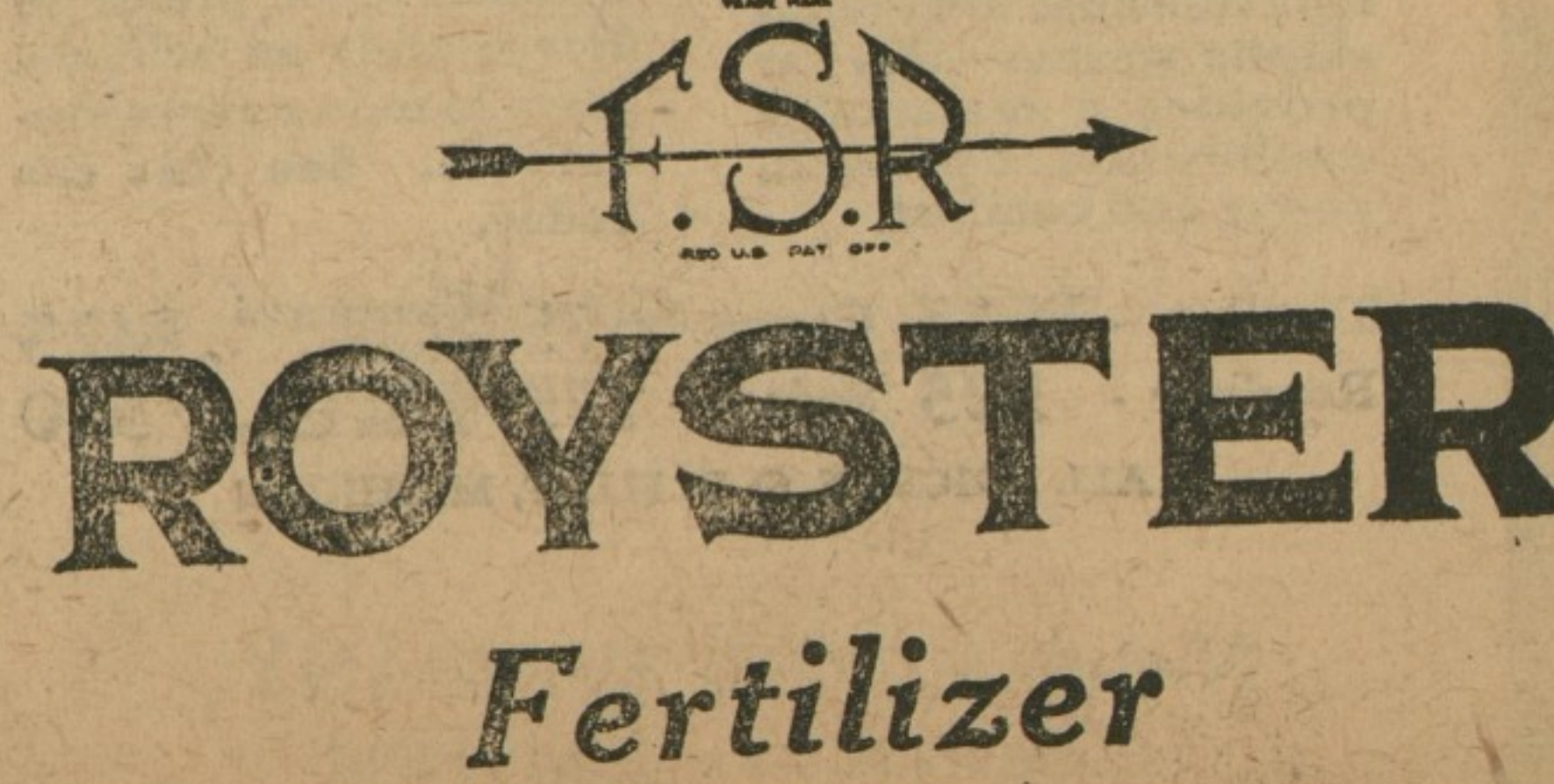
