Reiterating the doctrine of States' rights and assailing the Federal Government's encroachment on the personal rights of the States and the sovereign rights of the individual, Senator Bruce Saturday addressed the delegates gathered at Ocean City for the Home Rule Convention of the Eastern Shore...

This "Home Rule Convention," was nothing more or less than a "wet" convention traveling under the name and caption of "Home Rule." To be sure, they are including in their program an attack on Federal invasion of States' Rights and protesting against Federal Aid to Roads and Education and also the proposed Child Labor Amendment...
