By this plan the farmer can safely sell futures, the farmer knows what he can pay pickers and for all concerned it seems to be best. It is only by experience that salutary lessons are learned and it is hoped the tomato growers will profit thereby.

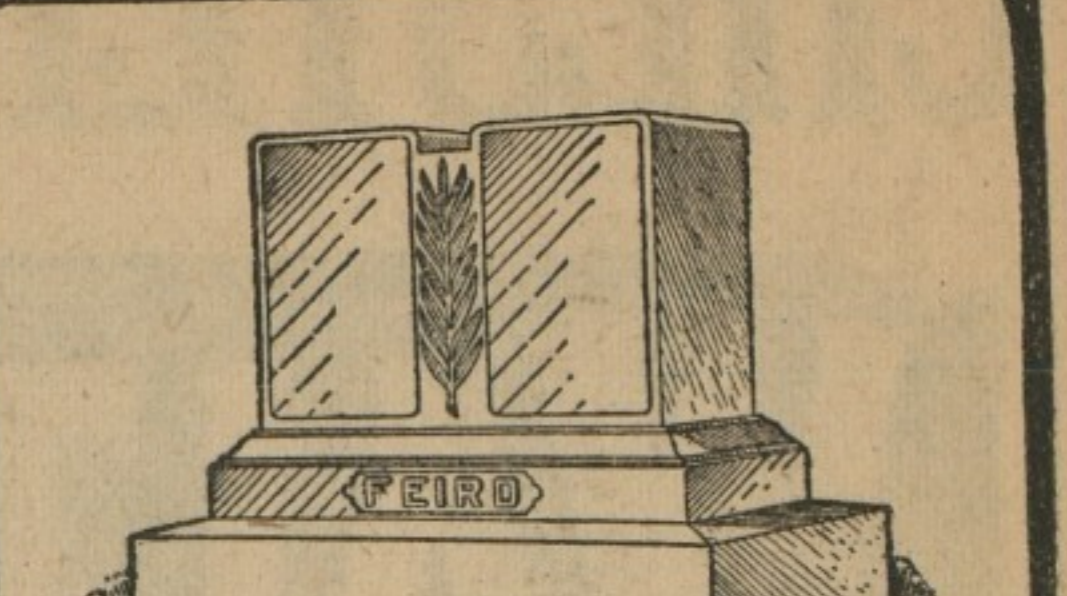
