THREE MILE LABOR DAY SWIM AT BETTERTON

Silver Loving Cups To Winners—Open To Men And Women—Other Water Sports In Addition—To The Three Mile Test.

The last swimming event of the season at Betterton, Md., will take place on Labor Day in the form of a three mile test. Silver loving cups will be awarded to the winners and each one that completes the swim will receive an award. This race will be for men and women and is attracting a lot of interest. Separate prizes will be given to the men and women and the fair ladies will start thirty minutes ahead of the men. F. Morris Touchtone, Yale Coach, who has charge of race has announced that he will have a novel system of watching or following the swimmers from the Betterton wharf. The race will start at Groves Point and finish up at Betterton. In order that the spectators can follow the swimmers without traveling in boats, Mr. Touchtone will have a boat following each swimmer and from each boat will fly a different color flag. On the Betterton wharf will be a large chart with the names of the swimmers and their different flags.

A good number of swimmers have already handed in their entries. In addition to the long swim there will be other water events for those who do not enter the three mile race. These events will be canoe tilting, boat races, fancy diving, dashes and novelty events. A huge crowd witnessed the waltz contest on Wednesday night which was won by Miss Dorothy McDorman and Louis Conozze with Miss Maxine Sautter and Howard McLaughlin second. The judges' decision was a popular one. The contestants came from all parts of the country to compete for the silver cups which were awarded.
