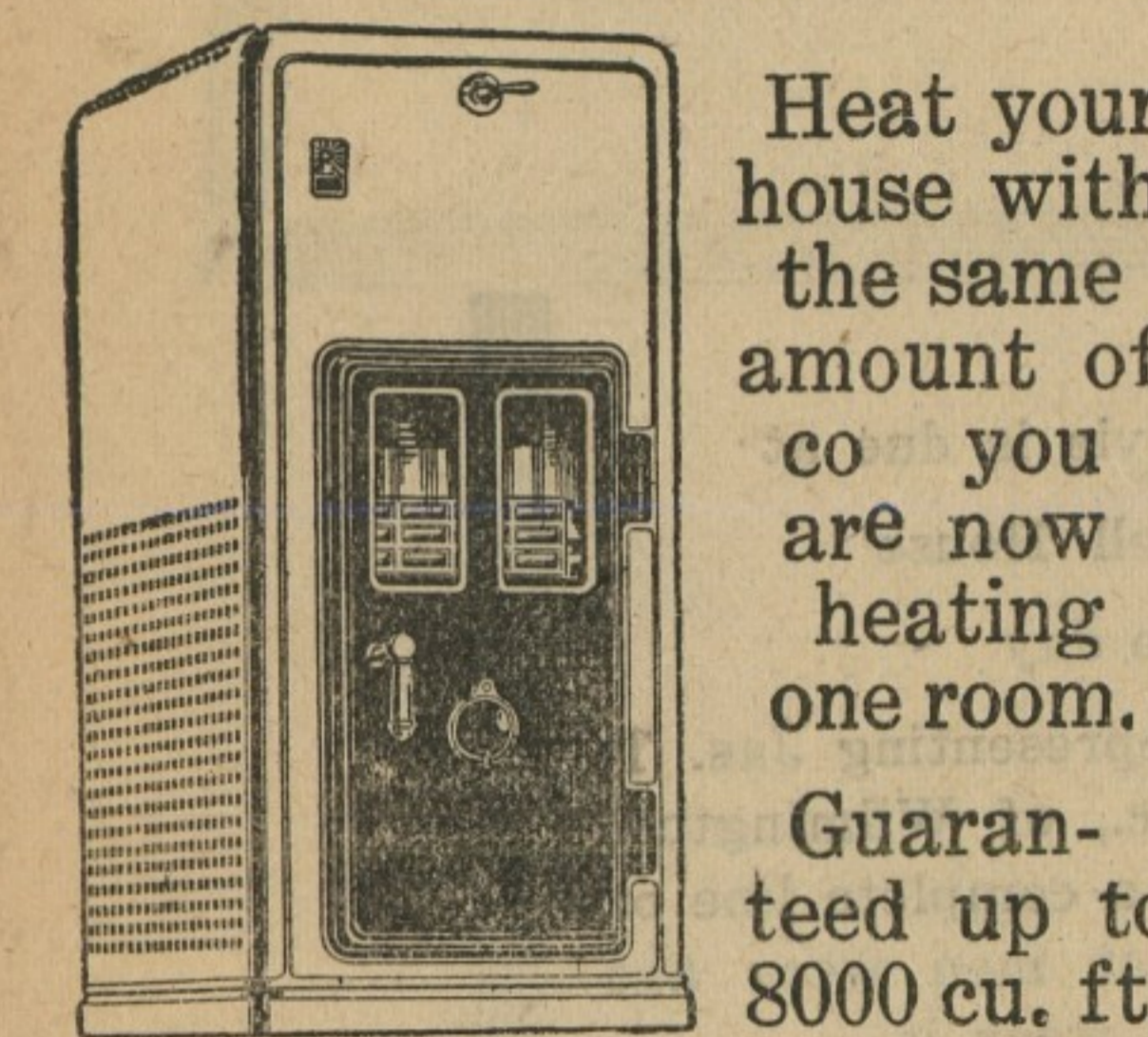

## REGULATIONS FOR Wharves in Kent County, Md.

Adopted by the County Commissioners, September 15, 1925.

**WHARFAGE**  
The rates of wharfage at any of the said wharves shall be as follows: All vessels lying at a wharf shall pay a fee of \$5.00 per day of 24 hours or portion thereof, except when loading or unloading cargoes. Charges upon power boats making regular stops at any of the county wharves may be arranged by special agreement with the Wharf Master or his representative.

Coal, per ton, 2000 lbs. . . . .20c  
Fertilizer, per ton, 200 lbs. . . . .10c

Fruits and Vegetables, per basket 1/2c  
Laths and Shingles, per 1000 . . . . .20c  
Lime, per ton 2000 lbs. . . . .10c  
Lumber, manufactured, per 1000 ft. B. M. . . . .50c  
Machinery, per cwt . . . . .5c  
Merchandise, per cwt . . . . .5c  
Sand, Stone and Gravel, per ton of 2,000 lbs. . . . .15c  
Wood, per cord . . . . .10c  
Said charges to be paid by the boat when freight is shipped or received from any of said wharves.

The County Roads Engineer shall be the Wharf Master for all public wharves in Kent County.
